



HAIRY VETCH

Undoubtedly one of the best combined winter hay and soil improving crops that can be put in. On account of trailing habit, it is advisable to sow with some other crop, such as oats, barley or wheat, as these crops lend support and will produce larger and better quality feed.

AUSTRIAN WINTER PEAS

Yields of 10 to 14 tons of green forage to the acre have been made by the Austrian Winter Peas. The forage is said to be more relished by farm animals than even Hairy Vetch, and the milk production of dairy cows increased by the feeding. It is exceedingly winter hardy, and equal to Hairy Vetch as a hay producer. On account of the low cost of Austrian Peas, we anticipate a much larger demand this year.

Corn Yields Don't Drop When Legumes Are Used

AUBURN, ALA.—The same field will produce the same yield of corn thirty-four years in succession, provided winter legumes are grown between corn crops, agronomists at Alabama Polytechnic Institute have found.

On the other hand, there was data to show that without legumes corn yields declined more than 50 per cent over the same period. Cotton was found to react similarly.

Yields of cotton and corn in a three-year rotation with legumes were found four times as great as those in the same rotation without legumes.

P. S.—The above is such good advice, we think it warrants repeating.



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
