FRASER'S FAMOUS ZINNIAS

Planting instructions are given below, but the following few short facts will be of interest to you.

Zinnias are gross feeders and should not be planted year after year in the same plot without adding some good fertilizer such as well rotted manure.

To produce maximum

To produce maximum size blooms, zinnias must receive an abundance of water either in the form of rainfall or irrigation.

In dry climates, or if it fails to rain, they should be irrigated thoroughly once every week or two, depending on how fast the evaporation of moisture from the soil has been. Don't the soil has been. Don't sprinkle—this produces too many tiny surface feeding roots that have neither the feeding ca-

HOW TO GROW ZINNIAS

Zinnias produce the most beautiful Zinnias produce the most beautiful flowers during late summer and fall, so don't "rush" the season by planting too early. Start them in flats during March and April and in May, June, July and August they may be planted in the open ground where they are to bloom.

When you plant Zinnias in the open ground the first essential is preparing the seed bed. Whether you plant in beds or in rows, the ground should first be thoroughly soaked with water to a depth of 8 to 12 inches, then when dry enough to be worked without being muddy, spade up and pulverize the soil thoroughly; make your trenches about 1/4 inch deep, plant the seed, cover and firm down with a board or roller.

This first soaking will germinate the seed and carry the Zinnia to vigorous little plants. Thin out plants to stand 18 to 24 inches apart. After this they should be given a thorough watering every week or two, depending on how hot it gets. Never water your Zinnias with a sprinkler, this ruins the flowers and often causes a brown blight or mildew to attack the leaves.

After the plants are well established you can work well rotted manure into the ground between the rows, but never close enough to the plant to burn the roots. Irrigation will carry the food elements to the feeding roots. In California and Southern States plant in the open ground until August 1st; even in Eastern and Northern States you can plant up to the first part of July as they will bloom in about sixty days from seed.

pacity nor depth to supply sufficient moisture to the growing plant when hot weather comes on. Cultivate around the plant while young and when you water, soak the ground thoroughly.

You can make successive plantings of zinnia seed in the open ground from May 1st to at least July 15th and in California and mild climates you can extend the season well into August. During warm weather they will come into bloom easily in sixty days from seed.

CALIFORNIA MISSION ZINNIA (Giant Balloon Flowered Type)

If you want to grow exhibition flowers, space your plants 2 to 3 ft., apart each way and if the soil is impoverished, use well rotted manure and work into the ground around the plants, but keep it about six inches away from the main stock so roots will not be burned. Wide spacing is also your best preventive for mildew because it allows a free circulation of air around the plant.

If you wish to plant solid beds or borders in separate colors to carry out a color scheme in the garden you should set out or thin out your plants to about 8 or 10 inches apart, then when they come into bloom you can take out any of the plants that happen to be off-color without leaving too much space between those remaining. After this rogueing process thin out all plants to stand 18 to 24 inches apart. In no other way can you have perfect beds of separate shades. The zinnia cannot be fixed to produce 100% true to color and we are sure that no grower has done more than we have to bring this popular flower to its present state of perfection. lf you wish to plant solid beds or

Don't pick the flowers too soon for house decoration if you want size and gorgeous coloring. Let them develop. It takes fully two weeks for opened buds to grow into full-sized double flowers. Many people think that the zinnia is a complete flower when the first circle of petals flattens out. Give it time, each day this flower grows increasingly larger and flower grows increasingly larger and is still in the process of growing when it has reached huge proportions and the first set of petals are actually so old that they have started to turn brown to turn brown.

Like all hollow-stemmed flowers, the zinnia keeps better as a cut flow-er if the end of the stems are sub-merged in boiling water for 15 sec-

Don't rush the season. Don't plant when the ground is wet and cold, the seed will only rot. The zinnia is a hot weather flower, coming into its full beauty in late summer and early fall.

For a lower more branching plant pinch out the first bud that appears on the main stem, when plant is about 8 to 10 inches tall.





Double stocks are really freaks—the singles only produce seeds. Strains producing a high percentage of doubles are the result of plant selection.

To have a bed of all double stocks sow seed thickly, or, if started in cold frame, set out young seedlings very close together, then thin out all the singles when plants flower, leaving only the doubles. With this idea in mind we have filled our packets very liberally so you may later thin out all singles and still leave you plenty of plants.

