# Rhododendrons

Spring, 1929

Rhododendrons are one of the most useful and satisfactory evergreens for planting either in groups or along borders of deciduous trees or shrubs, or for the woodlands. Will grow both exposed to the sun or where it is shady.

They are perfectly hardy and bloom during the month of June, and are of various colors. They grow best in a peat soil, or ground prepared with leafmold. They prefer an acid soil, as most evergreens do.

Plenty of water should be used in planting, and during the first Summer should be watered at least once a week.

It is also best to mulch the grounds after planting with dead leaves or dead grass about 3 or 4 inches thick.

This keeps the moisture in the ground, which these plants require. It is best to leave this mulch on during the Summer and Winter of the first year at least, if not longer.

Pinch off all seed pods after flowering in order to get good buds for the next season. When planted and cared for under such conditions the greatest success should prevail.
