# Our Gladiolus Report 

The Gladiolus shows during the 1931 season in different parts of the country at which we exhibited and others at which I assisted in the judging, gave me a good opportunity to study the relative merits of the many fine, outstanding varieties of Gladiolus; and also the varieties that have found favor from critical fanciers and visitors at our gardens in which some eight hundred varieties bloomed during the 1931 season.

Some varieties are outstanding; some very good. The price does not always show the merit and beauty of any variety. When there is a quantity of stock in any variety, the prices drop as with any other commodity. New varieties are high because of their scarcity. Some drop more rapidly in price than others, as they increase faster; some will always be high, as they increase slowly.

The outstanding varieties which were judged as the finest flowers at the Minneapolis, Duluth, State Fairs and the National Show at Cleveland, O., are: Picardy, Minuet, Jane Addams, Mrs. Leon Douglas, Salbach's Orchid, Capt. Boynton, Albatross, Pride of Wanakah, Queen Mary Nurial, Glorianna, Mother Machree, Coryphee, Betty Nuthall, Veilchenblau, Paul Pfitzer, Golden Dream, Joerg's White, Mr. W. H. Phipps, Catherine Coleman, Pearl of California, Pfitzer's Triumph, Dr. Bennett, Marmora, Hinemoa, Aflame, Melody, Saraband, Chas. Dickens, and Mrs. F. C. Peters.

 tion the following varieties which were awarded blue ribbons in their respective classes: Pride of Wanakah, Marietta, Giant Nymph, Longfellow, Copper Bronze, Orange Queen, Dr. Moody, Carmen Sylva, Mammoth White, Henry C. Goehl, Trudle Grotz, Mrs. W. P. Sisson, Virginia Hale, Maurice Fuld, Gertrude Eriy, Rozan, Peach Rose, Taro, Beverley, Helen Howard, Marnia, Emile Auburn, Shell Pink, Glorianna, La Paloma, Ming Toy, Apricot Glow, Gold Eagle, Rose Mist, Mrs. C. Coolidge, Souvenir, and Golden Frills.Veilchenblau is gorgeous when grown from a full-sized bulb. It is tall and large, with clear violet-blue flowers. It is one of the very finest Glads; winning two first prizes at the National Show, two at the Minnesota State Fair, and one at the Minneapolis Show. At the Minnesota State Fair it was also awarded the most meritorious flower in the show.

Picardy, Aflame, Minuet, Mr. W. H. Phipps, and Marmora swept everything before them
in their respective classes. They are indeed all wonderful varieties. Athame achieves the difficult task of being brilliant and striking without entirely losing its delicacy. Minuet has size and delicacy combined with flowers of great substance. Mr. W. H. Phipps is a delicate shade of La France pink with the habit of having as many as fifteen or more flowers open at the same time. This quality makes it unapproachable as a show flower. Mother Machrer is one of the few oddities of recent introduction that is beautiful. The large, open blooms belong to the smoky class.

Gloriama is a wonderful show flower when well grown. Its rich salmon-pink flowers are very delicate. Catherine Coleman is a large, tall salmon rose-pink with just a touch of purple pencilings on the lower petals. It is always a prize-wimner. Rameses is a new Giant purple with wide-open flowers often measuring seven inches across. The spike is well balanced and very tall. Rameses created a sensation in our Gardens and also at the Minnesota Gladiolus Show. Melody is a rich lemon-yellow with the ends of the petals beautifully bordered with a delicate orange-red. A very striking variety when used for design work, baskets, or vases.

The outstanding white varieties are as follows: Joerg's White leads the list with Mammoth White a close second. Carmen Sylva is still the best cut flower variety. In the new varieties there is Albatross a pure white with no markings. There is still a place for someone to originate a good white Glad that is a pure glistening white of good size and with a long flowering spike.

In the red Glads, I)r. F. E. Bennett is a tall, brilliant red, and as a show flower it has no equal. Pfitzers Trimmph has flowers often seven inches across, and makes a good show flower when well grown. Victor, a red with white blotch, grows very tall and we highly recommend it for a good cut flower variety.

Yellow Glads are well represented. Golden Dream, heading the list, is a constant prize-winner. In the new yellows of recent introduction, Loyalty, Intoine, and Canbera should have a place in your garden. Antoine is the most brilliant, golden yellow colored of all the yellows we have tested or seen this last season. The flowers are of medium size on a perfect spike.

