





All Field Seeds, Potatoes and Onion Sets are net cash and all orders for the same will be shipped collect unless cash accompanies order or unless sent by a customer who has an approved credit or reference is supplied.

POSTAGE. We pay postage on all packets, ounces, quarter pounds and pounds of Garden and Flower Seeds at prices named in catalog. Postage charged on larger amounts according to zone in which you live relative to Louisville. Consult parcel post rates below. Five pounds of seed, when packed for mailing, requires postage for six pounds. If postage is not sent with cash orders, it is our custom to reduce amount of order to pay postage. 
B-B Longfellow Cucumber



So hardy that it is seldom hurt by extreme cold weather, especially if planted early enough for root system to become well established. Retains its deep bluish green color and fresh appearance long after cutting, is very dwarf and if given sufficient space a single plant will easily spread two to two and a half feet. Leaves are most beautiful and densely curled. June, July and August is a splendid time for sowing this variety, however may be sown in the early spring. Mr. Jacob Kurtz, a Louisville market gardener who purchased seed from us last spring says that it is the best okra he has ever grown or eaten and that when first put on the market, it was hard to sell on account of the long pods, the customer thinking they were tough. However since they tried it, he was unable to supply the demand the latter part of season at 75c per peck with pods averaging 3 to 4 inches long. He also says that it does not cook slimy like other varieties.









Washington Asparagus.

ASPARAGUS

CULTURE—Sow seed in drills about 18 in. apart early in Spring or Fall after soaking in warm water 1 to 2 hours. Thin plants out to 3 inches apart and give frequent thorough cultivation. keeping plants clean from weeds. Roots can be transplanted either at one or two years old either in the Fall or Spring. The roots should be transplanted into a permanent bed in the richest soil that you have, harrow and work very deep. Open a trench about 15 inches deep and put in about 8 or 9 inches of well rotted manure, cover it with a few inches of soil and then place the root with the crowns facing one way about 12 inches apart and cover with 4 inches of soil, rows 5 feet apart. The growth should be cut in the Fall of the year and a top dressing of stable manure should be applied, this to be worked into the soil in the very early spring. It is also advisable to sprinkle a little salt over the bed. Only light cuttings should be made the second year. After the cutting season is over it is advisable to spray with a combination of Bordeaux and Arsenate of Lead which will prevent rust and also kill the Asparagus Beetle.

100 roots will set a row about 150 feet. An ounce of seed will plant a row about 50 feet long, 2 lbs. to the acre.

MARTHA WASHINGTON. A variety practically free from rust and other diseases, but is also larger and more vigorous. It grows large, straight shoots. It has a tight pointed bud and does not branch out until well beyond the time for cutting. This variety is especially adapted for market purposes, also very fine for home gardens.

PALMETTO. An old standard variety for all purpose. It is a vigorous growing dark green variety with pointed tips and very early.

BROCCOLI

CULTURE—Same as Cauliflower or Cabbage.

WHITE CAPE. An excellent variety forming rather loose heads of a creamy white color and of a good flavor.

EARLY GREEN CALABRESE. A comparative-


EARLY GREEN CALABRESE. A comparatively new variety of Broccoli, rapidly becoming popular, both for market and home gardens. This variety produces a bluish green head at center of plant in about 90 days. After this center head is removed the plant produces many branches, each bearing small heads that are as desirable as the first head and usually continues to bear until frost. The heads with 3 to 4 inches of stem are used and served like either asparagus or cauliflower.

BRUSSELS SPROUTS

CULTURE — Sow seeds in cold frames or open ground. Transplant the same as cabbage in the carly Spring and up to July. Make rows 3 feet apart, having the plants standing 15 to 18 inches apart in the row. Cultivate the same as Cabbage. An ounce will produce about 2,500 plants. Matures in about 125 days.

PERFECTION. Stems grow about two feet in height and are thickly set with sprouts forming small cabbage-like heads.

DWARF GREEN POD VARIETIES

CULTURE—1 lb. will plant 200 feet of drill, 1 bu. to the acre. Bean foliage is very tender and should not be planted until after danger of frost. The first of May is usually a safe time to plant, most any soil will bear a good crop. A rich sandy loam will give biggest returns. Sow seeds in rows 18 inches to 2½ feet apart, dropping the beans 3 inches apart in the row, cover about 2 inches deep. Hoe as soon as seedlings appear. When they begin to form a second or third pair of leaves, hill the rows slightly toward the plant, repeat the hilling process as the plants grow larger. Bear in mind, however, that beans should never be cultivated while the bushes are wet with either dew or rain. For succession of young tender pods, sow every other week up to August 15th. A frequent picking of pods will keep the plants bearing. If the soil is not fertile, use B.-B. Lawn and Garden Grower which should be drilled in the rows before seeds are dropped.

