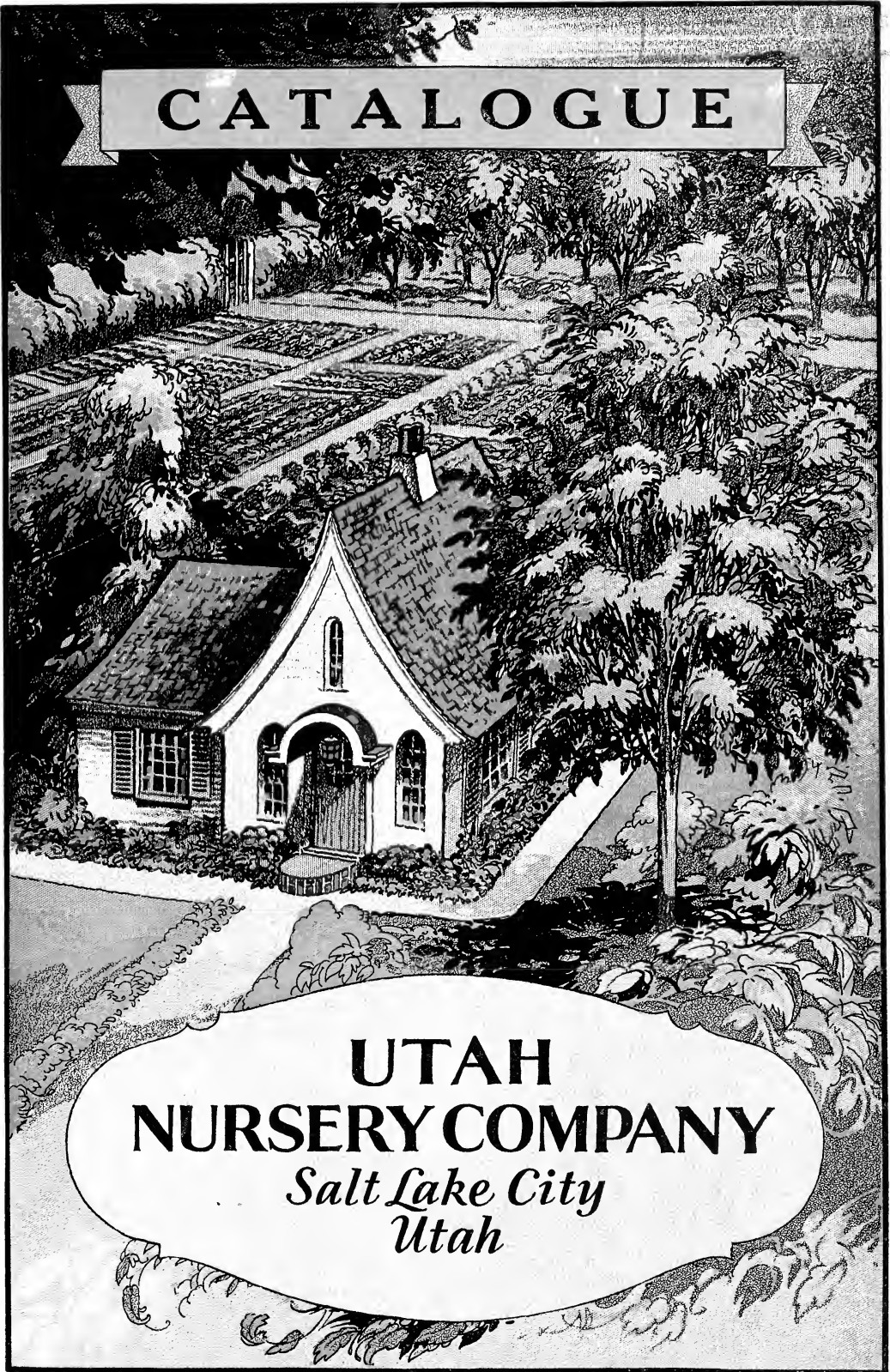

DEUTZIA, Pride of Rochester

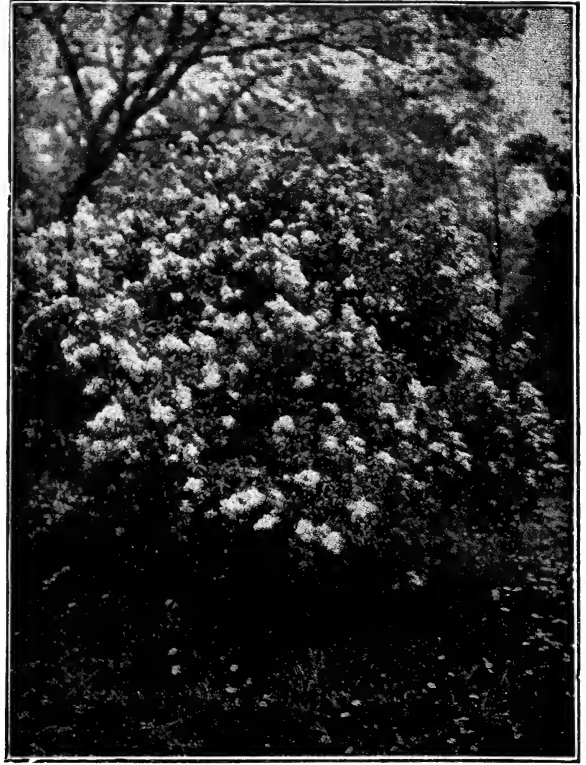
Blooms in June with white flowers tinted with light pink.

Persian Lilac.