ABOUT YELLOW SWEET PEAS

We are constantly receiving inquiries asking us for a yellow sweet pea such as the florists display in their windows. As yet a good yellow has not been produced. Those seen in the florists' shops are secured by dying the flower. The process is quite simple; the flowers are allowed to wilt after picking, then the stems are placed in a vase filled with water and florist's dye. This coloring is then taken up through the stems and distributed in the flower petals. By allowing the flowers to wilt before placing them in this solution the coloring is accomplished very rapidly.

Sweet Peas Are Easy to Grow

Sweet Peas Are Easy to Grow

They have a few definite requirements and, if you observe these in planting, the results are certain to be gratifying.

Select a rich garden soil in a sunny location. Dig out a trench 6 inches deep by 12 to 18 inches wide and put to one side. Fill in 2 to 3 inches of well-rotted manure and spade thoroughly under another 12 inches deep. Then replace top soil and work in liberal amount of bone meal 6 inches deep. Be sure and cover all fertilizer with at least 3 or 4 inches of clear soil so the young roots do not contact fertilizers until they are strong. Direct contact with fertilizers will burn young roots and kill plant. Thoroughly soak with water. When dry enough to work, open a small trench 4 inches deep. Sow seed in bottom and cover about 1 inch. Fill in trench gradually as the plants grow until ground is again level. Seed should be sown 2 inches apart in the row and thinned to 6 inches, as the plants begin to crowd. Provide wire netting support as soon as the plants show. They like plenty of water and cultivation. After plants are up 12 inches, work top dressing of sheep manure and bone meal into surface of soil and water thoroughly. Repeat every three weeks if you want maximum flowers.

PERENNIAL FLOWER SEEDS

The hardy perennials are usually quite lasting and of a permanent character, very essential to the well balanced garden. They live for several years and flower profusely the second year from seed. Some will flower the first year from seed planted indoors in boxes during February, March and April and transplanted to the garden when 3 to 4 inches high. After danger of frost is past many varieties may be sowed in the open ground through summer and fall, but late sowings cannot be counted on to bloom until the year following. Included in the following list are biennials, which die after the second year, and bulbs and tuberous plants grown from seed, as well as half-hardy perennials. All are fully described so you will make no mistake in selecting for your particular needs.

The 3-foot plant has rosy-purple semi-double flowers with a white disc surrounding the yellow center; it resembles the annual chrysanthemum. I am going to start another packet of these seeds. HERE'S HOW TO SUCCEED WITH DAHLIA SEED

Success with dahlia seed is very simple and sure if you will observe a few very important rules, as: Don't rush the season, dahlias planted too early in cold, wet ground are sure to fail—a dahlia from seed takes only about two weeks longer to flower than the tuber. Plant in April or May, the first half of May is usually best even in the northern states. California and southern states can plant well into June and still have a marvelous showing before frost. Don't expect the little seedling to rough it, give it protection while in the seed flat and you will have a

sturdier plant to set out in the garden. Do not expect all doubles from seed, you must take them as they come and save the tubers of the most outstanding ones. If you want large flowers you must disbud and fertilize with bone meal at the time the buds appear. Transplant seedlings to the open garden after all danger of frost is past and set two feet apart each way in soil with good drainage and a sunny location. If you want show specimens pinch off the central or leading bud on each branch, allowing but one bud to mature on only five or six branches. Below is a graphic example of growing from seed.


First—Make a soil mixture of equal parts garden loam, clean sand and leaf moid. Mix thoroughly and moisten, then fill flat to within ½ in. of top, smooth and level, then mark off rows 3 in. apart each way with lath pressed into soil ½ in. deep, and plant seed where rows cross as indicated by matches.

Second — Carefully cover by drawing lath across flat in each direction, lightly, so not to move seed. This will cover seed ¼ in., which is cover seed sufficient.

Third — Firm soil with a block or brick, press gently, don't pound. This will make certain that the soil is set firmly about each seed.

Fourth—Cover flat with buriap and water through this covering. This will prevent uncovering seed and maintain even moisture — but be SURE and ifft burlap from flat as soon as the first seed iffts the soit. Keep moist but NOT SOAKING WET.

Fifth—After seedlings appear (usually 10 to 15 days) tack burlap on frame four inches above surface. This allows sufficient light and air but protects from direct rays of sun. Keep moist and transpiant to garden when 3 to 4 in. tall.