In the pink Glads there are many varieties that are greatly admired. Among them are such varieties as longfellow, shell link, Angel's Dream, Il smith, Queen Elizabeth, and Rozan. Queen Elizabeth is one of the outstanding pink Glads that is very fine for cutting as well as a show flower.

Dinmet leads the lavender class. Berty snow is a very fine early lavender. Orchid Lady is a giant in size, and oftell seven inches
across. Jubilee is also very large and a good clear color. Dr. Moody is a fine landscape variety having a long period of blooming as it produces many side spikes. Jane Addams has wide open flowers of purest lavender.

## Ideal Varieties For Cut Fiowers

For cut flower varieties Carmen Sylva is a good white, Mrs. Dr. Norton an unusual pink, Break o' Day a good shell pink, E. J. Shaylor a fine rose pink, Crimson Glow a large crimson red, Anna Eberius is a brilliant cerise, Ming Toy a salmon-buff, Marshal Foch a large late salmon-pink, Orange Queen a good yellow, Gold Eagle a good early yellow, and Golden Dream a good late yellow. In the lavender class Mrs. F. C. Peters heads the list. Byron L. Smith is a great favorite among florists.

I cannot pass up without
"Graceful Prime."
Are
Fast Becoming Favorites mentioning the primulinus. Favorites itself so gracefully for baskets and design work. The daintiness of many of the varieties is well known. Mrs. Calvin Coolidge, receiving the greatest amount of admiration, is a beautiful salmon rose-pink with a yellow throat giving it the appearance of an opal. It is one of the finest color combinations, which blends very readily with the other colors. Aflame is fast coming to the front. Glorianna and Shell Pink are other handsome varieties, both being unusually large, prim hybrids. In the yellows, Souvenir and Golden Frills still top the list. Rose Mist leads the rose-pink and red classes. Sheila is a fine salmon-pink and a favorite cut flower. The Orchid, which must be placed in this same class, has received wide admiration. The long, narrow petals, ruffled and laciniated, are of pale lavender flecked with lavenderpink, and much like a Cattleya orchid in shape. Copper Bronze is of an unusual copper color, La Paloma a new, true orange of fine substance, Orange Queen a beautiful wide open flower is fine for cutting, Melody a striking variety for artistic work, Virginia Lou, a wide open flower of large size the color being a rich lavender old rose pink, and Gold Eagle, a fine early yellow that is a good cut flower.

In a rambling way, I have given you a little information which may be of interest and of value to you. I have only touched upon those varieties which I know, by close observation, have met with the approval of many fanciers and lovers of Glads. The modern Glads of the summer and early fall gardens are the most popular of all flowers. They are valuable to the landscape gardener for "color splashes" and bedding purposes. To the florists and home decorator, they are the most beautiful and lasting of all garden flowers. The spikes growing tall and elegant, sturdy and dignified, slender and graceful, and the color range absolutely infinite.

There is the single spike for the slender vase; a corsage for the luncheon guest; an attractive basket for the debutante; and a glorious bouquet for your friend.

## How to Grow Good "Glads"

In the spring spade your garden to a depth of at least 12 inches, and when danger from freezing is past. Plant the bulbs in rows about 20 inches apart to admit free and intensive cultivation, and from 3 to 5 inches apart in the row, covering about 6 inches deep with light soil and 4 inches in heavy ground. Be sure that the covering soil is mellow.

Fertilizing. If some good rotted manure can be procured in the fall, give the garden a good coating and spade it under. Realizing that such fertilizer is hard to obtain, we must take the next best choice and use the commercial fertilizers and in this we prefer sheep manure. After row or trench is made this fertilizer can be applied thickly in the bottom and mixed with the mellow earth, but we prefer setting the bulbs, then covering with 1 inch of earth and then applying the fertilizer before the row is filled. This allows the fertilizing properties to soak down to the roots where it is needed. After growth has started another application on each side of the row and thoroughly worked into the soil is of much benefit; in fact, this top dressing can be applied several times during the growing season. Before flower spikes appear, a good top dressing of bone meal worked in will greatly benefit the flowers. Growing flowers should have a constant supply of moisture at all times.
