A FEW FACTS ABOUT SUMMER SEEDS

Cow Peas Good quality, high germinating peas becoming very scarce, and market advancing. Looks now as though stocks will not be sufficient to cover demand. Government report indicates an increased acreage of approximately 28% over 1930.

Soja Beans With the exception of Biloxi, Otootan, and possibly Laredos, there appears to be ample stocks to cover the requirements. Government report shows 23% increased acreage, and with shortage of Cow Peas, indications are for an active demand for Soja Beans.

Tennessee German Millet Market very firm, and higher prices likely. Being one of our earliest summer hay crops, and a popular crop, we anticipate an even greater shortage of seed than prevailed last year. Be sure and secure the genuine Big Head Tennessee German Millet. Common or Western Millet is of very little value in the East.

Sudan Grass Ample supplies. Owing to the shortage of hay, Sudan Grass will be extensively used throughout the corn belt. This is one of the most valuable hay and summer pasture plants known. Yields heavy crops of leafy, fine-stemmed, nutritious hay, easily cured, and equal in feeding value to timothy.

Sorghum Supplies ample, with the possible exception of the syrup varieties. Use the Early Amber and Orange for forage crops—Sugar Drip and Texas Seeded Ribbon Cane for syrup. The latter two varieties are grown quite extensively in the East for seed, producing good profitable crops.

YOUR GARDEN Don't overlook the important part of the farm. Plantings can be made practically every month of the year, giving a succession of crops that will provide plenty of good, healthful vegetables for your yearly requirements. The advantages may be enumerated as follows:

- It is the richest protein producing grain on the farm.
- It is the richest nitrogenous roughage adapted to most farms.
- It is adapted to many uses and relished by most live stock.
- It is a good emergency hay crop.
- It is adapted to a wider range of soil types.
- Being a legume it has wonderful merits as a soil builder.
- It ranks well as a cash crop.
- It fits well into rotations throughout the corn belt.

The practical value of Soy Beans has been proven conclusively by the rapid increase in acreage devoted to this crop throughout the country. The many varieties, with wide range in maturity, makes this crop adaptable to both long and short growing seasons.

SOJA BEANS—Varieties and Their Uses

VIRGINIA—This is by far the most popular bean (except in the extreme South) where Soja Beans are grown for hay. It produces a tall, slender plant of the vining type, having the advantages of holding its leaves better than most varieties. It is especially suitable for hay, as well as for silage, and is frequently pastured off in corn. Matures in about 125 days.

ILLINI—A new early variety especially adapted for seed production, hogging down, besides making an early hay crop. Holds its seed after ripening very well, and one of the largest producers of grain, yielding as high as 30 bushels per acre. A very good all-purpose Soja Bean, maturing in 105 days.

TOKIO—A late maturing bean, that is fast coming into prominence in the Southern States. The Tokio has the characteristics of being both a heavy hay and seed producing variety, ranking higher in comparative tests in these respects than the Biloxi, Ootootan, Laredo, or Mammoth Yellow. This bean is rapidly gaining in popularity, and should prove an excellent variety to grow for seed production. Matures in about 145 days.

MAMMOTH YELLOW—One of the chief varieties used in the cotton belt, being particularly adapted to their sandy land. An excellent bean to grow for silage, growing 3 to 5 feet tall, stands up well, and also makes a fine hay crop. Matures in 145 days.

LAREDO—One of the finest hay beans for the South. The stems are fine and leaves numerous, which are essentials for the best Soy Bean hay. The Laredo is the easiest of all Soy Beans to cure, because of the fineness of the stems. Owing to the scarcity of Ootootan, Biloxi, as well as Velvet Beans this season, the Laredo will be in very heavy demand. Matures in about 140 days.

MIXED SOJA BEANS—There is quite a distinct advantage in growing Mixed Soja Beans for hay. We include both early and late maturing beans, which is advantageous in that you produce a large tonnage of hay and quite an amount of mature seed in the earlier plants. This combination brings up the protein content of the feed, and besides the crop is more easily cured, as the earlier maturing beans are somewhat drier than the others.

Cows Put On Sudan Grass Give More Milk By DAVE MEEKER, County Agricultural Agent

LIBERTY, MO.—That Sudan Grass is one of the best of summer pastures for dairy cattle for Clay County, Missouri, was recently proven when fifty-seven head of Holstein, Guernsey and Jersey cows in the Belleview dairy herd of Glover & Capps, southwest of Liberty, increased fifty gallons per day in their milk flow after having been turned on a field of 5-week old Sudan Grass.

Saturday, July 12th, this herd of high producing dairy cows was taken from a field of good blue grass and turned in on a 20-acre field of Sudan. By Sunday there was a good increase and by Thursday, July 17th, the sixth day after having been turned on the Sudan Grass, the herd of fifty-seven cows was producing at the rate of fifty gallons of milk more per day than they had produced on the blue grass.

The twenty acres of Sudan Grass was sown on sweet clover sod the second week in June, and the field was only five weeks old when the cows were turned in. At this time the Sudan was about knee high.

The solution of the summer pasture problem for dairy cattle

in this territory seems to lie either in the use of a summer silo or in Sudan Grass. Of these two, Sudan Grass is by far the cheaper, and on most farms would be considered the most practical.

Sudan Grass must be sown about the first of June, and this is perhaps one of the reasons that Sudan Grass has not become more popular as a summer dairy pasture. Most dairymen are extremely busy at that time of year. The great value of the crop as a pasture, and as a means of cutting the production costs of the dairyman during the summer, more than offset this difficulty, however.

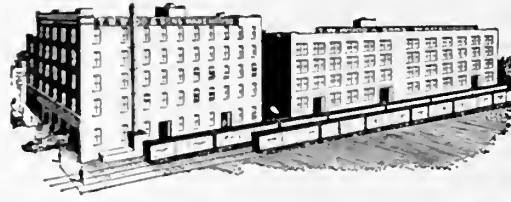
Best results with dairy cattle are assured if two Sudan pastures can be sown which will allow alternate pasturing. When this is possible one pasture is allowed to recover while the other is being grazed.

Dairy farmers report that where reasonably good land is used one-half acre of Sudan per cow is sufficient to tide the dairy herd over the 60 or 70-day period in the summer when ordinary pastures are so scorched and dry as to be nearly worthless for milk production.

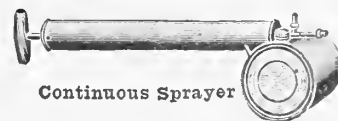

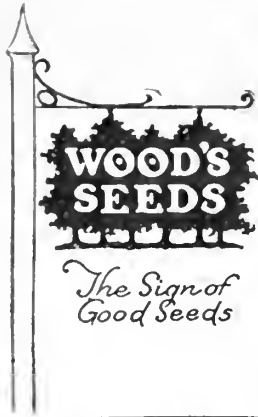