B.=B. IMPROVED RED VALENTINE. B.-B. strain of this popular variety is without doubt the heaviest yielding of any of the early Dwarf Green Pod Beans. The pods are long, tender and almost straight, nearly round, smooth and of a healthy green color and have only a few strings when young. Can be picked in about 45 days from time of planting. The plant is a strong and vigorous grower, holding the pods well up off of the ground. In recent years this strain has become immensely popular with the market growers for early and medium early planting. See page 8 for prices.

BURPEE STRINGLESS. The pods of this va-


riety are absolutely stringless in all stages of

growth from the time the first pod forms until full grown and ready to dry up. They are very crisp, tender and of fine flavor. The pods are also thick and meaty, round and slightly creaseback; comes into bearing in about 45 days. It is a very profitable bean for the market gardener and we strongly recommend it for home gardens.

BOUNTIFUL. Considered the most productive flat green podded stringless bush bean. plants are very vigorous and disease resistant. Pods average 6 inches long by 34 inch wide, are thick through and of a light green color. They are very brittle and absolutely stringless at all stages. Under favorable conditions the first picking can be made in 45 to 50 days from time of planting. Prices page 8



B.-B. Improved Early Red Valentine.

EXTRA EARLY BLACK VALENTINE. seed of this variety are black, the pod dark green and about six inches long, slender, round and nearly straight, stringy, fibrous and

fine grained. It gets tough very quickly, however it has the following good virtues: Being very hardy, it will stand early planting and shipment to a long distance.



FULL MEASURE. A very fine, early, stringless variety. The pods are medium green, round, straight, and about six inches long and of a very good quality. It is a very heavy producer and a profitable bean for the market gardener.

FRENCH'S DWARF HORTICULTURAL. The most attractive of the horticultural class. Vines very erect, straight and compact with a tendency to throw short runners. Pods 7 to 8 inches long, broad, stringy, fibrous and distinctly marked with crimson. We are sure that this will become a leading variety as a shell-out bear for the Louisville market.

GIANT STRINGLESS. Pods of this variety are a little longer, straighter and more slender than Burpee Stringless and are very prolific. While it is a favorite variety for canning, it is highly recommended for market gardeners.

DWARF HORTICULTURAL, or ITALIAN. The pods of this variety are about five inches long and used extensively on this market as a shell-out bean. In the young stages it can be used as a snap bean; however, as pods begin to mature, they color up a greenish yellow splashed bright crimson.

TENNESSEE GREEN POD. One of the very earliest and most productive of the green pods, known in some sections as Dwarf Kentucky Wonder, pods 6 to 7 inches long, broad and flat, nearly stringless and of an exceptionally fine flavor. The plants are large and will continue to bear much longer than any other variety. The flavor of the bean is somewhat similar to that of the Kentucky Wonder. It is therefore highly recommended for home gardens and to those who want a dwarf green pod bean of an exceptionally fine quality and one that will bear over a long period of time.

DWARF, or BUSH BEANS

Wax or Yellow Podded

CULTURE—Same as Dwarf Green Pod varieties. PENCIL POD BLACK WAX. An improved prolific black wax, having beautiful yellow straight pods of from 6 to 7 inches long, well rounded, meaty and deeply saddle-back. They are always solid, brittle and entirely stringless and of excellent quality.

IMPROVED GOLDEN WAX. The pods average five inches long and are quite fleshy, straight, broad, flat, and of a rich golden yellow color. Absolutely stringless at all stages. Vines grow erect and bear the pods well off the ground, thus preventing rust and rot.

SOUP, or SHELLED BEANS

DWARF WHITE NAVY BEANS. The most popular of all varieties used as a shelled bean. They are snowy white and very uniform in size. Our stock of this variety is carefully selected. They should not be planted before 1st of July on account of bean weavel.

DWARF RED KIDNEY BEANS. A very large Kidney shaped deep red bean. Distinctly flavored, and a heavy producer.

DWARF WHITE KIDNEY BEAN. Very similar to Red Kidney, differing mostly in color and flavor.