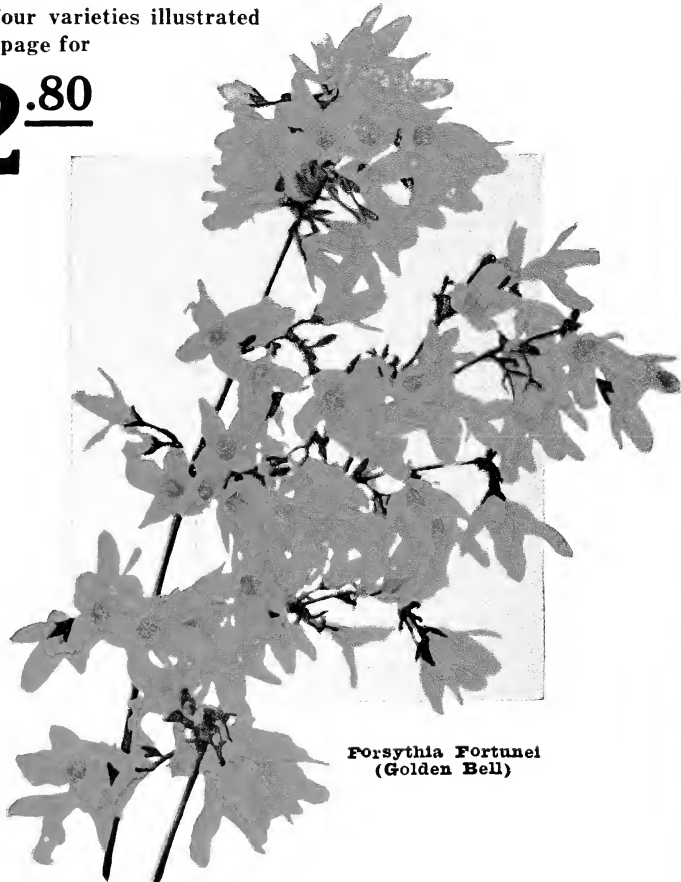

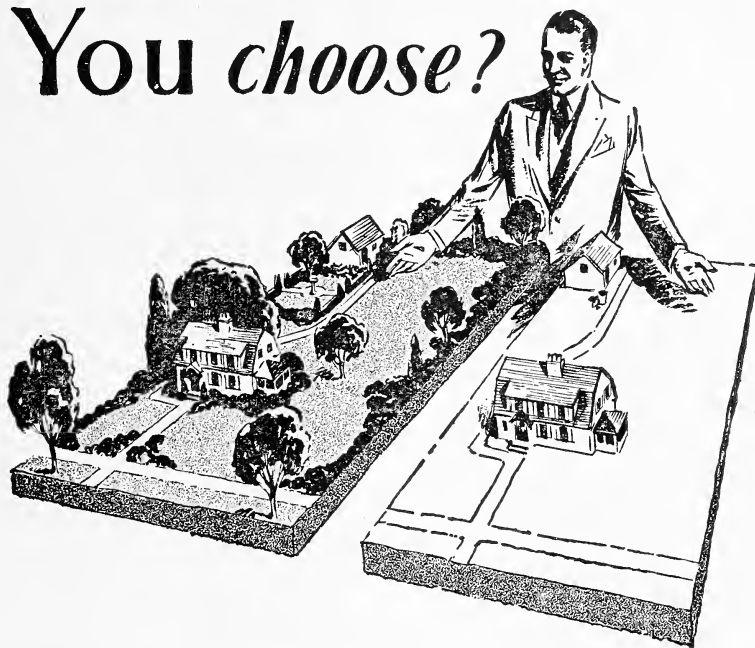

You are furnished with a plan which you can follow over a period of years before completing or you can do the work all in one season.

USE THE ENCLOSED ORDER BLANK. Carefully fill in blank spaces and enclose payment for full amount of order. Write very plainly or print name, post office, county, state, street and house number or R. F. D. where you get your mail; with explicit directions if stock is to be shipped to some other town. To avoid mistakes do not write letters on same sheets as orders.

NO POSTAGE STAMP NECESSARY. The envelope enclosed is for mailing your order to us and does not require any postage. We pay postage at this end.

ORDERS LESS THAN \$1.00. We cannot afford to fill orders for less amount than one dollar, unless, in addition to amount for plants wanted, ten cents is sent. This does not apply to Seed orders.

TERMS. All small orders for nursery stock calling for trees of three or four foot sizes or smaller, will be sent prepaid by parcel post, when remittance has been sent with order. Large orders and orders calling for larger trees will be sent express or freight, collect. C. O. D. orders must be accompanied by one-fourth cash, transportation charges paid by customer.

ORNAMENTAL SHRUBS

Strong Rooted-Well Branched, Utah Grown, Hardy, Acclimated, and Honestly Described.

Note: The branches of the newly planted shrubs should be pruned back about one half their length. The plant will become established quicker and make a much more vigorous growth by doing so.

ACANTHOPANAX PENTAPHYLLUM (Five Leaved Aralia). A five-leaved shrub, very desirable for shady places where other shrubs will not thrive. In time will grow into a small tree. Produces greenish white flowers in long umbels. **2 to 3 feet, 85c; 3 to 4 feet, \$1.00.**

ACER GINNALA (Amur Maple). A large shrub growing to 15 feet. Foliage turns bright red in autumn. In our climate a good substitute for Japanese Maple. **2 to 3 feet, \$1.00; 3 to 4 feet, \$1.25.**

ALMOND. (See Prunus, page 6).

ALTHEA. (See Hibiscus, page 5).

