Apple trees should be planted 35 feet apart each way. Quick fillers and early maturing varieties are often used between rows for quick results. Such varietics as Yellow Transparent, Duchess, Grimes Golden and Wealthy make good fillers, or peach trees are often used. In planting 35 feet each way you can get 35 trees to the acre and about 80 to 90 fillers.

### Summer Apples

If making over an old lawn, it is advisable to spade to a depth of four to six inches, removing all weeds and grasses. Rope the area into 12 inch squares and at each intersection place the plug in a hole large enough to accommodate it, leaving the grass side or top level with the top of the ground, then press it firmly into place. Immediately after planting, the area should be heavily watered and kept in moist condition until the runners from the various plugs have completely covered the surface of the ground. It usually takes from 10 to 12 weeks to produce a nice turf, providing watering and fertilizing instructions are carried out correctly. viding rectly.



on them for you. The following method of laying out a grove is the one best suited where a large number of seedlings are to be planted. First, mark out your rows the desired distance apart, not less than 8 feet. Then with the plow, run a furrow as deep as pos-sible throwing the dirt both ways. Next lay the seedlings in the trench with the tops resting on one side. Then with one horse run the plow along the opposite side to throw the dirt back on the roots. Next straighten the trees and tramp the dirt firmly around the roots. Willows which are often used as a snow hedge, should not be set more than 3 feet apart in the row. Ash, Elm, Box Elder, and Maple are best set at least 8 feet. Catalpa and Osage Orange are practical because they make fine wood and fence posts. Plant these two trees about 3 feet apart, and then when they get up to fence post size, cut out every other tree.

**Chinese Elms** are the most rapid growing of all, and if you will let them grow up without any pruning of side branches, they will provide a dense windbreak that will stop the snow and wind.

Black Locust, Carolina Poplar and the Willows are good to plant in ditches to prevent soil washing. They are recom-mended for this purpose by State Agricultural Colleges.


### How to Plant Balled and Burlapped **Evergreens**

**Evergreens** A Balled and Burlapped Evergreen means that the Evergreen has been dug and lifted with the earth which surrounds the roots left undisturbed on it, and then wrapped tightly with burlap. Evergreens should be planted from two to six in-ches deeper than they were in the nursery row. In planting, dig a hole about twice the size of the ball of earth. Handle the tree carcfully so as not to break the ball of carth. It is a good plan to slip a board underneath the ball of earth and carry it in that manner. Put ball of earth, burlap and all, into the hole and then use good soil to pack around it. Be sure to pack the soil firmly. When the hole is about two-thirds filled with soil, pour in a pail of water and allow it to soak away. Then continue fill-ing with good soil almost to the surface of the ground, leaving layers of loose soil at the top of the ground the trunk of the tree. It should dip in slight-ly toward the trunk so as to catch and retain all





Each year we have thousands of customers who in-quire about and order Seedling Evergreens. These should be planted in the garden or in beds for the first two or three years, and cared for the same as you would care for cabbage plants. The more cultivation you give them, the better. Give them about half shade the first year. Shades can be made from lath, with a space of about 1½ inches between each lath, running the lath north and south. Small transplants (T) are cheaper in the long run than seedlings (S), and we recommend that you get the small transplants.

All of the Seedlings that we are offering are for windbreak purposes. The fancy, ornamental Ever-greens should, by all means, be ordered only with ball greens sl of earth.

In planting small Evergreens, it is always advisable to mulch them early in the Fall, particularly after a heavy rain, using well-rotted straw or leaves.

### **Correct Distances to Plant Evergreens** for Windbreaks

We advise § feet apart in a single row, 10 feet apart each way in two rows, 14 feet apart each way in three rows. The ideal windbreak is a four or five row wind-break planted 14 feet apart in the row, and the rows 20 feet apart. Every other row should have the trees planted even with the open spaces of the previous row, in other words, zig-zag.

**WATERING:** In watering Evergreens, water at the top of the ground where it will quickly soak through to the roots. Do not water on the foliage, and always do the watering in the evening after sundown. Seedlings can be shipped by Parcel Post, and our prices are Postpaid. 