POLE or RUNNING SNAP BEANS

CULTURE—These should be planted about the same time as the dwarf varieties in hills 4 feet each way. If not convenient to secure poles, a trellis can be made by placing a good strong wire 6 feet high between two rows and as beans begin to start a runner, tie small twine to the wire and run down and tie loosely to the bean stalk just above the ground. If well rotted manure is not convenient, enrich the hill with a liberal supply of B-B Lawn & Garden Grower. If planted in corn, wait until the corn gets 4 or 5 inches high before planting the beans as the bean is a faster grower than corn. Plant 2 beans to each hill of corn, thin out to one. 1 lb. will plant 150 hills.

McCASLAN POLE. A very prolific whiteseeded Pole bean. The pods are about 8 inches long, deep green, meaty, stringless and of excellent quality. It is a wonderfully fine bean for use in green stage or as a winter shelled bean.


WHITE KENTUCKY WONDER. The very earliest white seeded variety, pods 6 to 7 inches long, round, nearly straight, tender, fleshy and stringless, and of excellent quality. While this is an excellent snap bean, it also makes a very fine dried bean for winter use.

LAZY WIFE. A late productive sort having medium green pods 6 inches in length, broad, flat, stringless, fleshy, brittle and of excellent quality. Dry beans, round and white.



Kentucky Wonder or Old Homestead.

IMPROVED KENTUCKY WONDER, or OLD HOMESTEAD. Without question the best flavored of all beans in cultivation. Kentucky Wonder combines size, quality, and productiveness. The long pods are generally borne in clusters of two or four individual pods averaging 7 to 8 inches long. They are deeply saddle-back, very fleshy and perfectly stringless at all stages of development. It is the custom of a great many growers to plant this variety in corn,

however the yield will be much heavier if planted alone and vines supported by poles or some other trellis.

RED SPECKLED CUT-SHORT. A very popular variety for planting with corn, producing an abundance of straight, flat, light green pods $3\frac{1}{2}$ to 4 inches long, the pods being produced in clusters, making it a very easy bean to pick.

NANCY DAVIS or STRIPED CREASEBACK. A vigorous and productive bean that bears quantities of fleshy pods nearly 8 inches long and so round and fat as to be distinctly crease-backed. A fine bean for either the home garden or market, and particularly fine for growing in corn.

WHITE CREASEBACK. Very early and moderately productive, pods 5 to 6 inches long, light green, uniform, round and slender, slightly stringy; beans small, oblong and white. Is used quite extensively as a dried bean for winter use.

HORTICULTURAL, or SPECKLED CRANBERRY. Is grown exclusively for shell bean unless used while quite young, pods straight, flat and are about 5 inches long, pale green becoming streaked with red when matured. The beans may be used either green or dried.

BUSH LIMA BEANS

CULTURE-These should not be planted until the ground has CULTURE—These should not be planted until the ground has become thoroughly warm, should be sown in well enriched land with the rows 2½ feet apart, dropping the beans 10 inches apart in the row, eyes down. The beans should be well hilled to hold the pods off the ground. B.-B. Lawn and Garden Grower supplied at the rate of 10 lbs. to every 100 feet of row will materially increase the yield. This can be done before or after planting. 1 lb. will plant about 150 feet of row, ¾ of a bushel to the agre to the acre.

BURPEE'S BUSH LIMA. Plants large, sturdy, hardy and productive; pods 4 to 41/2 inches long containing 3 to 4 beans which are as large as any pole sort, flat and white.

FORDHOOK BUSH LIMA. erally considered the best of the large seeded bush lima varieties. Bushes of strictly erect habit, branching freely with all the branches held upright. From 4 to 6 days earlier than other varieties of this class. Pods about 5 to 6 inches long, are found in clusters of 4 to 8, and are well filled with 4 to 5 delicious large beans that are rather thick and of a greenish color

BURPEE'S IMPROVED BUSH LIMA. A true and improved bush form of the large white lima pole bean with an extra large seed. The plants are vigorous and productive with very large pods 5 inches long and usually contain 4 large thick beans of excellent quality. show a greenish white tint, making it a very desirable bean for market purposes, also for the home garden.

WOOD'S PROLIFIC BUSH LIMA. This is a small seeded variety, very early and productive; plants grow about 20 inches high and bear continuously throughout season. Seeds are white and used extensively in some sections as a winter dried bean.

POLE LIMA BEANS

CULTURE—Sow when the soil becomes warm and dry. They are more tender than the snap beans. They should be planted with the eyes down, about 3 to the hill, the hills about 3½ by 3½ feet each way. These should be trellised the same as the Snap Pole Beans. Unless the ground is very fertile, each hill should be supplied with at least a half gallon of well-rotted manure. 1 lb. will plant about 100 hills, allowing about 6 beans to the hill, which should be thinned down to 3 plants, after 6 ins. high.

