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

PLANTING DIRECTIONS

So that the seeds will germinate readily and the plants grow and flower to perfection, attention should be paid to the soil conditions and especially if small seeds are sown. The ground should be worked up well and if the soil is heavy lightened up with well rotted manure or sandy loam. If this is not done the soil is apt to become hardened or baked before the tender plants get large enough to take care of themselves. Small seeds must not be planted deep and most flower seeds germinate better if planted near the surface. Sweet peas, sunflowers, beans and some of the larger seeds can be planted fairly deep.

HANDLING NURSERY STOCK

Plant just as soon as possible after receiving the shipment. Do not expose the roots to the wind or sun. A very good way to handle this is to unwrap and untie the bundle and cover the roots with moist dirt and draw each tree or shrub out as you are ready to plant it. Here is a good illustration how to plant and handle your nursery stock.



Hedge Plants

There is no planting that so emphasizes distinction as a nice, well kept hedge. For landscaping it is effective and is useful for dividing lines, screens, shutting off an undesirable view and lends an air of seclusion.

Set plants from 12 to 18 inches apart in the row. When plants are set, cut back to about three inches of the ground. The following year trim back to about six inches and the third year to within nine inches and one foot. This will give the base a chance to thicken up, which is necessary to make a compact, good appearing hedge. Many make the mistake of waiting too long before trimming back.