AMELANCHIER CANADENSIS. Grows ten to fifteen feet and produces attractive white flowers early spring, followed by red fruit. Edible. Attractive to birds. **2 to 3 feet, \$1.00; 3 to 4 feet, \$1.25.**

AMORPHA FRUTICOSA (Indigobush). Large spreading shrub growing to 8 feet tall. Produces slender spikes of deep violet-blue flowers in June after the flowers of most shrubs have faded. **3 to 4 feet, 75c; 4 to 5 feet, \$1.00.**

ARALIA SPINOSA (Devils-Walkingstick). A tree-like shrub growing to 12 feet in height with very prickly stems and immense panicles of white flowers in August, followed by attractive black fruit. An odd, tropical looking plant. **2 to 3 feet, 85c; 3 to 4 feet, \$1.00.**

ARONIA ARBUTIFOLIA (Red Chokeberry). A handsome shrub growing from 3 to 4 feet high with bright green leaves which are wooly beneath and turn to brilliant shades of yellow and red in autumn. Bears handsome white flowers followed by bright red berries clinging until late winter. **2 to 3 feet, 85c; 3 to 4 feet, \$1.00.**

ARONIA MELANOCARPA (Black Chokeberry). Similar to the preceding variety except that the berries are black and the leaves are quite smooth on the under side. **2 to 3 feet, 85c; 3 to 4 feet, \$1.00.**

BARBERRY. (See Berberis).

BERBERIS ILICIFOLIA. (See Evergreens).

BERBERIS THUNBERGI (Japanese Barbery). Dwarf growing, uniformly bushy and rounded in form, with small, numerous leaves densely covering the thorny twigs. Susceptible to formal pruning. Used extensively as a filler, for edging shrubby groups, and as a compact, impassable, hardy, low hedge. The autumn foliage is scarlet or bronze and the branches are studded with crimson fruits. **12 to 15 inches, 25c; 15 to 18 inches, 35c; 18 to 24 inches, 50c; 2 to 3 feet, 65c.**

BERBERIS THUNBERGI ATROPURPUREA (NEW Red Leaved Barbery). An exact reproduction of the Japanese barbery in every way except that its leaves are a warm bronzy red all through the season. A sunny exposure is necessary to bring out and retain its full red color. **1 year plants, 75c; 2 year plants, \$1.00.**

BERBERIS VULGARIS ATROPURPUREA (Purple Barbery). An attractive upright shrub growing to 5 or 6 feet in height. Attractive for its beautiful purple foliage and red berries. **2 to 3 feet, 85c; 3 to 4 feet, \$1.00.**

BERBERIS WILSONAE. (See Evergreens).

BUDDLEIA DAVIDI MAGNIFICA (Butterflybush). A shrub-like perennial, dying to the ground in winter. Produces quantities of spikes of lovely lavender, lilac-like flowers with deep orange eye. Begins blooming in August and continues until frost. **1 year plants, 50c; 2 year plants, 65c; 3 year plants, 75c.**

BUDDLEIA VEITCHIANA. A rare dark purple type of the Butterfly Bush. **2 year No. 1, \$1.25 each.**

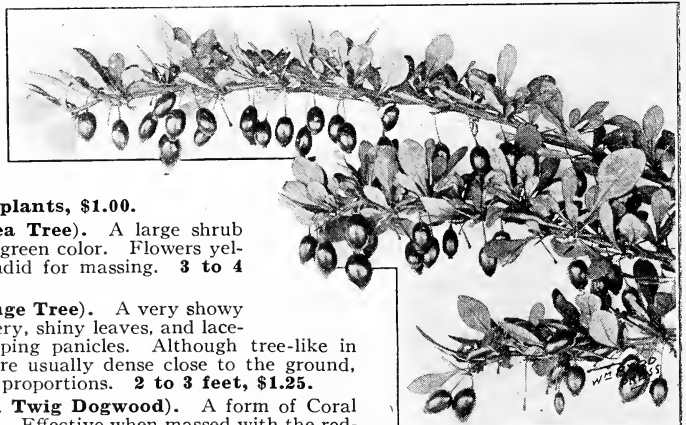
CARYOPTERIS INCANA (Blue Spirea).

A shrub-like perennial growing 2 to 3 feet high. From September until frost the stems are covered full length with attractive umbels of lavender blue. Not entirely hardy in all locations so should be planted in protected situations. **2 year plants, \$1.00.**

CARAGANA ARBORESCENS (Siberian Pea Tree). A large shrub or small tree with beautiful leaves of bright green color. Flowers yellow, in small clusters in late spring. Splendid for massing. **3 to 4 feet, 75c; 4 to 5 feet, 85c.**

CHIONANTHUS VIRGINICA (White Fringe Tree). A very showy shrub, growing to large size; with large leathery, shiny leaves, and lace-like white flowers borne in gracefully drooping panicles. Although tree-like in character, the branches and heavy foliage are usually dense close to the ground, making a broad and rounded bush of noble proportions. **2 to 3 feet, \$1.25.**

CORNUS STOLONIFERA LUTEA (Golden Twig Dogwood). A form of Coral Dogwood, having yellow branches and canes. Effective when massed with the red-stemmed variety. **2 to 3 feet, 60c; 3 to 4 feet, 75c; 4 to 5 feet, 85c.**

CORNUS SIBIRICA (Coral Dogwood). A favorite shrub because of the intensely bright red bark on its twigs and canes during the winter months. Very hardy, and the most popular of the dogwoods. 2 to 3 feet, 60c; 3 to 4 feet, 75c; 4 to 5 feet, 85c.

COTONEASTER ACUTIFOLIA (Peking Cotoneaster). Medium tall, upright shrub with small, oval, lustrous leaves. Profuse bloomer; flowers followed by black berries. 2 to 3 feet, \$1.00; 3 to 4 feet, \$1.25.

COTONEASTER FRANCHETI (Franchet Cotoneaster). Red berries; graceful curving branches. Holds its leaves well in winter. Attains 6 feet if untrimmed. Not absolutely hardy. Plant only in protected locations. 2 to 3 feet, \$1.50; 3 to 4 feet, \$1.75.