KING OF THE GARDEN. An old standby of

EXTRA EARLY JERSEY. Early and very productive. Pods contain from 3 to 4 large beans.

Garden Beets

CULTURE—One of the earliest vegetables the garden yields and one of the first to be sown or planted in the garden. Beets should be drilled in rows and covered about ½ inch deep, soil should be packed firmly after seed is covered. After plants are up about 3 inches high, thin out to 3 inches apart. The rows should be about 14 inches apart. The soil should be loamy and fertile, and well pulverized before seeding. For an extra early supply, sow seeds in hotbeds or cold frames about the middle to the last of February and transplant to open ground about the first of April. In order to have a fresh supply of young tender beets, they should be sown every two weeks up to the middle of July. 1 oz. to 50 feet. of drill; 5 to 6 lbs. to the acre. EARLY WONDER. A selection from the Crosby's Egyp-

IMPROVED EXTRA EARLY ECLIPSE. Not quite as early as Crosby's Egyptian, however a very desirable variety for home or market garden. The flesh is a bright red and slightly zoned with pink, very sweet, crisp and tender, has a medium size top and makes a splendid variety for bunching.

DETROIT DARK RED. One of the most popular red turnip beets for market gardeners or home use. Being a second early, is used extensively as the main crop variety. The tops are of medium size, fruits very uniform in shape, flesh deep red, very crisp, tender and sweet.

EARLY BLOOD TURNIP. Very uniform, roots always smooth, round and handsome, tops small, of good marketable size and among the best for table use. Color dark, flesh crisp, tender and sweet; good keeper.

MANGELS, or STOCK BEETS

CULTURE — All mangels require a rich soil, in order to grow well should be thoroughly cultivated, the seed should be covered about 1 inch. Sow in May or June in rows 2 to 3 feet apart, thin out so plant will stand 8 inches apart in the row. Harvest before freezing weather.

MAMMOTH PRIZE LONG RED. A favorite with the farmer and dairyman. It grows to an enormous size and gives 30 to 50 tons to the acre. Roots nearly cylindrical in shape, light red, growing well above ground; flesh white and rose colored.

GOLDEN TANKARD.
Very productive and sweet, flesh yellow, top and neck very small, easily pulled and especially relished by sheep and cows.

SWISS CHARD

CULTURE—Sow 14 inches apart and 1 inch deep early as ground can be worked. When large enough thin out to 10 or 15 inches apart. To assure prompt and even germination, the soil should be pressed firmly on top of seed.

LUCULLUS. Plants grow about 2 to 2½ feet tall and consist, when fully developed, of about a dozen creamy white beautifully curled leaves. These leaves are carried on broad thick stalks. The stalks are almost white and after trimming, can be cooked and served like asparagus. The leaf part can be cooked like Spinach or Kale Greens, however if desired the stalk and leaves can be boiled and served in the same manner as Spinach or Greens. Chard is becoming more popular each year.

CAULIFLOWER

CULTURE—Raise plants by sowing in hotbed or greenhouse during January or February. Transplant in cold frame 2 or 3 inches apart each way, set in open ground as soon in Spring as ground can be put in good order. It requires a rich soil, well supplied with humus and moisture. During dry weather, especially when the plants are heading, a light side dressing of Nitrate of Soda will be of much help. Set plants 18 inches apart in rows 2 feet apart. When the heads are formed, they should be bleached by drawing the leaves together and tying with soft string or rubber band. 1 oz. of seed produces about 2,000 plants.

B.-B. EARLY SNOWBALL. We consider our strain of this variety second to none which comes direct to us from one of the very best

CHINESE CABBAGE

CULTURE—For spring crop sow seed in beds, transplant and cultivate the same as early cabbage. For fall crops sow seeds about 15th of July.

PE-TSAI. This produces long, slender, very solid head often measuring 20 inches in height and closely resembles in the habit of growth the Cos Lettuce. The outer leaves are light green, inside is of a beautiful cream yellow which are very tender and of a delicious flavor.

CABBAGE, B-B. Select Stock

CULTURE—For early crop the seed should be sown in hotbeds or in boxes in the house in December or January. Summer crops can be sown outside and then transplanted where they are to remain. Plants should be transplanted in good, rich, clean, light soil in rows 2½ to 3 feet apart, plants 14 to 18 inches apart in the row, according to the variety of cabbage. Early Cabbage should be planted close together, the later ones farther apart. 1 oz. of seed will produce from 1500 to 2000 plants.

