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

SECTION ONE_WHITE IRIS Color Group One WHITE SELF

Even white Iris are not just white: they may be blue

toned, or pink-flushed, or creamy, or silvery white.

The bluish white Iris appear best when planted near the blues of deeper shade, the creamy white near the brown and bronzy toned, and the pink-flushed blend nicely into those of rosies hue.

To me, all white Iris are reminiscent of white lilies, especially so, the stately Taj Mahal. Of much easier cultivation, they take the place of lilies in our borders very

satisfactorily.

Color Group Two

WHITE, FRILLED, SANDED, DOTTED

In the garden generally, most of the Iris in this group give quite the effect of white Iris. Adding greatly to their interest they are distinguished by delicate touches of color daintily applied in various effects, frilled, peppered, sanded or flushed. Until San Francisco becomes more plentyful, we may well be happy with the beautiful True Charm. is large, free flowering, vigorous and extremely hardy, also fragrant. The Sass Iris are simply exquisite, and known the world over as the finest in this group.

> Color Group Three WHITE BI-COLORS

In most of this group the contrast of standards and falls is sharp and clear. With standards of white, or flushed very lightly the color of the dark falls, these Iris blend gradually in the garden picture. Yet they are more adapted to close study and enjoyment, than for color effect in the garden. Mildred Presby is perhaps the outstanding favorite, and B. Y. Morrison entirely different from all others.

> SECTION TWO_BLUE IRIS Color Group Four LIGHT LAVENDER BLUE

Of all the colors in which this flower blooms, the Iris seems to have adopted blue as its very own. Of all the shades of blue, perhaps those the most ethereal are found in this blue pale lavender group. Points of interest are yielded by diversity in form, artistic gradation of color tone, iridescent texture, sparkling lustrous finish, and all the airy gracefulness of butterflies. Some of the most outstanding and typical of this group are Bandolerro, Claridad, Mary Barnett, Jacquelline, and Santa Barbara. El Captain has all the majestic bearing of a soldier at attention.

Color Group Five MEDIUM LAVENDER BLUE

No where in the blue or in the red section is it intended to draw the color lines closely. This group of medium shades, as those in group eight in the red section are most useful in providing a graduation of color. Some are nearly light enough to step into the foregoing group, some are almost dark enough to be included in the darkest group following. Mary Orth appeals as a voluptuous beauty.

Color Group Six-DEEP BLUE PURPLE

In this group we find color and quality indicative of Dominion parentage. The Dominion Seedlings, also those of Mme Gaudichou, are noted for their wonderfully beautiful falls with the substance of soft deep velvet and luxurious plush. It seems the tempermental habits of growth of the old Dominion have been entirely bred out and these newer, finer Iris have all the advantage of size and color besides being vigorous and perfectly hardy. Some of the shades are dark and gloomy like sunless Winter days. Some have a metallic brilliance like the fringe on stormy clouds in Summer skies, some are soft and dull like twilight shadows. For contrast, and to relieve the heavy shadowy colors, lighter brighter Iris should be planted with these. The ratings would indicate the generally high values yet all make wonderfully deep mass effects.

SECTION THREE—RED IRIS Color Group Seven

LIGHT LAVENDER PINK

In their efforts to obtain a true pink color, the modern Hybridists have given us many beautiful Iris. Though the old Dream may still be the color queen of this group there are many newer Iris variously described as soft rose, lilac pink, lavender violet etc. that answer the purpose of real pink most satisfactorily in the garden requirements of the ordinary flower lover. The pale shrimp pink of Marquisette provides a distinctly new color tone. There are in this group many exquisite shades and beautiful blends. The light shade of dacing shadows cast by some friendly tree notoo near by, is useful for them all in keeping the too hot sun from fading the delicate colors.

Color Group Eight MEDIUM DEEP RED PURPLE

Any one confronted unexpectedly, or for the first time, with an exhibition of the Iris in this group is tempted either to an extravagant use of superlative adjectives or surprised into utter speechlessness. Those flower lovers who have not yet made the acquaintance of the Modern Iris are much to be envied—they have such a wonderful treat in store.