CYDONIA JAPONICA (Flowering Quince). A popular door-yard shrub growing from 3 to 6 feet high. The scarlet flowers appear before the leaves giving a brilliant glow to the bush even from a distance. Excellent as shrubs, or as a hedge. 2 to 3 feet, 75c; 3 to 4 feet, 85c.

DESMODIUM PENDULIFLORUM. A shrub which dies to the ground in winter, but comes up vigorously in spring, throwing up shoots 3 to 4 feet high, which bear during September attractive sprays of bright rose colored pea-shaped flowers. 2 year plants, 75c; 3 year plants, \$1.00.

DEUTZIA GRACILIS (Slender Deutzia). Dwarfest growing of the Deutzias, dense, bushy; its drooping branches wreathed with pure white flowers in May. An excellent edging shrub, particularly attractive when studded with its covering crop of bead-like buds. Does very well in shade. 15 to 18 inches, 60c; 18 to 24 inches, 75c; 2 to 3 feet, \$1.00.

DEUTZIA SCABRA (Pride of Rochester). Grows 6 to 8 feet high; and blooms in May. Flowers large and free, double white. 2 to 3 feet, 75c; 3 to 4 feet, 85c.

DEUTZIA SCABRA ROSEA. Similar to the above but with rose colored flowers. 2 to 3 feet, \$1.00.

ELDER. (See Sambucus).

EUONYMUS ALATUS (Winged Euonymus). A shrub different in character from others, having an individuality of its own. It is particularly ornamental and interesting on account of its curious corky bark. The small flowers of the spring are followed by attractive red berries in the fall. It is also valuable on account of its bright scarlet autumn foliage which make it very conspicuous in the fall. 18 to 24 inches, \$1.50; 2 to 3 feet, \$1.75.

EUONYMUS AMERICANUS (Brook Euonymus). Grows from 3 to 7 feet tall. Blossoms reddish green. Fruit a brilliant pink and scarlet. A good shrub for damp locations. 18 to 24 inches, \$1.25; 2 to 3 feet, \$1.50.

EUONYMUS EUROPAEUS (European Burningbush). Small tree with brilliant yellow and scarlet fruit in autumn completely covering the tree. 18 to 24 inches, \$1.50; 2 to 3 feet, \$1.75.

EXOCHORDA GRANDIFLORA (Common Pearlbrush). A medium-sized shrub bearing white flowers in slender racemes in early spring; very graceful; useful for cut flowers. 2 to 3 feet, 75c; 3 to 4 feet, 85c.

FORSYTHIA SUSPENS (Weeping Forsythia). The Forsythias are the most showy shrubs of their season to bloom, which is in early April. The Forsythia Suspensa, with its pendulous branches of golden blossoms, is fine whenever a drooping effect is desired. 2 to 3 feet, 75c; 3 to 4 feet, 85c.

FORSYTHIA SUSPENS FORTUNEI (Fortune Forsythia). Similar to the type, except that it has an upright growth, sometimes attaining a height of six or eight feet. 2 to 3 feet, 60c; 3 to 4 feet, 75c.

FRINGE. (See Rhus cotinus, purple; Chionanthus virginica, white).

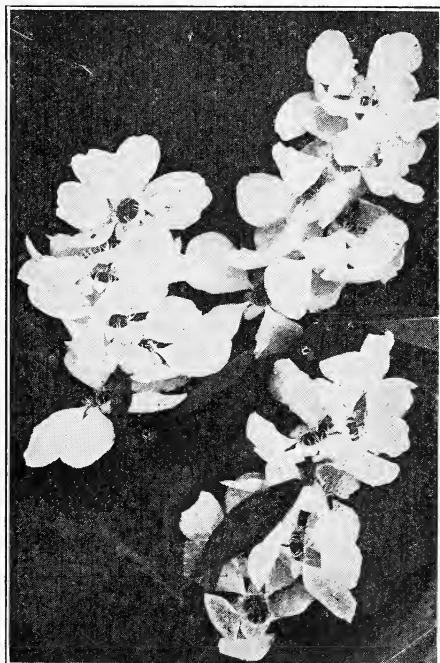
HIBISCUS SYRIACUS (Shrub Althea or Rose of Sharon). Blooms late in August and September, with a profusion of large and brightly colored flowers much like the tender Hibiscus in form. These are the color spots of fall, as Lilacs and Weigelias are of spring. The late appearing foliage is extra good and valuable for its beauty alone. Planted compactly and occasionally pruned, they are both serviceable and showy as hedges. Should not be planted in very cold northern sections. Can be supplied in the following colors: Double Rose, Double White, Double Purple, Double Red. 2 to 3 feet, 75c; 3 to 4 feet, \$1.00.

HONEYSUCKLE. (See Lonicera).

HYDRANGEA ARBORESCENS GRANDIFLORA (Hills of Snow Hydrangea). A new variety, bearing flat heads of white in late June and July and continuing throughout the season. Foliage clean and ornamental. The most adaptable hydrangea to our climate. Requires more care than most other kinds of shrubs. 2 to 3 feet, \$1.00.

HYDRANGEA PANICULATA GRANDIFLORA (Peegee Hydrangea). Unexcelled for a profusion of bloom through August and September. The large panicles of white slowly change to red. Do not plant this variety unless you know how to grow it. 2 to 3 feet, \$1.00.

KERRIA JAPONICA (Kerria). A handsome green-leaved shrub, growing 4 to 5 feet. Graceful, slender, drooping branches, painted with a wealth of rich dark yellow flowers in June, and to some extent all summer. 18 to 24 inches, 85c; 2 to 3 feet, \$1.00; 3 to 4 feet, \$1.25.

LONICERA MORROWI (Morrow Honeysuckle). Dense, wide-flung branches constituting a rounded bush seldom above 8 feet. The small bloom is creamy white, quite showy; but the blood-red berries which follow, furnish the most thrilling spectacle among summer-fruited shrubs. 2 to 3 feet, 75c; 3 to 4 feet, 85c.