EXTRA EARLY JERSEY WAKEFIELD. A well known and extra early popular variety. Heads cone shaped and very solid and extremely uniform in both green color and size. It is usually the first cabbage on the early market.

B.=B SPECIAL CHARLESTON WAKEFIELD. It is not quite as large as the regular Charleston Wakefield, but will mature several days earlier.

CARROT

CULTURE—For early crop sow as soon as the ground can be worked and for later crop from the beginning of May until the latter part of July, rows 12 to 14 inches apart and ½ inch deep, thin out the young plants to 3 inches. Carrots will do well in almost any soil; however, the better the soil, the better the carrot crop. One ounce will sow 100 feet of drill.

LOUISVILLE MAR= KET. A most excellent medium early, half-long variety; is one of the best in quality for market. Tops are medium size with small necks. The mature roots are thick, 5 to 6 inches in length, uniformly halflong, stump-rooted and taper slightly, smooth. deep orange-red in color. This variety is used extensively for bunching.

OXHEART. A rapid growing, short thick carrot. The mature roots are $4\frac{1}{2}$ to 5 inches long; very thick at shoulder and gradually tapering, ending abruptly to a small tap root. The orange colored flesh is very sweet and tender. The short length of the Oxheart makes it more desirable for stiff hard soils than the longer rooted varieties.

CELERY

CULTURE—It requires rich, loamy, moist soil. In early Spring, drill the seed in rows about 12 inches apart. As the seed is rather hard to germinate, the soil should be firmly packed after a very light covering and watered frequently. They should then be transplanted from the 1st to the middle of July in rows 3 feet apart, and set 6 inches apart in the rows. At the time of planting, care should be taken that the roots are firm in the ground. In home gardens, celery is often planted in double rows, that is, 2 rows 10 inches apart, then 3 feet to the next 2 rows, which provides ample soil for hilling which is necessary for blanching and whitening. In hilling, care should be taken not to cover the crown of the plants. 1 oz. will produce about 3,000 plants.

GOLDEN PLUME, or WONDERFUL. A comparatively new variety closely resembling the Golden Self-Blanching in crispness and flavor. It is larger and a more rapid grower. plants are semi-dwarf and resist blight and other celery diseases much better than other varieties. It is unequalled in quality, it has a very pleasing appearance and commands ready We highly recommend this variety for market or home garden.

GOLDEN SELF-BLANCHING. We consider this variety second to the Golden Plume. It is very early, plants compact and stocky, very thick, fine flavored; when blanched is of an excellent golden yellow color.


culture—For very early cucumbers, sow seed March 15th in a hotbed. If paper bands are used, they can be transplanted without disturbing the root system. When weather has become settled and warm, sow seed in hills 4 to 6 feet apart each way. Thin out, leaving 4 of the strongest plants in each hill. They do best in rich loamy soil. For succession of this crop make plantings at intervals until July 10th. F-2 Dust is an effective remedy against insect enemies of this crop. This should be applied frequently with a duster.

B.-B. LONGFELLOW. Those desiring an extremely long, dark green cucumber should plant our Longfellow; it grows 12 to 14 inches long, handsomely shaped, and a beautiful dark green color, 2 to 2½ inches in diameter, making a splendid slicing variety.

B.-B. LONG WHITE SPINE. About one-fourth longer than the Improved White Spine and Holds its dark bluish green color well, remaining edible for a long period after picked. It is fairly prolific and edible in about 60 to 62 days. We highly recommend this as a main crop variety.





culture—Thrives well in any good garden soil, seeds should be grown in hotbeds about middle of March and transplanted, when plants are sufficiently large, in cold frames. If paper bands are used, they can be transplanted to open ground when soil becomes warm without disturbing root system. They should be set about 2 ft. apart in 3½-ft. rows. 1 oz. will produce about 1,000 plants. Two-way Spray keeps bugs away.

BLACK BEAUTY. About one week earlier than the New York Purple and of a rich lustrous purplish black color. It is a distinct sort and a favorite where known. The plants are remarkably healthy in their growth and yield an abundance of large fruit. The fruits are entirely spineless and very attractive in appearance.

NEW YORK IMPROVED PURPLE. The strong bushes are larger than Black Beauty, keeping the eggs off the ground better. The large dark purplish fruit is heavy at the base, narrowing at the top.




Black Beauty Egg Plant.

WEET or SUGAR CORN

Home gardens are not complete without sugar corn. If possible, successive plantings should be made from beginning to end of season. The market gardeners should plant more sugar corn, as the demand for it is commanding a higher price than other roasting ears.

