

## HINTS ON GROWING GLADS

When the spring months roll around, if our glad fan has not placed his order for bulbs, he at once begins to pore over the offerings of the various growers. First he has in mind the varieties or at least the characteristics of the varieties that he wants. If he has the latter, any reliable grower will gladly help him make his choice.

Second - As half the growing is in having good stock to start with, he will choose a reliable grower, who has a reputation for honesty, stability, and dependability. All bulbs grown for sale should be treated with some disinfectant such as Calogreen, Corrosive sublimate, or Semesan, before planting to insure a clean crop of healthy bulbs. Just recently a new pest has developed - thrips. The careful buyer will insist that all bulbs he buys are warranted free from thrips at time of shipment.

Third - he must also decide upon the size of bulbs that will suit his purposes best for the least expenditure. For most purposes No. 2 or No. 3 bulbs are satisfactory. However if he wishes to raise some extra quality blooms for show or some special purpose, No. 1 bulbs are essential in most cases.

After the selection has been made and the bulbs arrive the glad fan gives his attention to planting. Any ground that is reasonably fertile will do, the richer the better for show blooms. It is better to use a moderate amount of commercial fertilizer than fresh manure, as the latter tends to encourage disease. The ground should be well pulverized. In planting our fan will dig a trench fully four inches and set his bulbs firmly in the bottom. They may be planted from two to six inches apart. This deep planting helps to keep the flowers from falling down in the summer. The planting may be done any time after the ground warms up in the spring until June 15.

After much hoeing and cultivating (and watering, if it happens to be a dry summer) for a period of sixty to ninety days, depending on the varieties and size of bulbs used, our fan is rewarded by a burst of beauty that is unrivaled, as compensation for his efforts. If he has selected and planted wisely, he will have a continuous blooming season from July 20 until October in our climate.

When cutting spikes, the fan is always careful to leave from four to six leaves to mature the bulb - the bulb will last a long time with this treatment. This may be done by slipping a knife down between the leaf and the stock for some distance, first on one side, then on the other, finally giving the knife a turn thus cutting off the stem. The spike may then be lifted out without breaking down the leaves.

Three weeks or more after the flowers have bloomed the bulbs are ready to be harvested. This is best done by loosening with a fork and gently pulling the bulb out of the ground by the top. The tops are then cut off close to the bulb and the bulbs allowed to cure in the sun, if possible for a week or two. They are then ready to have the old bulb removed and be put away for the winter. The best place to store bulbs is in rather moist cool place, out of danger of freezing. They are now ready for another season.