LONICERA TATARICA (Tatarian Honeysuckle). extensively used of the older varieties of bush honeysuckle. There are a number of varieties, some having flowers of distinctly reddish hue, some pink and some white. All bloom very freely and in mid-summer carry loads of brilliant colored berries, usually of bright red. We can supply Tatarian Honeysuckles with pink, red, or white flowers. 2 to 3 feet, 75c; 3 to 4 feet, 85c.

PHILADELPHUS CORONARIUS (Sweet Mockorange). The old-fashioned sweet-smelling "Syringa." Pure white blossoms in July. Tall growing. 2 to 3 feet, 60c; 3 to 4 feet, 75c; 4 to 5 feet, 85c.

PHILADELPHUS GRANDIFLORUS (Big Scentless Mockorange). A vigorous shrub, producing large, pure white flowers similar to the following variety. Very showy. 2 to 3 feet, 60c; 3 to 4 feet, 75c; 4 to 5 feet, 85c.

PHILADELPHUS LEMOINEI (Lemoine Mockorange). A medium tall hybrid form of this excellent shrub. 18 to 24 inches, 75c; 2 to 3 feet, \$1.00.

PHILADELPHUS VIRGINAL (Virginal Mockorange). Of recent introduction, this is one of the most beautiful flowering shrubs in cultivation. Its blossoms are snow-white, semi-double, 2 to 3 inches across, very fragrant and produced in the greatest profusion. When it becomes better known, this will be an exceedingly popular shrub. 18 to 24 inches, \$1.00; 2 to 3 feet, \$1.25.

PRIVET. (See *Ligustrum*).

PRUNUS GLANDULOSA (Flowering Almond). Early spring flowering shrubs, gaily in full bloom before the leaves appear, with beautiful double flowers, snuggling tight to the twigs. Can be supplied in pink or white. 18 to 24 inches, 75c; 2 to 3 feet, \$1.00; 3 to 4 feet, \$1.25.

PRUNUS PISSARDI (Purpleleaf Plum). Showy purple leaves that deepen in color to the end of the season. A small, round topped tree, with white, single flowers in spring. 2 to 3 feet, \$1.25; 3 to 4 feet, \$1.50; 4 to 6 feet, \$2.50.

PRUNUS TRILOBA (Flowering Plum). Very early in spring, before its leaves appear, the small tree is decked in a fleecy cloud of very double light pink blossoms. 2 to 3 feet, \$1.00; 3 to 4 feet, \$1.25; 4 to 5 feet, \$1.50.

LIGUSTRUM AMURENSE (Amoor River Privet). A very hardy northern grown type, vigorously upright and tall growing. The leaves are dark green, somewhat lustrous, tardily deciduous. Makes a strong, bold hedge with quite conspicuous bloom in erect white panicles. 18 to 24 inches, \$22.50 per 100; 2 to 3 feet, \$25.00 per 100.

LIGUSTRUM IBOTA (Ibota Privet). Makes up into striking tall clumps; or informal screening hedges, with widespread curving branches; vigorous and hardy. The foliage is grayish green; fragrant white flower plumes in June, followed by persisting blue-black berries. 18 to 24 inches, 50c; 2 to 3 feet, 60c.

LIGUSTRUM LODENSE (Lowdense Privet). A hardy dwarf variety growing very dense. Can be trimmed in a hedge form as low as 8 inches. If left untrimmed will not grow over 2 to 3 feet high. 2 year, \$3.00 per 10; \$25.00 per 100; 3 year, \$4.00 per 10, \$35.00 per 100.

LIGUSTRUM OVALIFOLIUM (California Privet). Quick growing, straight, densely clothed shoots; the foliage in precise arrangement, a dark shiny green. The handsomest and most generally used of the entire group for hedging, clipped specimens, or for massing, but unfortunately not reliably hardy in the coldest situations. 18 to 24 inches, \$12.50; 2 to 3 feet, \$15.00.

LIGUSTRUM REGELIANUM (Regal Privet). A strong, very hardy type with dark shiny leaves. The numerous branches are stiff, twiggy and horizontally spreading, gracefully drooping at the ends. Makes a naturally wide, dense bush particularly adaptable to foundation plantings. 2 to 3 feet, 75c; 3 to 4 feet, 85c.

LILACS. (See *Syringa*).

LONICERA FRAGRANTISSIMA (Winter Honeysuckle). A favorite landscape type of lagging development up to 8 feet. Distinguished by its small, round, leathery leaves, showing the darkest shade of green, which are practically evergreen if in a sheltered position. Also its very early clusters of tiny pink and white flowers are sweetly fragrant, their scent even clinging to wood and foliage. 2 to 3 feet, 75c; 3 to 4 feet, 85c.

PHYSOCARPUS OPULIFOLIUS (Common Ninebark). A strong growing shrub bearing a great array of white flowers in clusters along the branches, followed by brightly colored seed pods that are very showy. A splendid shrub for mass planting, borders, screens, and similar uses. 2 to 3 feet, 75c; 3 to 4 feet, 85c.

RHAMNUS CATHARTICA (Buckthorn). A dense twiggy bush, 6 to 10 feet high, with dark foliage relieved by masses of midsummer white flowers. Makes a good, prunable hedge. 2 to 3 feet, 60c; 3 to 4 feet, 75c.

RHAMNUS FRANGULA (Glossy Buckthorn). A large shrub with numerous leafy branches. Leaves dark green, paler beneath, fading with tones of yellow, orange and red. Berries change from red to black. 2 to 3 feet, 60c; 3 to 4 feet, 75c.