CULTURE-It is well to take chances in the home garden by chances in the home garden by planting a small quantity of Extra Early and Early Adams, early in Spring, however, if ground is too cold and remains so, the seed is liable to rot. Sweet Corn should not be planted until the ground is Corn is mostly planted warm. Corn is mostly planted in drills, dropping one kernel every 6 inches and thinning out to 12 inches after the corn



out to 12 inches after the corn gets a good start. The rows should be from 3 to 3½ feet apart. Corn will succeed well on most any soil, however, will make more rapid growth by using a small quantity of a good commercial fertilizer. For succession of fresh roasting ears, a planting should be made every 10 days or 2 weeks throughout the season up until the middle of July.

GOLDEN SUNSHINE. The earliest of the Golden Bantam type, maturing a week to ten days earlier than that variety. More dwarf in habit than Bantam, with ears 61/2 inches long, containing 12 rows of broad, yellow sweet grains, especially de-

sirable for its extreme earliness and fine flavor.

WHIPPLE'S EARLY. An extra early variety with deep grains of the Evergreen type, stalks usually from 5 to 6 feet high and of a vigorous growth. The ears are produced about $1\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 feet from the ground, often 2 to the stalk, and are about 8 inches long, rather blocky in form, 16 to 18 and often 20 rows, filled to the end with rather narrow, deep grains of pearly whiteness and very sweet.

GOLDEN BANTAM. A very popular golden yellow color and of high quality, ears 6 to 7 inches long, 8 rows, and are filled from butt to tip with deep broad grains of attractive color and a most delightful flavor.

BLACK MEXICAN. One of the sweetest and best, ears 8 inches long and 8 rows, grains bluish black when ripe.

BANTAM EVERGREEN. This is a cross between the Golden Bantam and Stowell's Evergreen. A most excellent sort of fine quality. The ears are about 8 inches long, 12 to 14 rows; the grain is rather broad and deep and of a rich golden yellow color.

COUNTRY GENTLEMAN. An old standard second early variety, ears about 7 to 8 inches long, cobs small white and densely covered with long slender white grains without row formation.

STOWELL'S EVERGREEN. The standard and best known sweet corn, ears 8 to 9 inches long, 16 to 18 rows, with a very deep sweet grain. On account of its size and productiveness, no doubt the most profitable for the market gardener.







ENDIVE

CULTURE—For early use, sow about the 1st of April; for late or Fall use, sow in June or July. This should be drilled in rows 14 inches apart and covered very shallow. When 2 or 3 inches high, thin out to 1 foot apart. To bleach draw the leaves together and tie with soft twine or use rubber bands. This should be done when plants are dry. It requires about 3 weeks for the plants to be properly blanched. 1 oz. of seed will drill about 100 feet row.





KALE

CULTURE—The large majority of Kale seed is sown during July and August for winter greens. The Siberian while not nearly so curly as the Scotch, is hardier and is seldom winter killed. The seeds are usually sown broadcast 3 lbs. to the acre. Some are very successful growing Scotch Kale in 18-inch drills. One-quarter to one-half pound is sufficient for the average family garden.

B.=B. SPECIAL DWARF CURLED SCOTCH. This is a carefully selected strain of Scotch Kale which is very dwarf and spreading close to the ground. It is of a very deep green color and the leaves are more finely curled after light freezing weather. Our Special Scotch Kale is very hardy and will stand more winter weather than the Dwarf Green Curled Scotch. If seeds are sown in June or July, a strong growth will be made, enabling it to stand better during freezing weather. See page 5.

It is the sprouts from these roots that are used in salads, and they may be had all during the winter by planting the roots at intervals in sand or rich loam in warm cellar or under greenhouse benches. Set roots vertical 3 inches apart and cover 6 to 8 inches. It requires about 4 weeks for shoots to appear.

DWARF GREEN CURLED SCOTCH. This strain of Scotch Kale is recommended for spring sowing when wanted for early summer or fall market. It is very dwarf, spreading close to the ground.



MUSTARD

CULTURE—Sow in early Spring, June or July, in rows 1 foot apart or broadcast. Plants should stand about 4 inches apart. 1 oz. will sow 100 feet of row, 1½ lbs. to the acre.

SOUTHERN GIANT CURLED. Plant vigorous and hardy, of upright, sturdy growth; leaves large, light green, tinged yellow, much crumpled and frilled at edges. Very profitable variety for market gardeners.