Sow seed with generous hand and thin out to about 12 inches apart, excepting the Iceland Poppy which can be planted much closer, especially if you are planting for cut flowers.

Success With Gladiolus

Planting time depends on where you live, but a good rule is never to plant in cold ground. In California and southern states they can be planted almost any time after bulbs have been dormant two months or longer.

Gladiolus like a good friable, well-drained soil. Do not use fertilizer at time of planting unless you prepare your bed a month or two in advance. Fine ground bone meal or any good fertilizer is suitable, but it should be thoroughly mixed with the soil or particles touching bulbs will burn them. Plant in full sunshine. Gladiolus do not do well among trees or shrubbery. Plant from three to four inches deep, depending on the size of bulbs; in sandy soil plant deeper. Space about six inches apart.

Ditch irrigation is preferred to overhead sprinkling which damages the flowers—and remember, they like plenty of water while growing and blooming. If you are after show size blooms it will help to work in some fertilizer about the plant when they are eight or nine inches high and again when the flower spikes begin to show. Fertilizing will improve the spikes, but if size is not bred in the variety, no amount of fertilizing will make a large flower grow from a small type.

In cutting flowers, use a small knife and cut the flower spike leaving four leaves or the bulb will be damaged for planting the following year. Cut when the first two or three flowers have started to open.

If you wish to ripen your bulbs and save for planting the following year.

If you wish to ripen your bulbs and save for planting the following year, continue to water if climate will permit, for at least a month after the bulbs have bloomed, or until the leaves begin to turn brown. The new bulb makes most of its growth after the flowering period. Some varieties mature quicker than others, but it is a safe rule to dig before they die down completely.

HINTS ON DAHLIA CULTURE

Dahlias are Fall Flowers—don't plant too early, May to June 15th is the ideal time, depending, of course, on your location. They thrive best in sunny situation. Do not use fertilizer unless mixed with the soil several months before planting, or after flowers are in bud. The eye of the tuber is at the neck where the root joins the stalk, so in planting lay root down flat with eye up, about six inches deep and cover with about 2 inches of pulverized soil, filling in to surface as plant grows. When plants are large enough pinch out top bud above the fourth leaf to force plant to branch and prevent growing too tall. Cultivate until first bud appears, after this rack lightly to break crust formed by rain or irrigation. Drive stakes at time of planting and when plant needs support tie to stake with cloth strips. Do not water heavily until after buds appear (unless weather is very dry), then soak thoroughly about every week or ten days. For extra large blooms use manure about the plant, after buds appear, mixing lightly into soil, but keeping it at least 6 inches away from the plant, or roots will burn; disbud by pinching off all but the strongest bud on the stems you wish the flower. When frost kills back the plant in the fall, cut the stalks off at the ground and dig up tubers carefully, placing them in a box with clean dry sand and cover with newspaper. Store in cellar where temperature will be about 50 degrees, Do not let them freeze, absorb too much moisture or dry out. In the spring the roots can be divided when the eyes are plainly visible—these will be found at the neck of the tuber where it joins the stalk.



A FEW TIMELY SUGGESTIONS ON STARTING SEED

The following progressive steps in starting seed in flats will assist you in securing better germination with seed.



FIRST—Make a flat 16x20x3 inches deep of redwood or cypress, leaving the bottom boards spaced elightiy to give drainage. Cover the bottom with a layer of gravel to insure drainage and aeration for proper root growth. A good allaround soil mixture is equal parts finely sifted garden soil leaf mold and clean, sharp cut sand.

SECOND—Mix these ingredients thoroughly. Level and smooth surface to within ½ inch of the top of the flat and fill the remaining space with boiling water and allow to eep through. Let stand until next day and much of the weed eeed and fungi will have been killed. Next loosen, smooth surface and mark off rows 2 inches apart, with the edge of a lath.

THIRD—When planting very fine seed such as petunias, barely mark the rows. For larger seed press the rows to a depth equal to twice the diameter of the seed. Sow the seed directly from the seed envelope as evenly as possible and thin out young plants as they begin to crowd, transplanting to other flats. When they have developed three or four true leaves transplant to the garden, weather permitting.