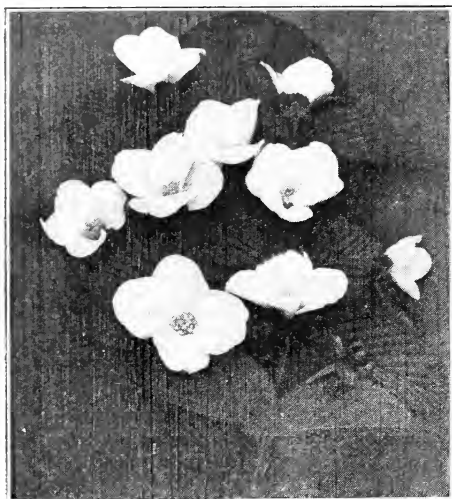

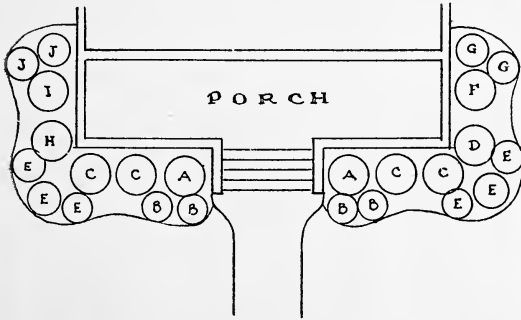

SYRINGA VILLOSA (Late Lilac). Pinkish flowers in long broad panicles in May or June. 2 to 3 feet, 75c; 3 to 4 feet, \$1.00; 4 to 5 feet, \$1.25.

