

CULTURE—Plant roots in well drained soil about 2 feet apart in the row and five to six feet between rows. The seed is of slow germination and should be planted early in the season.

# **DWARF BEANS**

CULTURE—Plant about May 1st for early beans, as soon as the ground becomes warm, in light loamy soil. Large seeded beans require warmer weather to germinate than small beans. Cover from 1½ to 3 inches deep, according to weather conditions. Never cultivate or hoe beans when the foliage is damp 10m Jew or rains, as it will produce rust.

# POLE BEANS

The beans are produced in clusters of 4 to 6, the stems of which protrude outside the foliage. We tested seven bean pods that weighed one-half pound. It is therefore that weighed one-half pound. It is therefore easily possible to pick a pound of beans from three clusters. The flavor is unsurpassed and the pods are so meaty that they shrink very little when cooked. The pods are green, faintly striped with red lines which disappear when cooked. The vines are very vigorous and the pods are more rounded than the Oregon Giant but fully as long. 

We offer two strains of French grown seed secured direct from the originator. Both of these strains are quite free from green plants.

OLD STRAIN-This has been popular for years old start of this has been popular for years and produces heavy rounded stalks that are very firm and especially adapted for shipment. The plants are medium short and very compact and bleach golden yellow. Our strain of this seed is giving growers fine satisfaction. Pkt. 10c; ¼ oz. 40c; oz. \$1.00; ¼ lb. \$3.00; lb. \$10.00.

NEW STRAIN—The plants grow very tall and weigh very heavy. The stalks are wide and rather flat while the quality is extra fine being more free of strings than the old strain. # CABBAGE

CULTURE-Early varieties should be started in cold frame in January and February, or sowed the fall previous. They can be grown in a hot bed, but this is not so good, as the plants become tender. The earliest cabbage can be grown by sowing the seed in August or early september then transplant to the field earliest canoage can be grown by sowing the seed in August or early september then transplant to the field in October. For late, plant in open ground May 1st, transplant June 15 for fall and July 1st to 20th for winter cabbage, in rows 3½ feet apart, from 25 to 42 inches in the row, according to the richness of the soil and size of variety. Do not crowd them. They do best in a rich, loamy soil, fertilized with barnyard manure of any kind and applying our Garden Grow fertilizer as directed. Early Jersey Wakefield, Large Wakefield, Early Express, Danish Roundhead, All Head and Oregon Ballhead can be sown in the fall for spring and summer cutting. They seldom run to seed.



summer or early crops, for its tendancy is to produce large heads even in dry weather. It can also be used for early spring crops. It is not satis-factory as a winter cabbage. Very brittle and sweet. EXTRA EARLY COPENHAGEN MARKET—A

# CAULIFLOWER

CULTURE—For early cauliflower, the same culture as for early cabbage may be used. For late cauliflower, in the description of the varieties offered, the time of planting seed and plants is given. Cauliflower does best in a rich, loamy soil, not a cold, wet location. Plant 2½ to 3½ feet in rows, and 3½ feet between rows. As soon as the heads are large enough to soon be exposed to the light, tie or break the leaves carefully over the head to keep the light away from them. 