KOHL RABI

CULTURE—This vegeta-ble combines the flavor of Turnip and Cabbage. It ex-Turnip and Cabbage. It excels both in nutrition. It is very hardy and productive. Sow as early in the Spring as the ground can be put in go od gardening condition. Drill in rows like Radishes or Beets. Thin out so they will stand about 4 inches apart in the row, having the rows about 18 inches apart. They are ready when the rows about 18 inches apart. They are ready when bulbs average from 2½ to 3 inches in diameter. The thick outer skin should be removed before boiling. Serve like Turnips. One ounce of seed will sow a drill of about 100 feet.

LEEK

CULTURE—Sow about 1st of April in drills 1 foot apart ½ inch deep. When 6 or 8 inches high, transplant into deep rich soil in rows 12 inches apart and 4 inches apart in the row. Set as deep as possible so the plants may be covered and blanched. Draw the earth up to them gradually as they grow. Plant 1 oz. to 100 feet of drill.

AMERICAN FLAG. Produces a large thick stem, and is of mild flavor; the leaves are short and the plant is very hardy; suitable for planting either in the spring or fall.

culture—For very early crop, seed should be sown in hotbeds and transplanted in open ground fairly early in the season. They are hardy and will stand quite a bit of cold weather. The loose heading varieties do well very often when sown broadcast. One habit is to sow in 1 foot rows and thin out when the plants begin to spread to 3 inches apart. Heading varieties should be sown very early in the Spring in drills 12 inches apart. After well up thin out to 6 inches apart in the row. Cultivate often and if ground is not very fertile, use Nitrate of Soda or High Grade Fertilizer which will add to the crispness of the Lettuce, by giving a rapid growth. 1 oz. will make about 600 plants or sow about 300 feet of row.

The favorite loose B.=B. GRAND RAPIDS. leaf for forcing under glass, does well for early planting outside, leaves exceptionally crumpled, border finely frilled, color very light green with no trace of brown. Our B.-B. 

CULTURE—For early melons, seeds can be planted in plant bands and set in cold frames until after the danger of frost and then transplanted into the open ground in hills 4 to 6 feet apart each way. If possible, use well rotted manure in each hill. If seeds are planted in open ground, plant about 10 seeds in different parts of the hill just under the surface of the soil. When well up, thin out to 3 or 4 to the hill. It requires about 1 oz. of seed to 60 hills, or 2 lbs. to the acre. F-2 Dust is a very effective remedy against enemies of the Cantaloupe crop.





WATERMELONS, B.-B. Carefully Selected

CULTURE—When the ground becomes warm, plant in hills 6 to 8 feet apart each way. If possible, use a good shovel full of well-rotted manure in each hill, this should be 4 or 5 inches under the top soil. Plant 10 seeds to the hill and when plants are well up, thin out to three. Cultivate until vines cover ground, pinch ends of the growing shoots to induce early fruiting. 1 oz. will plant about 40 hills or 2 lbs. to the acre.



CULTURE—A vegetable that is very easy to grow in any garden. Is a very tender plant and seeds should not be sown until ground is warm. Sow in rows 3 feet apart, 3 to 4 seed per foot. Thin out when plants get a good start to 10 inches, 1 oz. to about 30 feet of drill, 4 lbs. to an acre.

WHITE VELVET. Plants about 3½ feet high, pods white, long, smooth and tender; early and productive. Very popular for market and home garden.

ONION SEEDS AND SETS

CULTURE—Seed should be planted very early in the Spring, in fact, one of the very first to sow in the garden. It is well to have the soil prepared the previous autumn. When sowing for sets, plant in drills 12 inches apart, 10 seeds to the inch, cover with about ½ inch of fine soil. If large onions are wanted from the seed, drop in drill about 1 inch apart and thin out to 2 after plants are about 4 inches high. If onion sets are used to grow large onions, plant in rows 12 to 14 inches apart and 4 inches apart in a row.

WHITE PORTUGAL, or SILVER SKIN. The bulbs are flat in shape and are very largely used for growing sets on account of their fine shape when small, and good keeping quality. It is grown very extensively for use in the green state as a bunching onion and is well liked for pickling.

LOUISVILLE YELLOW DANVER. This is a standard and extensively used yellow variety in this section for growing of sets. Skin is light yellow in color, bulbs medium large, slightly flattened, quite thick with small neck. 

CULTURE—Sow in early spring in rows 12 inches apart, covering seeds about ¼ inch, pressing down the soil after covering. The seed is very slow to germinate, often requiring 4 or 5 weeks. It is advisable to soak the seeds a couple of days before sowing, which will hasten germination. The moisture can be retained by covering rows with boards or old bags. One ounce will sow about 150 feet.

