EVERY GARDEN LOVER wants to win in his local flower show. There is a late Summer or Fall Show in almost every American community nowadays.

GLADIOLI and DAHLIAS make up the big competitive classes. A blue ribbon in either section is something of which to be proud.

GOOD VARIETIES will bring the ribbons. They must be well grown, of course, but the same amount of care put on varieties less suited to the show room will not win.

EVERY FLOWER GARDEN, large or small, should contain Gladflowers. There are so few flowers more valuable in mid-season than the Gladioli; their uses are so unlimited. Embodying as they do all the prismatic hues and tints of the rainbow, the Gladioli in its numberless harmonious combinations is equally desirable in the garden, the house, the exhibition, or in any scheme of interior decoration in which flowers are used. As delicately beautiful as the orchid, it imparts a glow of iridescent beauty to its surroundings, adding a note that seems to softly pulsate with its own living luxuriant color. Very attractive and ornamental displays can be created in the garden by planting the bulbs in beds, or groups of twelve or more, from 2 to 3 inches apart, in bunches, here and there in the perennial or annual border. They are particularly showy when planted in the foreground of shrubbery, where they will provide a gorgeous and artistic array of colors.

ANY GARDEN OWNER who has these varieties will be a contender for sweepstake honors in any flower show in the world. You can plant Gladioli anywhere, and at any time up to June 15, with certainty that in due time you will have flowers; whether you have an informal border, or formal beds, there will probably be some spot where a group of ten, twenty, thirty, or more stately glads, of exactly the proper height and color, will give just the right effect at a time when, but for this adaptable flower, interest would be missing.

GLADIOLI will give satisfactory results in any good garden soil. The depth of planting varying with the character of the soil. In light soils 5 to 6 inches deep; heavier soils, 4 to 5 inches deep. They like plenty of air and sunshine under which conditions they will grow to perfection. Cultivate after every rain or watering; keep the surface of the soil loose and open; give the oxygen a chance to get into the soil where things are growing. In cutting the blooms four or more leaves should **ALWAYS BE LEFT UPON THE PLANT**. These are required to nourish and feed the corms (bulbs) that will be your planting stock for next year. Lift the bulbs when the tops have turned brown and store in a cool, dry, frost-proof basement or storage room through the winter.

CAPTAIN BOYNTON—White, flushed with lavender, with maroon blotch on lower petals. A giant prize-winner.

DR. F. E. BENNETT—Deep peach-red overlaid with flame scarlet. Lip speckled ruby and white. Most fiery red imaginable. The flowers are of very large size, many opening at one time, exceptionally well placed on tall stem. Most perfect red under cultivation today.
