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




Black Valentine Bean.



Planted from June to September. Closely related to liflower. We recommend a trial. The richer the soil the er. 5 ounces per acre. Cauliflower. better.


CURLED KALE.

Planted during June and July will produce well and furnish a very good green winter dish. Requires rich soil. 1½ pounds per acre.

CABBAGE.





Nature frequently provides all the conditions for the gardener in our Southern States.

Cabbage planted in the fall secures the first period of growth, then winter comes, cold spells which stop the growth and provide the resting stage, then comes warm weather again which starts the growth and causes the Cabbage to shoot to seed.

To prevent this, we have found it necessary to keep the young plants growing steadily from the start, as a check in the growth is injurious. Soil cannot be too rich. 5 ounces

of seed per acre.

It is pretty hard to say which is the best Cabbage among the varieties that we handle, as we consider all of the Early Flat and Late Flat Heads leaders; however, Frotscher's Large Late Flat Dutch, Steckler's New Money Maker and Stein's have the lead.

Young plants should be sprayed with Corona Arsenate of Lead when ten days old. Use 3 pounds to 100 gallons of water. See page 29 for price.

CHERVIL.

Planted during October and November for winter. An aromatic plant for seasoning. 2 ounces to 100 feet.

COLLARDS.

Planted during July and August. An old standby for winter greens; produces a mass of leaves and is at its best when touched by frost. 6 ounces per acre.

CORN SALAD.