Frieda Mohr is perhaps the outstanding queen of this group. Aphrodite and Evadne produce distinct and different color effect. Raiput has most distinct garden value in an unusual bright heliotrope violet shade and texture of a quality that is actually luminous.

Color Group Nine DARK RED PURPLE

The truly bright red Iris, according to the spectrum, has so far eluded the patient Hybridist. Yet each year's introductions include some red toned varieties that add much of interest to this group. Of them all, these are the most gorgeously arrayed, some in richly glistening silks, many with falls of luxurious, deep, soft velvet in shades of wine, coppery red, and crimson brown. Hidden in style branch, claw and haft can be found the most delicate shadings, the most intricate markings, veins, dots, flushes and blends, that would delight and intrigue the soul of an artist. Scattered glints of gold and amber and bronze, lose much of interest when viewed in the glare of the hot noonday sun yet burst into brilliance in the softer light of early morning and late afternoon. Morning Splendor, the famous prize winner and many other fine red Iris are now so reasonably priced that all may have them.

SECTION FOUR—YELLOW IRIS Color Group Ten

YELLOW SELFS, LIGHT AND DARK

As a slanting ray of sunshine illuminates a dark corner, so the yellow Iris adds brilliance to an Iris planting. Many Iris, of whatever color, have hidden inside, or suffused in style or haft, a bit of yellow. Be this of palest amber, or of gleaming gold, or bronze, it requires but the bloom nearby of a yellow Iris to emphasize these hidden glints and make the whole planting fairly scintillate.

With Coronation perhaps the most outstanding, our list in this group, though short, presents a selection of the

very best.

Color Group Eleven YELLOW BICOLORS AND BLENDS

If there is in your garden plot a dull and ugly spot, that you have sought in vain to brighten, there is nothing in a long list of fine Iris half so effective as a well grown clump of some fine variegata, or yellow bicolor. They seem to reflect the tiniest ray of sunshine until a mass of bloom fairly glitters. While in a general way, many of these are similiar, their differences form an interesting study. Lodestar is positively brilliant. There are no more beautiful blends anywhere than those in this group in which yellow predominates.

Color Group Twelve NEUTRAL BLENDS

Bold indeed is the artist who with pen or brush, would attempt to represent the delightfully blended colors in this and some of the other groups. How it would simplify the work of those who would write their descriptions, if all originators could bestow upon their Iris names indicative of their colors, combination, or individual charm and characteristics.

In this, the last group, we wish to include only the neutral blends, those without a predomination of yellow, pink or blue. Those with a strong leaning toward any one color are included in that particular color group. As the delicate beauty of these Iris is lost in the distance, they are best grown near some object of daily use, near a garden seat, or along a walk, that their fine points of interest, especially their beautifully blended colors may be closely observed, studied and admired.

EXPLANATIONS

According to the new rating by the American Iris Society, the first number indicates the Exhibition value, the second the Garden, or Landscape value. In rating, 100 is used as a basis of perfection. Any Iris rating 70 or above is considered good. Few varieties are rated above 90 or 95, as there must always be room at the top for improvements.

The number immediately preceding the variety name indicates the color group to which the variety belongs according to the classification offered.

After the variety name, follows in parenthesis, the name of the originator and the year it was brought before the public. Some of these names are abbreviated as follows: Sturt., Sturtevant; Vilm., Vilmorin; M-M., Mohr-Mitchel; Willmsn., Williamson; G. & K., Goos and Koenemann.

The approximate height of the bloom stalk is then given in inches. This height may be expected to vary under different conditions of climate, culture and soil.

The early (E) and the late (L) blooming varieties are thus indicated. Those varieties not so marked may be expected to bloom generally midseason. A long season of bloom may thus be arrainged for.

If fragrance has been detected it is so stated. S. refers to the standards or three upper petals. F. refers to the falls or three lower petals.

Some Iris always have small Rhizomes, all are larger late in the fall than early in the season. Fall growth is best made in the customers garden after transplanting. We guarantee all plants to be true to name, correctly labeled and in good condition when received. If the Rhizomes are dry when received, they are most likely in good condition. If otherwise, or if not entirely satisfactory, return at once at our expense. Your money will at once be refunded


