WE OFFER a carefully selected group of delphiniums in separate named varieties for the first time available at popular prices. These plants are field grown clumps, sturdy and vigorously wintered. They have been checked as to type and description while in bloom, by a rigorous system of points and represent a close accuracy in color and form to the prize winners in England from which they are directly descended.

Undescribably magnificent they are with florets ranging from two or three inches across, well set on towering spikes of 5 and 6 feet, and more than half of this solid bloom. Not once only do they bloom during the season, but, as if unwilling to forget their moment of perfection, they lift their lowely heads again, and often yet again, before winter clothes and covers them.

For best results delphiniums need a well drained soil. Lime stirred about the base of the plant twice a year and worked in well, together with bonemeal and a little wellrotted cow manure, produces the healthiest growth.

All plants are shipped balled and burlapped and arrive in perfect condition.
