Nineteen thirty-two is here and with it better business. Factories are being started up on full time and some are running 24 hours a day, all over New England. Flowers are one of the emblems of cheerfulness so let's shake off the blues and grow more of them. If you grow more than you care for yourself, sell them or better still, take them to a shut-in or a sick friend. About the best thing we know of for a long lasting cut flower is the *Gladiolus*, lasting over a week if given fresh water every day. Regal Lilies are also good for cutting and have the most delightful fragrance. Dahlias lack fragrance but are good keepers and many of the new varieties are so large each blossom makes a good sized bouquet. Iris are useful for cutting or land-scape effects, easy to grow and will stand considerable neglect, but remember good care and cultivation of any plant will pay big dividends.

A lot of our customers are making money growing flowers to sell at wayside-stands, hotels, restaurants, etc. You can do the same, but do not make the mistake of selling high grade stock at low quality prices. Why not try it this year? Prices for bulbs are lowest ever known. Buy bulbs by the 100 and you get them still cheaper. To cut 100 dozen of gladiolus spikes you should plant at least 1,400 bulbs at a cost of around \$30. The glads should sell at from 50c to \$1 a dozen, giving you around \$75 for your flowers and you will have the bulbs for another year with what increase they may make. This does not take into consideration the pleasure you will derive from watching them grow or the flowers you will have for your own use. A small strip of rather level light sandy loam with plenty of water available in a dry time and a bag of sheep manure for fertilizer is about the whole expense.

ORDER EARLY

Order as early as possible so the bulbs will be received in ample time for early planting.

We will start planting our gardens May 1 or before if weather is suitable. We will not have any bulbs to sell after June 1.

As bulblets germinate rather slowly they should be planted early while soil is still moist. April 1 is none too early.

PLEASE ORDER EARLY!

SMALL ORDERS

If your order does not total \$1 we suggest a friend "club" with you and make it \$1 or more, or if you wish enclose 10c extra to cover cost of postage, packing, etc. Experience has taught us that orders for lots under \$1 cannot be shipped without loss. We put up any size order at the Gardens.

Gladiolus bulbs, Regal Lily bulbs and Dahlia tubers may be shipped at the same time, but if your order includes Iris

or other items to be shipped later, each order must amount to at least \$1.

Regal Lily seed are always sent postpaid. All prices in this catalog are postpaid on orders totalling \$1 or more, unless otherwise noted.

HOW TO REMIT

You can send money order or personal check with safety. Do not send loose coins unless letter is registered. If you must send stamps, please send the 1c denomination. We would rather not take stamps for sums over \$1.

Please write or print your name very plainly and give your correct address. This is important to enable us to give

you prompt and satisfactory service.

Unless otherwise instructed bulbs will be mailed as soon as weather will permit. Large orders of over \$5 may be shipped by express at any time.

REGARDING RESULTS

No grower can honestly GUARANTEE RESULTS. After the bulbs leave his hands he has no control over their care, culture, etc. We guarantee every bulb sold singly to be true to name, and 95% pure when sold by the 100. Usually there will be enough overcount in a hundred to take care of the 5% that might be "off". We guarantee bulbs to be of size and quality represented. We are glad to correct any mistake we might make. You will find us very fair and liberal in our dealings.

We have tried to make it easy for you to order bulbs. Please use our order blank and keep a copy of your order. Send your order in our addressed envelope on which we pay the postage.

We would appreciate the names of your friends who are interested in growing flowers and who would like our catalog.

You will receive our catalog next year if you buy from us this year, or will be sent if you ask for it. We are always glad to send it to those who have a use for it, without charge.

PRONOUNCE IT TO SUIT YOURSELF but the American Gladiolus Society at their convention in 1926 adopted this spelling and pronunciation—Glad-i-o-lus for both singular and plural. Most of us fans just call 'em "glads". Most everybody who has ever grown them will agree to this, and if you have never grown "glads" try them this year and you will also be "glad".

Pink, white, red, blue, yellow, orange, salmon and about all the colors imaginable. Planted in May will give flowers from the middle of July till frost.

DAHLIAS

We are listing only a few of the best dahlias that are grown, those we have tried and found to be worth while. We do not sell plants, tubers only. Each tuber will be true to name and have at least one or more eyes showing. They should be planted on their sides with eye up, about 6 inches deep in good garden soil that has been plowed or spaded at least 10 inches deep as the new tubers must have soft soil to grow and expand in, which they cannot do if the soil is hard. Do not have them fertilized too heavily or they will grow rank stalks and make but few flowers. To grow extra large flowers disbud the side shoots. When blooms begin to go by, cut them off so more will come along. Do not plant extra early, June 1st is about right for New England. NOTE-When first planted cover about 3 inches deep and as stalks grow fill up with dirt to soil level.