This past year I had Dahlias in large vases all over our store and studio. During the second week in September we announced over the radie to come and see our Dahlias. Hundreds of people, both beginners and fanciers, looked them over and wrote down their names in our Garden Note Book which we handed out to everyone who came this summer. I know that the Dahlias made many friends last season among people who had no idea of their beauty as a cut flower.

When to Plant. Dahlias should be planted from May 15th to June 15th. A com-mon mistake is made in planting them too early. If planted too early the plant makes a rank growth in early season and by the time the buds begin to form, dry weather comes along, hardens the wood and blasts the flowers.

Dahlias like a cool atmosphere and in order to get lots of blooms, water frequently. If you are not ready to plant when you receive your bulbs, open up the package and place them in a box of soil or sand.

When to Dig Dahlia Boots. Dahlias should be dug as soon as the frost has killed the tops. They should not be left too long after being frosted, for these frosted tops are sometimes harmful to the bulbs. Be sure and dig them before the ground freezes, for Dahlia bulbs cannot stand freezing. Great care must be taken in digging the bulbs to see that the tuberous bulbs are not broken from the crown for Dahlia bulbs must have a crown in order to grow.

If you do not have a pool, plant them in a tub or half barrel — sink the tubs in the ground and plant some other flower-ing plants, such as perennials, around the edge. Place a few rocks here and there around the outside of the pool and you have a perfect rock garden.

#### **How to Plant**

**How to Plant** We call these hardy varieties be-cause they are perennials, but they will not stand freozing. In a pool, plant them in a pail, using very rich soil — use one-third bone meal and two-thirds black dirt, thoroughly mixed together. Place the tuber in the soil until only the crown from which the leaf starts, shows. Put sand or gravel over top of dirt and then sink your pail in the pool. Water to a depth of about e ight inches should cover the crown.

#### **Keeping Over Winter**

**Reeping over whiter** In winter store the pails in the cool basement away from the heat, but do not allow the m to freeze. Keep them wet down about every month so the roots will not dry out. Water lilies which are planted in pails should have the soil about the roots renewed each year. Two water lilies, two water hyacinths and two water poppies are the right amount for the small to medium sized pool.

There were many deep can-yons in the cattle country and it was nothing uncom-mon to find the herd popping out of a canyon into a man's cornfield. And I had to be on the job. The hours were long, from early sunrise until dark. The first money I ever earned was when my father gave me a pig—a very small one, in fact it was a runt. I was milking the cows so I saw to it that the pig got plenty of milk. I traded the pig for three turkeys, then I traded the turkeys, or part of them, for chicks. I bought an incubator and shipped dressed chickens to Commission Firms for a couple of years. I picked up \$80.00 the first year after I got started, and \$150.00 the second ycar. When I was 18 years old I taught country school in western Hayes County, near Wauneta, Nebraska. I formm, who was quite an alfalfa grower in that the ritory. 

**Big Full Packets—Seeds That Grow** My garden and flower seeds this year are from fine strains and fresh crops. The packets are very large and the seeds in them will do a lot of planting for you. The general drought over the coun-try this past year most certainly ought to teach all of us a lesson that we must get back to earth and raise gardens.

If you will grow some of each you can have plenty of green onions for table use, the very earliest from the sets, the next from the plants, and then the seed onions arc large enough for table use. All of these will mature by Fall. For your winter onions you can use the Bermuda the first part of the season, and then you have the others for the balance of the late Winter and early Spring. In placing your orders you should keep these things in mind, and from our own experience we know that you will come out successful with this kind of an arrangement.

#### **Union Sets**

The onion is one of the oldest recontrol is one of the oldest vegetables known to man. It filled an inportant place in ancient gar-dens, and it has just as important a place in our modern gardens. As most of you know, onions may be grown from seed, from sets or from plants. plants.

Sow your seed early in the spring. Put it on the ground before or during the spring rains, so a beauti-ful green lawn will be well established before the hot days of summer come. Finely rake the top soil, sow the seed and water until the rains come, and your success is assured. BE SURE AND FEED YOUR LAWN WITH SEED AND FERTILIZER EVERY YEAR AND IT WILL ALWAYS BE BEAUTIFUL.