FOURTH—Covering the seed is the next important step. More seed fails to grow because it is too dseply planted than from shallow planting. If the depth of the rowe has been made right you can cover the seed with just enough soil by smoothing out the ridges with a lath drawn with the rows. However, such very fine seed as petunias planted practically on the surface are best covered with a very light sifting of clean sand, leaf mold or peat moss.

FIFTH—After the seed has been properly covered, firm the soil down with a board or block. Don't pack the soil, just press gently so the earth is forced snugly around each seed. As shown in next photograph, it is a good plan (especially in hot climates) to cover the surface very lightly with peat moss or clean eand to retain moisture near the surface.

SIXTH—To start seed in early epring, this seed flat can be placed in a room with temperature of 60° to 70° Fahrenbeit, a sunny window is an ideal place. As the time nears for planting out the young seedlings the flat can be placed outside for awhile during the warm part of each day, gradually hardening them off to cooler outside conditions. In mild climates flats can usually be kept under lath or deciduous tree for protection.

SEVENTH—After the seed has been planted lay a piece of burlap over the flat and water through this covering so fine seed will not be washed about. Be sure and remove this covering just as eoon as tiny seediings appear and raise it 2 or 3 inches above the flat on sticks at each corner or cover with a pane of glass, leaving space between glass and top of flat for air circulation. Keep moist, but not wet. Seed requires moisture and warmth to germinate, and from one to four weeks time depending on variety, some even longer. Don't neglect the seed flat.

Most garden failures occur during the "incubation" period of the seed, due to improper planting and care. This "incubation" period begins from the time you plant the seed until the tiny little seedlings are ready to transplant to the garden where they must be husky and vigorous enough to "rough it" with a reasonable amount of care, food and water until the day they fulfill their mission and blossom forth into gorgeous flowers.

GROWING PLANTS FROM SEED IS EASY

Supply the correct amount of moisture, heat, air and light and you will rarely fail. If you do not bave a botbed, greenhouse or coldframe the best method for starting all seed that can be transplanted is in seed flats, as described in progressive steps at the left. In using this method be sure and place flats where snails, ants and other pests cannot reach them. When planting seed in the open ground, don't rush the season, don't plant in cold, wet ground, wait until danger of frost is past and the ground is warm, growth will then be rapid and sure.

HOTBEDS AND COLDFRAMES

Incubators for Flower Seed

These are inexpensive to construct and invaluable to the gardener in starting plants three to four weeks ahead of the season.

The hotbed is usually heated by fermenting vegetable matter such as stable manure, while the coldframe is heated only by the sun's rays. Seed cannot be started in the coldframe as early as in the hotbed, but in mild climates it is usually sufficient for the average gardener.

A good size for either is 3x6 ft., which is the standard size of sash. The back should be about 15 inches bigh and the front about 8 inches and placed so the slope is to the south to permit water to run off and collect the full value of the sun's rays.

If you have neither of these conveniences we would recommend that you build a coldframe first. A good place to locate it is against a basement window if the basement is heated. It can then be built without a back and so arranged that the basement window can be opened for additional heat. Hinge the sash, so it can be raised for circulation of air as well as for convenience in handling seedlings.

The following letter from the Boone Garden Club of Boone, Iowa, emphasizes the necessity of proper care and culture if you wish to bring out the maximum size, beauty and color that lies dormant in every "Sun Ripened" Seed.

Dear Mr. Fraser:

Growing these zinnias by the members of the Boone Garden Club was a most interesting demonstration of what can be accomplished. The winning exhibits and a number of the runner-up bouquets were of extraordinary quality, both from the standpoint of size and perfection of blossoms. Other members got falr results and still others just ordinary results.

Hence the conclusion was very forcefully brought home to all that not only is the matter of good seeds important, but of equal importance is the environment in which the seeds are growing. In other words, our contest demonstrated that the matter of right soil, care, moisture and other factors involved in the growing are absolutely essential if extraordinary good results are to be achieved.

Our demonstration shows that if the 50 people who got the seeds had been separated in 50 communities, that then there would have been some who would have claimed that the seeds were of inferior quality. However, since they were all in one club and saw the wonderful results secured by part of the members, they were obliged to admit that the seeds were splendid and that their failure was due to not having provided the proper environment.

This contest has caused all of us to realize that environment is very essential of that in the future I believe that all our members will be better gardeners.
