REASONS FOR SWEET CLOVER'S VALUE: First—A Great Pasture Crop. eading Wisconsin farmers are Leading very enthusiastic now over sweet

very enthusiastic now over sweet clover as a pasture crop. This past summer when the ordinary blue grass pastures were all dried up sweet clover kept right on growing and furnished wonderful pasture right through the drouth period. "Cows on Sweet Clover produce a splendid flow of milk."—Wis-consin Bulletin No. 178. It makes more feed per acre than

the common permanent partures. Second—Easily Grown. It grows readily on most all soils and good stands can often be secured where

red clover and alfalfa fail entirely. Third—Prepares for Alfalfa. It has the same sort of bacteria laden nodules as alfalfa and inoculates

CULTURE. Sweet Clover is best sown in the spring with one bushel of extra early oats or barley per acre as nurse crop. Sweet Clover can also be sown successfully in June or July without a nurse crop or in corn at the last cultiva-tion. A hand seeder like the "Cyclone," offered on page 89, can be used to good advantage where the seed is sown alone. Fifteen Pounds of Seed per Acre is usually sufficient, a little less for Grundy County as the seed is smaller. Inocu late the seed before sowing with Nitragin. See page 5. Use lime if your soil is sour. Be sure to have a good seed bed. Most any well-drained soil is all right for Sweet Clover and you will be pleased with the crop if you do your part in putting it in and handling it right. Ask for Wisconsin Bulletin No. 178. 
















Tom Thumb Pop Corn.

Head lettuce should be started either in cold frames and transplanted in the open or sown in about the same manner as the loose leaf. The plants should be thinned to about 12 inches apart. It is necessary to have cool weather for lettuce to head up well and the earlier the plants can be started in the field the surer you are of a crop. Head lettuce can be again planted in the fall and will head up well during

the cool fall days.



Many people insist on planting winter radishes in the spring the same as other radishes. This will not do. They should not be planted until July or if the weather is very dry, better wait until August. better wait until August.

Winter radishes are good to eat as soon as they are large enough. The flavor is as good or better than spring radish-es and they are much larger in size. For win-ter use, dig them and pack them in earth the same as parsnips, salsify, or celery.





HINTS TO GLADIOLUS GROWERS.

Gladiolus bulbs must have food in order to produce healthy blooms. Too much nitrogen in the soil will produce an excessive leaf and stem growth and the flowers will be in-ferior in size and beauty. To offset this condition it is necessary to use a plant food containing a relatively high percentage of potash. Vigoro contains just the right amount of potash for Gladioli and we recom-mend using this fertilizer. See mend u page 92.