**TIME OF SEEDING:** Spring is a good time to seed and so is fall. In this territory lawns are usually seeded in March or April or in September and October. Farther south, seeding can be done also in January and February. Any time is good when seeding be-fore a rain or when plenty of moisture is in the ground and always gives excellent results. Do not seed in exceedingly warm or hot weather.

**PREPARATION OF TOP-SOIL:** Fertilize at the same time seed is sown. Prepare the top soil by finely pulverizing it with a rake so the seed when raked in will be lightly covered. On new lawns the ground should be finely pulverized on top and the top thoroughly rolled to a uniform grade.

, Lawns both new and old need complete fertilizer regularly and good heavy seed. I find the best lawn fertilizer is a mixture of bone meal and steamed pul-verized sheep manure mixed half and half then spread on at the rate of 100 pounds per two thousand square feet. Both act slowly and surely. Many lawns in the Central West have been fertilized and built up by this method. Better and cheaper than any prepared commercial fertilizer that I know of.

**AMOUNT TO USE:** Use seed freely. Sow on a still day so distribution will be uniform. Seed either by hand or with a hand seeder—the seeder gives more even turf. Use one pound per 200 square feet for new seeding and one pound for every 400 square feet to thicken old secding. If quicker lawn is desired, use more seed.

**KIND TO SOW:** In our own Central West, Iowa, Kansas, Nebraska, Missouri, Illinois, the following is a sure go if the seed bed is properly prepared. Cana-dian blue grass, Maypark mixture, Kentucky Blue Grass or a mixture of grass seed and clover are used.

In general, a good mixture is the best to sow be-cause of its quickness of growth, permanency, and ease of getting a perfect lawn.

Weeds in a lawn are few and far between if the grass is clipped regularly after it gets 2 inches high, and is well enriched with the recommended fertilizer. Clipping forces the grass to stool out and spread. Fertilizing enables the grass to remain healthy and green even during hot, dry weather. Plan a beau-tiful well kcpt lawn today.

In the southern states Bermuda grass is used, also Kentucky Blue Grass, a mixture of blue grass and clover, also Maypark mixture is very good. Finish your lawn by rolling and watering heavily. Water very heavily once each week till well established.



Only hulled or scarified seed should be sown after the middle of February, and this hould be sown either alone, the same as Red Clover, or by itself on grain land so that if can be harrowed in and give the seed some covering. Cover the seed about on-half inch deep; in light soil or in dry weather it should be covered an inch deep. My Sweet Clover seed is all double scari-fied. By scarifying, I mean that it has been which removes the hull and scratches the seed coat so that it will take up moisture and germinate quickly. I like to sow about 15 pounds to the acre and I recommend only scarified seed for best fesults. Remember the crop is 40% less han last year, and the demand is heavy. It will stand a lot of grief, is hardy and produces just lots of hay under the most unfavorable growing conditions. 

#### HOW TO GROW SUDAN GRASS

After the ground warms up in the spring and danger of cool, frost or freezing weather is over, sow at the rate of 20 to 25 pounds per acre and cover about one inch deep. Sudan is a good crop to plow under, as it makes a lot of green manure and humus. We use it here in our nursery for this purpose, and it also helps smother out weeds.

## **Brome Grass**

The greatest grass crop for dry climate there is. The seed is large, too large to go through a seeder so must be sown by hand. It is such a high yielding crop that seed has been short the past several years. Roots go down 5 to 6 feet deep, stays green when other grasses get brown, the severe winters do not damage it. It grows on clays, loams and sandy soils. It usually makes a hay crop the first year, although the second and third years are much larger in yield. Once seeded it will last for a great many years. So alone at the rate of about 20 pounds per acre, either spring or fall. Or sow with Yellow Blossom Sweet Clover, using 10 pounds of Yellow Blossom Sweet Clover and 12 pounds of Brome Grass. Cover Brome Grass not more than one-half inch deep. I have seed that's free of quack grass and all bad weeds. Let me send you a sample of it.

