

Our Responsibility: While we pay particular attention and exercise the greatest care to have our plants genuine and true to name or description, we do not give any warranty, expressed or implied, or guarantee them to live and grow or give specific results. In case of any error on our part, it is mutually agreed between the purchaser and ourselves that we shall not be held responsible for a greater amount than the original price of the goods.

Complaints: All errors and omissions in the execution of orders will be properly adjusted, if we are notified immediately upon receipt of the goods. Please write at once.

Transportation Rules: All plants ordered are fresh dug and travel at the purchasers' risk. We do not guarantee safe delivery. Our responsibility ceases when we make delivery to the transportation company or on the purchaser's grounds. Therefore, any claims should be made promptly to the agent at the point of delivery. We ship all plants by express. If shipping by parcel post is required, this must be especially and plainly stated. If possible, will send shipment C. O. D.

Special and Fast Deliveries to Points on Long Island, etc. To all points on Long Island, in New York City, Brooklyn, Bronx, Westchester, Coast of Connecticut (opposite Long Island Sound), we are making special deliveries with our fast trucks at cost, thus saving our customers extra cost of packing. 4th. Plants are well packed and will reach you in fine condition. If reported at once, we will duplicate shipment; have express agent note condition on your receipt and mail to us.

5th. All orders have a government certificate attached, attesting they are free from all insects and diseases.

6th. Order early so we can give you the best kind of service, first selection of stock, and avoid the congestion of orders in April.

HOW TO GET TO RAINBOW NURSERY

How to get to Rainbow Nursery. (See map). Take Route 25, Jericho Turnpike, to Commack, turn north on concrete road near Dugan's bakery, turn left on Cedar street, the second cross road from Jericho. Nursery is on the next corner, about 1-2 mile.

From Connecticut, take boat at Stamford to Northport. Go to East Northport, cross R. R. track, follow south on concrete road, Larkfield avenue, to first stoplight overhead. Turn right, (7th avenue), keep on to end of road, turn left, follow 1 mile to 3rd corner, left hand, which is the Rainbow Nurgery.