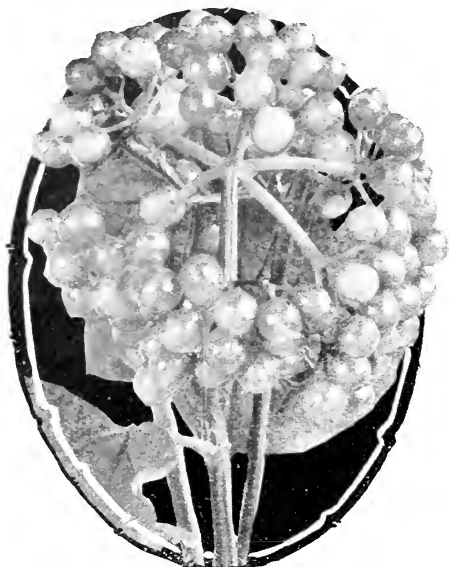

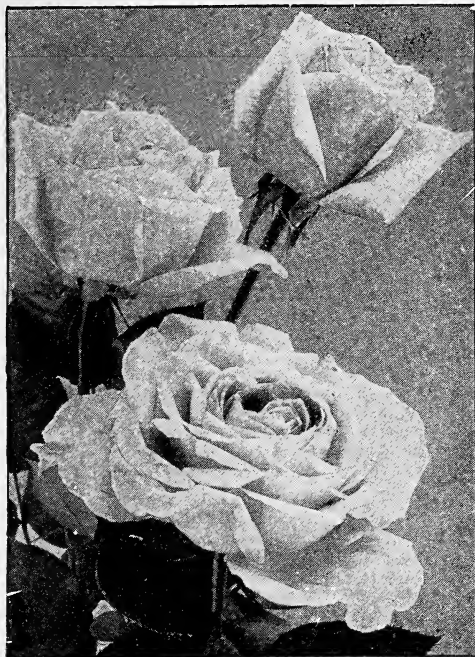

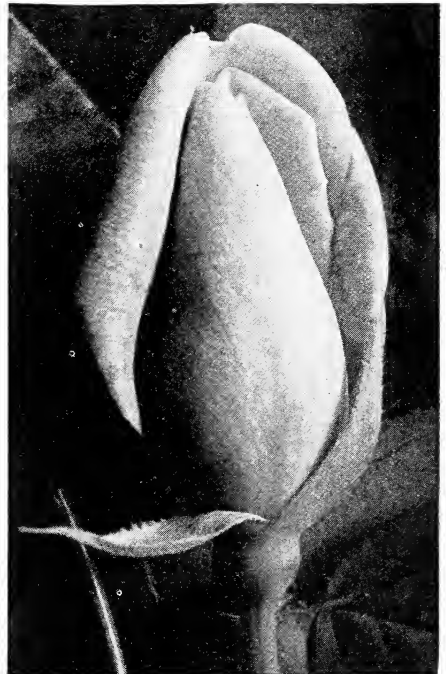

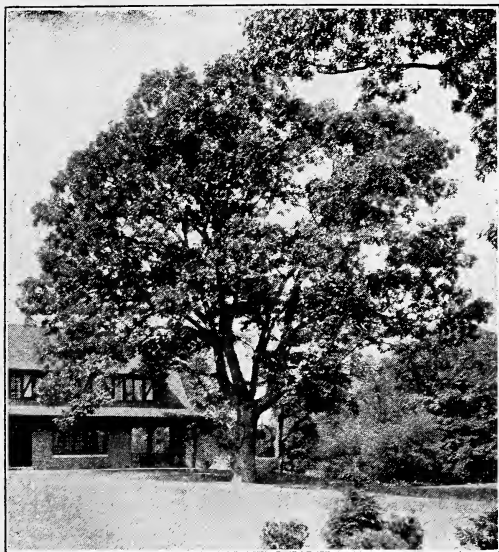

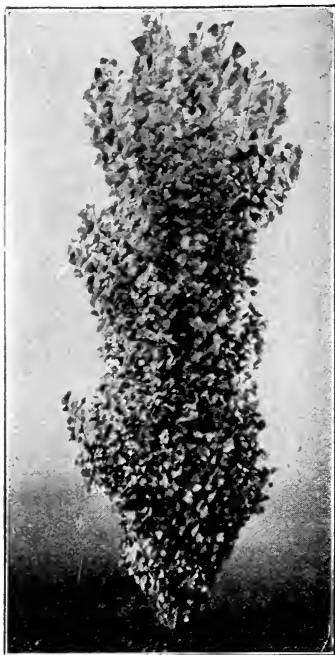

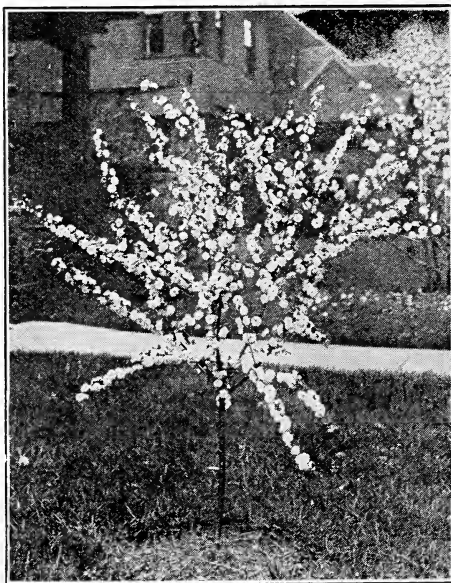

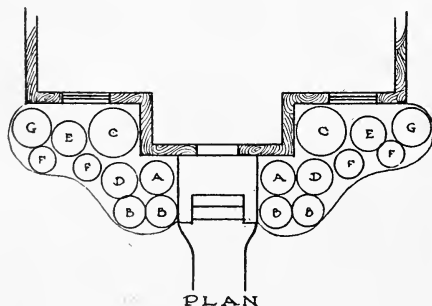

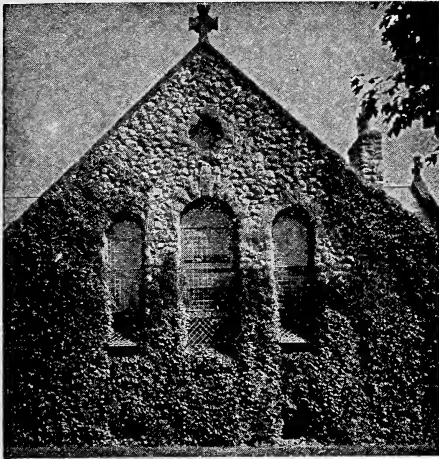

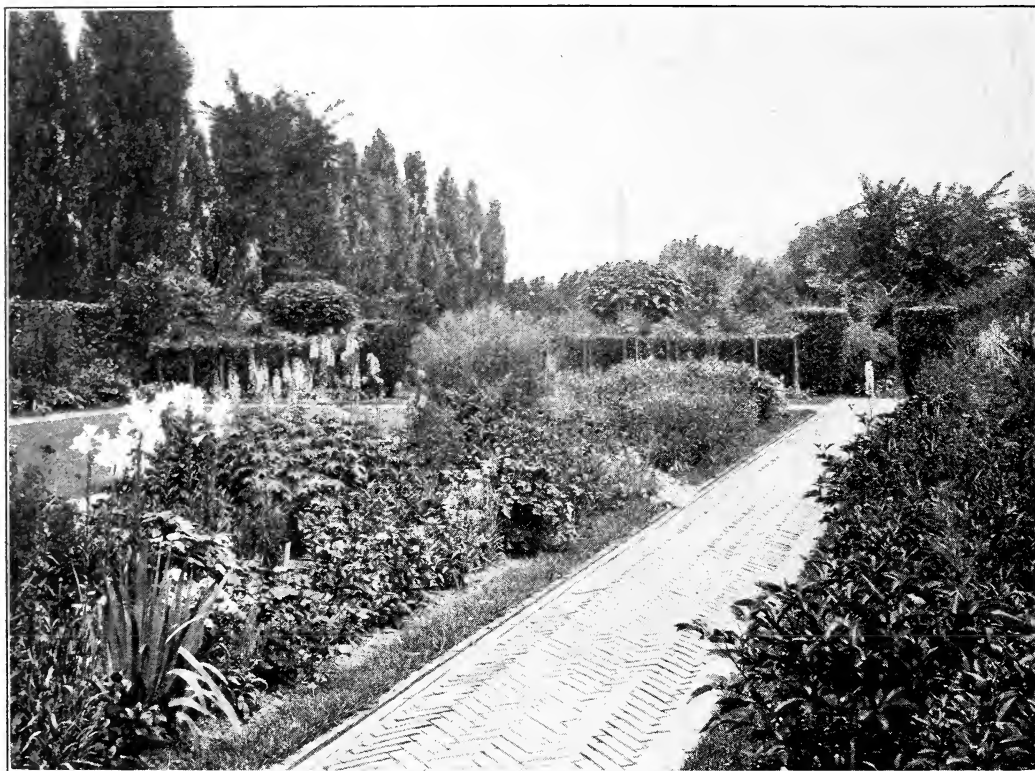

Waterlilies Easy to Grow

IN TUBS OR IN POOLS

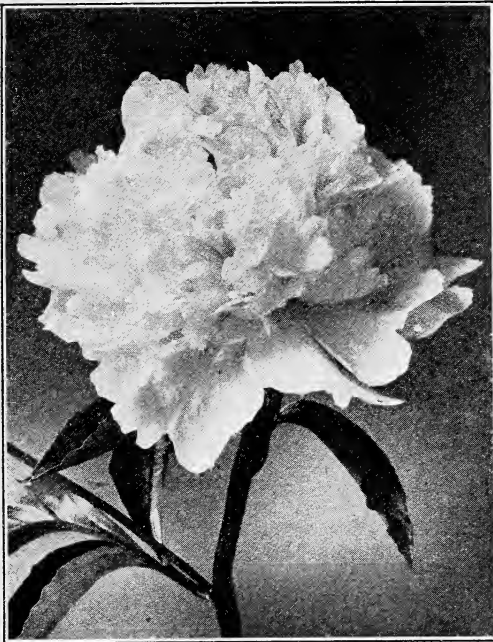
There is a lure about waterlilies which makes them one of the most fascinating flowers to plant. Few people realize how beautiful waterlilies are or how easy they are to grow. The water garden requires no weeding, no hoeing, no watering. Simply plant the lilies and watch them grow. The tub garden is the simplest water garden of all to have, and yet one of the most interesting. Any container such as a tub or half barrel is suitable to use and in it you may grow and enjoy waterlilies and other aquatics. Usually it is best to sink the tub in the ground. Then you can plant other flowering plants around the edge of it and altogether have a perfect garden in a very small area. When rocks are available it always adds to the attractiveness of the tub garden to place a few around the outside of the pool and plant rock-loving plants between them.