## **Rape–Dwarf Essex**

Each year more and more genuine Dwarf Essex Rape is being sown, and on good rich land, it will produce as high as 12 tons of green feed. It is a wonderful hog pasture and can be pastured from six to eight weeks after you sow it. It only takes 6 to 8 pounds of seed per acre, and is the most eco-nomical hog pasture for you tosow. I don't believe it's quite as good as my regular Hog Pasture Mix-ture, but it's hard to beat. Helps keep down weeds, too. Sow it alone, either broadcast or drill.

You can sow it with oats in the spring by waiting until the oats are up, then broadcast the rape and harrow along drill rows to cover. Rape comes along and makes a fast growth after the oats are cut. Some sow in corn at the last cultivation. It can also be sown with soy beans or clovers. The Iowa State College at Amcs recommends using four pounds of rape to about ten pounds of Sudan Grass for a balanced pasture.

Remember hogs like rape better than any other pasture except alfalfa.



SOY BEANS

Soy Beans are one of the most popular annual legumes that is being grown in the Corn Belt. They can be used for hay, pasture, silage, oil meal and are good to mix in with your home grown feeds. It is good for hogging down, either by itself or planted with 90-day corn. Dairy cows like soy beans, and it produces 12 to 13 tons of green fodder per acre. Soy beans will usually average about 25 bushels of beans per acre on average yields. HOW TO PLANT. Plant soy beans from corn

  HOW TO PLANT. Plant soy beans from corn planting time until the fourth of July. Of course, the earlier they are planted, the bigger the yield. Never sow before the ground is thoroughly warm. Drill in rows 8 to 10 inches apart, using a bushel or a bushel and a half per acre. When planting with corn, use a bean attachment to the planter and use six pounds of beans per acre. It can also be broadcast at last cultivation, 20 to 30 pounds of seed per acre and covering shallow.

**BLACK WILSON.** We always have lots of call for a black seeded bean, so we picked this one out for you because it is one of the earliest black beans you can sow. Fairly good size and is equal to Manchu, Illini or Virginia for hay, for pasture, or for hogging down. ## FODDER AND FORAGE CROPS

I've built up quite a reputation on fodder seed, as well as on legumes. For a catch crop, for dry seasons, for late seedings, fodders are hard to beat. They always produce abundantly every year if not sown too early. Every one of these varieties grows where there is lots of moisture and gives tremendous yields on fertile land having lots of rainfall. There is nothing finer for plowing under to add green manure to the soil and for making a big crop of hay, and for seeding on land to help keep down the weeds.

EARLY AMBER CANE. This is one of the most popular varieties of fodder cane. Ma-tures carly and is the standby in Northern Kansas and Southern Nebraska. Sow 50 to 100 pounds per acre, and, of course, the more you sow per acre, the finer quality hay you get.

RANGE CANE. Is an all-purpose cane, too, and is preferred in Eastern Kansas, Mis-souri and Southern Iowa. Use these canes for fodder only. ORANGE CANE.

- **KAFFIR CORN.** This is also a popular drouth resisting fodder and is used mostly for hay and grain in the drier sections of the Middle West. Makes fine chicken feed and hog feed, too. Kaffir grows every place in the corn belt but is used mostly in the very dry portions, where other crops are hard to grow late in the season. It's equally as resistant to drouth as Brome Grass.
- MILO MAIZE. Somewhat similar to Kaffir and is equally drouth resisting. It is a little larger seed and requires about 20% less seed per acre. I think you'll find that 90 pounds per acre is about the right amount.
- FETERITA. It has a larger grain and is three weeks earlier than either Kaffir or Milo Maize, and for that reason is grown farther north for a quick crop of hay. Makes good pasturo when it's young and is always popular for a late crop.
- GERMAN MILLET. This is the finest millet for you to grow. Is probably the most popular forage crop, outside of Sudan that you can plant. If you're going to be short on feed, sow several acres. It doesn't make much differ-ence on what kind of soil, whether wet or dry, high or low, it will return you plenty of feed.
