

Latifolius. Climber. Rose and red.

LAVENDULA. (Lavender).

Vera. Fragrant blue flowers in July and August. 35c and 60c.

LIATRIS. (Kansas Gayfeather).

Pychnostachya. Light purple. July-Aug. 4-5 ft. Scariosa. Spikes of flowers about 3 ft. in height, of a clear purple color. Aug.-Sept.