We handle only the hardy varieties. These are perennial but they will not stand freezing. Plant them in a pail, using very rich soil, the richer the better. We use one-third well rotted cow manure and two-thirds rich garden soil. Bone Meal may be substituted for cow manure, one quart to a bushel of soil. Place the tuber in the soil until only the crown from which the leaves start, protrudes. Weight the tuber down with a few stones so that it will not float, and sink your pail in the pool. The water should cover the crown one foot.

In winter, store the pails in a cool basement or cellar. The lilies multiply rapidly and should be divided every three years.

Lawn Grass Seed

EASY WAY TO MAKE AND KEEP A BEAUTIFUL LAWN



The production of a good lawn is not at all difficult if you follow these instructions:

(1) Dig the soil about 6 inches deep, but only when it is dry. If rain has fallen recently, allow a few days of fine weather to elapse before commencing work.

(2) As you dig, lift each clod high enough to enable you to turn it completely over.

(3) Strike the inverted clod with the back of the fork to break it.

(4) As the work proceeds, remove all stones, sticks and rubbish.

(5) Scatter bone meal or pulverized sheep manure on the dug earth. Use one pound to each 25 square feet.

(6) Draw a rake back and forth until the soil is smooth and in fine condition.

(7) Sow WASATCH LAWN MIXTURE at the rate of one pound to from 100 to 200 square feet. Select a day when no wind is blowing. When you have sown the seed,

rake the land once more but very lightly. Do not work the rake back and forth, merely draw it toward you in a series of light strokes, raking only once in the same place.

The idea is to bury most of the grass seeds no more than one-eighth of an inch deep.

(8) Roll the seeded area, but should rain fall before the work is completed, do not roll until the land has dried. By following these instructions, having fairly good soil and favorable conditions, the young seedlings show through in less than 10 days and the whole area looks green in two or three weeks.

As soon as the young grass is 2 inches high, begin cutting it and mow it regularly. Roll it at least once a week and water during dry weather. Our WASATCH LAWN MIXTURE is as free from weeds as modern machinery can make it. All soils, however, contain seed of weeds, some of them more than others, and many of these will grow along with the grass. Close cutting eventually will kill most of them.

(9) Be sure to keep the ground damp until the grass is well up. A light sprinkling every hour is better than a heavy one which may wash out the seed.

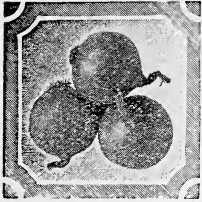

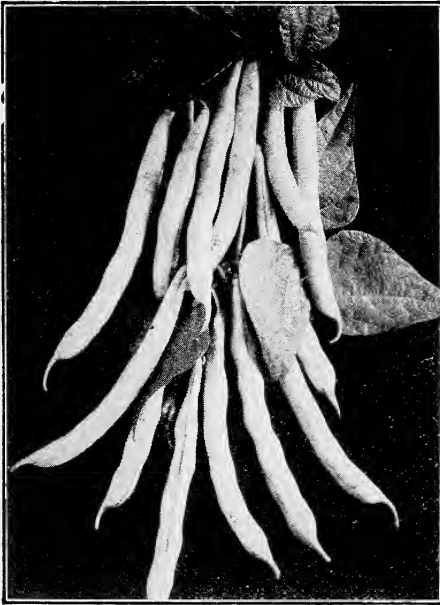

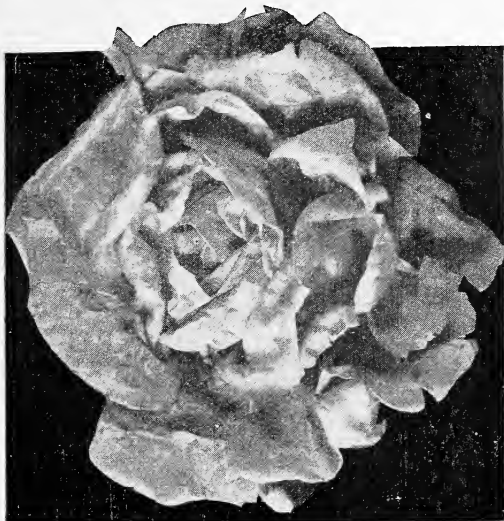

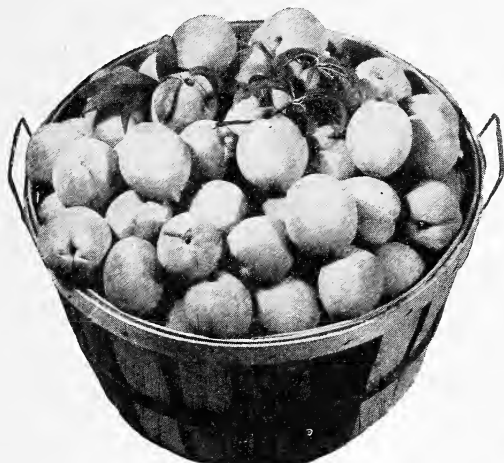