CULTURE—Plant seed in early spring as soon as the soil has become warm. The rows should be from 14 to 18 inches apart, the plants 5 inches apart in the row. Cover seeds about ¼ inch. A rich loamy soil is best and should be loosened 10 inches deep. They are very hardy, the flavor being much improved by frost, and may be left in ground during winter and dug as wanted. One ounce will sow a 100 foot row.

LOUISVILLE SPECIAL. A favorite with the market gardener. Has a very deep hollow crown, rather top-shaped with small tap root, early, productive and excellent quality. This variety always commands the highest market price.

SUGAR, or HOLLOW CROWN. This is a long smooth variety growing from 10 to 12 inches long, very tender and sweet, and of an excellent flavor; color of a creamy white. We recommend this for home garden.







PEPPER

CULTURE—Sow in hotbeds in February or March and transplant outside in May 18 inches apart in 3-foot rows. When the ground becomes warm the seed can be sown outside and transplanted as above. A good garden fertilizer, if worked into the soil when plants are 6 ins. high, will materially increase the yield. 1 oz. will produce about 1,200 plants.

CRIMSON GIANT. One of the earliest of the very large sweet varieties; fruits oblong, three lobed, 5 inches long by 3½ inches in diameter; very mild, thick flesh.

CULTURE—Treat about the same as carrots except that Salsify is hardler and may be left in the ground all Winter. Sow in the early Spring after the ground has become warm in drills 14 inches apart and thin out to 4 inches in the row. Cover seed about 1 inch. 1 oz. to 75 feet; 5 lbs. to the acre.

MAMMOTH SANDWICH ISLAND. This variety is large and strong, growing with smooth, almost white tapering roots, has a mild and delicate flavor. The best sort for market gardener.

B.-B. RADISHES

CULTURE—Sow in drills as soon as the frost is out of the ground. They should be thinned out to stand 2 inches apart in the row, rows about 12 inches apart. They may be sown successively until the last of August. 1 oz. of seed to 100 feet of drill.

A dozen good plants is usually sufficient for the average family. The roots should be set 4 feet each way in deep, warm and very rich soil. The more manure the better stalk.



SPINACH

CULTURE—For Spring and Summer use, sow in drills 1 foot apart and 1 inch deep as early as the ground can be worked and every two weeks up to the middle of May.

B.=B. LATE SEEDING BLOOMSDALE. One of the advantages is that the inferior early shooting male plants are entirely lacking. It is intensely crumpled and blistered and very uniform. The color is a deep glossy green. Wherever Bloomsdale is grown, this improved strain will give far more satisfactory results.

CULTURE—Sow after the danger of frost when the ground has become warm, plant 5 or 6 seeds in hill 4 feet each way. This applies to bush varieties. For Winter or vine varieties, hills should be 8 ft. each way. When well up they should be thinned out to two plants. 1 oz. for about 40 hills, 1 lb. to acre.

B.-B. SUPERIOR WHITE BUSH. This is a carefully bred strain of the Early White Bush that runs uniform in size, shape and color, which is not true of the regular stock of this variety.

GOLDEN SUMMER CROOKNECK. A standard and early productive summer sort, fruits moderately warted and of a bright yellow color.

SUMMER STRAIGHTNECK. A carefully bred selection from the Golden Summer Crookneck, having all the good qualities of its parent, plus a straight and more menty neck that does not break so easily when packed for shipment or market.

Winter Varieties

TABLE QUEEN. A small winter squash, with excellent qualities, about the size of a cocoanut, dark green in color, changing to a bright golden after picking and storing. The meat is dry and mealy, and requires only about 20 minutes to bake.

WARTED HUBBARD. Fruits are large size, rough, skin dark green in color, flesh is bright orange, fine grained, rich and dry, the vines are strong and make a robust growth. A splendid keeping variety.

B.-B. TOMATOES

CULTURE—For early tomatoes sow seed in hot beds during the latter part of February or the 1st of March. When plants are about 3 inches high, transplant into cold frames, setting plants about 4 inches each way. Paper plant bands can be used to advantage for this purpose, and when transplanted to the open ground after danger of frost, the root system would not be disturbed. If the tap root is not broken, will continue to bear much longer. For main or Fall crop, seed can be sown in the open ground from the 10th of May until the 1st of June and transplanted where they are to remain. 3 to 4 feet apart each way. More perfect and better fruits can be had if plants are well staked. 1 oz. will produce about 1,500 plants; requires 4.000 plants to the acre.



New Marglobe-(Disease Resistant).




