In mailing you my 1932 catalog this season finds the general crop of Cabbage and Onion plants shorter than usual. The dry weather during the planting season has cut the Cabbage and Onion plant crop 75%. I planted more acreage than usual and have two hundred acres of the finest Cabbage and Onion plants I have ever had. By planting my early plants is the quickest way to cut down the cost of living and have some surplus money to spend. The first thing you should do this year—1932—is to get that home garden started. My plants are cheaper than the general run of plants because there are no weaklings—practically every plant makes good. I have twenty-three years experience and should know how to give you the best.

Early Jersey Wakefield.—Many market gardeners consider this the very best Cabbage in cultivation. Its merits are many, among which are medium heads for an early variety, small outside foliage, and uniformity of crop. The heads are of medium size, and are white, solid and tender. Charleston Wakefield.—This cabbage is very much like the Jersey only it has a much larger head and is about 10 days later. This is a very desirable variety for shipping purposes as the heads are very solid and firm. A strong favorite with growers for a main crop.

Succession.—The earliest of the flat head variety, a sure header, and a very hardy grower both in cold and warm weather. This variety is grown extensively in the South and gives universal satisfaction. Heads are of uniform shape, not too flat and very solid.

Large Late and Early Flat Dutch.—This variety is one of the oldest in cultivation, head very large and flat, very tender and fine-grained. My strain of these varieties are of the very best to be had.

Golden Acre.—Same price as other varieties.

Copenhagen Market.—Very fine, nearly as early as Jersey Wakefield; stem short; heads large, round and solid, with few outer leaves of an upright growth. My stock of this popular variety is very early, uniform and dependable.



Flat Dutch.

Vegetables sold early in the season bring many times the price of those marketed several weeks later. NOW READY!

In this section the soil and climate conditions are just suited for growing tough, hardy Cabbage plants during the Winter and early Spring. The plants make a slow but steady growth, until at eight to ten weeks of age they are very tough and hardy. When in this condition they can be shipped to territory farther north and be planted in the open ground a month or six weeks sooner than the home-grown hot bed or cold frame plants. These **Frost-Proof Cabbage Plants** will stand a temperature of 20 degrees above zero without injury. The land freezing, or the plants being covered with ice, sleet or snow after they are planted will not injure them. You know what the difference in profits will be if your crop is matured and marketed before the general crop matures.

I know how to produce good plants; you'll find no runts or weaklings among those you purchase; practically every one makes good. You'll easily get from 6 to 10 tons of Cabbage for each acre you plant.

How To Grow Cabbage.—To grow a good crop of cabbage I would advise selecting a deep sandy loam with a Southern exposure if possible. Apply broadcast from ten to fifteen loads of well rotted stable manure to the acre and plow in. The land should be harrowed thoroughly and rows laid off three to three and a half feet apart. Apply about 500 pounds of high grade fertilizer to the acre, and mix well with the soil. If you have no stable manure apply from ten to fifteen hundred pounds fertilizer to the acre, half broadcast and half in the drill. As Cabbage

are gross feeders bear in mind that you cannot fertilize them too heavily. The Wakefield varieties should be set out from fifteen to twenty inches apart. It is important to set the plants deep in the ground, up to the first leaf, in order to keep the stem from freezing and cracking, which will cause the plant to fall over and die. You can plant about twelve thousand plants of the Wakefields to an acre and ten thousand of the flat heads to an acre.

The first cultivation should be deep, but when they start to head cultivate them shallow and apply 200 pounds nitrate of soda per acre.

Growers in some sections of the country are selling plants, calling them frost proof plants that have never been subjected to a frost because they do not have frost in their locality. Be sure you get the genuine when you buy.
