Cactus. Mamillaria vivipara, :eddishpurple blossoms, medium sized plants, $\$ .30$ each, 3 for $\$ .75$, large plants $\$ .45$ each, 3 for $\$ 1.10$.

## SHRUBS, ETC.

Elaeagnus Argentia Silverberry, silver colored leaves, grows 3 to 5 ft . high, $\$ .25$ each, 3 for $\$ .60$.
Artemisia Tridentata, Desert Sage Brush, flower heads small, yellowish, in dense panicles a foot long, leaves silver gray on both sides, a much branched shrub, grows 2 to 4 ft ., an odd and much desired plant for the rock garden, $\$ .30$ each, 3 for $\$ .75$.
Rhus Trilobata, Fragrant Sumac, a low growing variety, 2 to 5 ft . high and as broad, glossy green leaves, small yellow flowers, each $\$ .40$.
