Treating seed corn is an easy job. Half an hour's work treats the seed for 80 acres. It's easy on the pocketbook, too, costing only about $2\frac{1}{2}$ cents per acre.

The most important thing, however, is that it pays to treat seed corn with *New Improved Semesan Jr.* There's no doubt about that. Fifty-one farm tests in 20 Corn Belt counties have been conducted on fertile soils and poor soils; on heavy soils and light, sandy soils; with tested seed and non-tested seed; in good seed beds and poorly prepared, cloddy seed beds.

We can't begin to give you in this booklet the results of all these tests, but the table below contains a fair sample. These are the figures for all tests completed on 14 Iowa and Illinois farms in 1933. The yields from seed treated with *New Improved Semesan Jr.* are compared with the yields from the same seed untreated and planted under identical, actual farm conditions. The treated seed out-yielded the untreated seed in every case by $1\frac{1}{4}$ to $6\frac{1}{4}$ bushels per acre. The average increase in yield was over $3\frac{1}{2}$ bushels per acre or about 8%.

EARN DOLLARS

A Good Stand Is Half the Battle

Every corn grower knows the importance of securing a good stand. But good stands, especially for early plantings or when the soil is cold and wet, are hard to get. Too many missing hills and too many hills with only one stalk usually leave a stand that is only fair. That's what cuts into your corn income year after year.

New Improved Semesan Jr. should help to give you better stands. It generally protects the seed from decaying, and the seedlings from blights and root rots caused by such fungi as *Diplodia* and *Gibberella*. In most of the Iowa and Illinois tests reported on the previous page, treatment of the seed increased the stand over untreated seed by 5 to 15%.

In many sections last year was a poor seed corn year. Your seed may not be up to its usual quality. Don't take chances with it. A little time spent in testing it for germination and a small investment in *New Improved Semesan Jr.* will usually pay big returns at harvest.

Knee High by the Fourth of July

An old maxim among corn growers is that, "Corn should be knee high by the Fourth of July." That's just another way of saying the young corn plant should get a good, early start if it is to make a good yield.

While riding the cultivator, have you ever noticed how many plants were only a foot high when the others were twice as tall? There's a reason for those small plants. Most of them have been stunted during the seedling stage by the attacks of certain fungi (molds) carried on the seed and in the soil. At harvest time most of those stunted plants will be barren or will produce only nubbins.

No seed treatment can grow a big ear on every stalk, but *New Improved Semesan Jr.* can reduce the number of weak, stunted plants. A good stand of plants, "knee high by July 4th," usually means a good crop of corn. That's why *New Improved Semesan Jr.* adds 1 to 6 extra bushels per acre to your corn crop.



SEED CORN TREATMENT FACTS

FOR MANY YEARS, farmers have treated wheat and other grain seeds to control smut. The treatment of seed corn, however, is a comparatively new farm practise; and many corn growers are not yet entirely familiar with its purpose.

What You May Expect

New Improved Semesan Jr. usually will improve the stand and increase the yield of field and sweet corn. The average increase in yield in a large number of tests has been about 10%. Whether your increase will be 5 or 25% depends upon many factors, such as the quality of your seed, its freedom from disease, and the soil conditions at planting time.

What You Should Not Expect

New Improved Semesan Jr. will not control corn smut, wire worms, and grubs. Neither will it prevent damage by gophers, ground squirrels, moles, crows, or similar pests. It is not designed for those purposes.

Practically Friction-less

Rub a pinch of *New Improved Semesan Jr.* between your thumb and finger, and note how smooth it is—practically friction-less, smooth as silk. Treated seed is dropped by the planter just as uniformly and accurately as untreated seed. And, of course, it can't cause any planter trouble.

A Tiny Cloud of Gas

As soon as the seed is planted, *New Improved Semesan Jr.* jumps to its task, throwing around the seed a tiny, protecting cloud of gas or vapor. This vapor is harmless to the seed and seedling, but it helps to prevent the disease germs (spores) on the seed and in the soil from attacking the germinating seed and seedling. It maintains this protecting cloud of vapor until the young plant is well started. No wonder it often increases stands and yields!

Corn Is King!

CORN IS KING! Even if his crown is a little battered and his robes a little shabby from low prices, Corn is still King! Don't forget that.

As a corn grower, your prosperity depends largely upon corn. Be loyal to your corn crop. Don't neglect it because prices are not as high as they should be. Prices will be higher. We all know that.

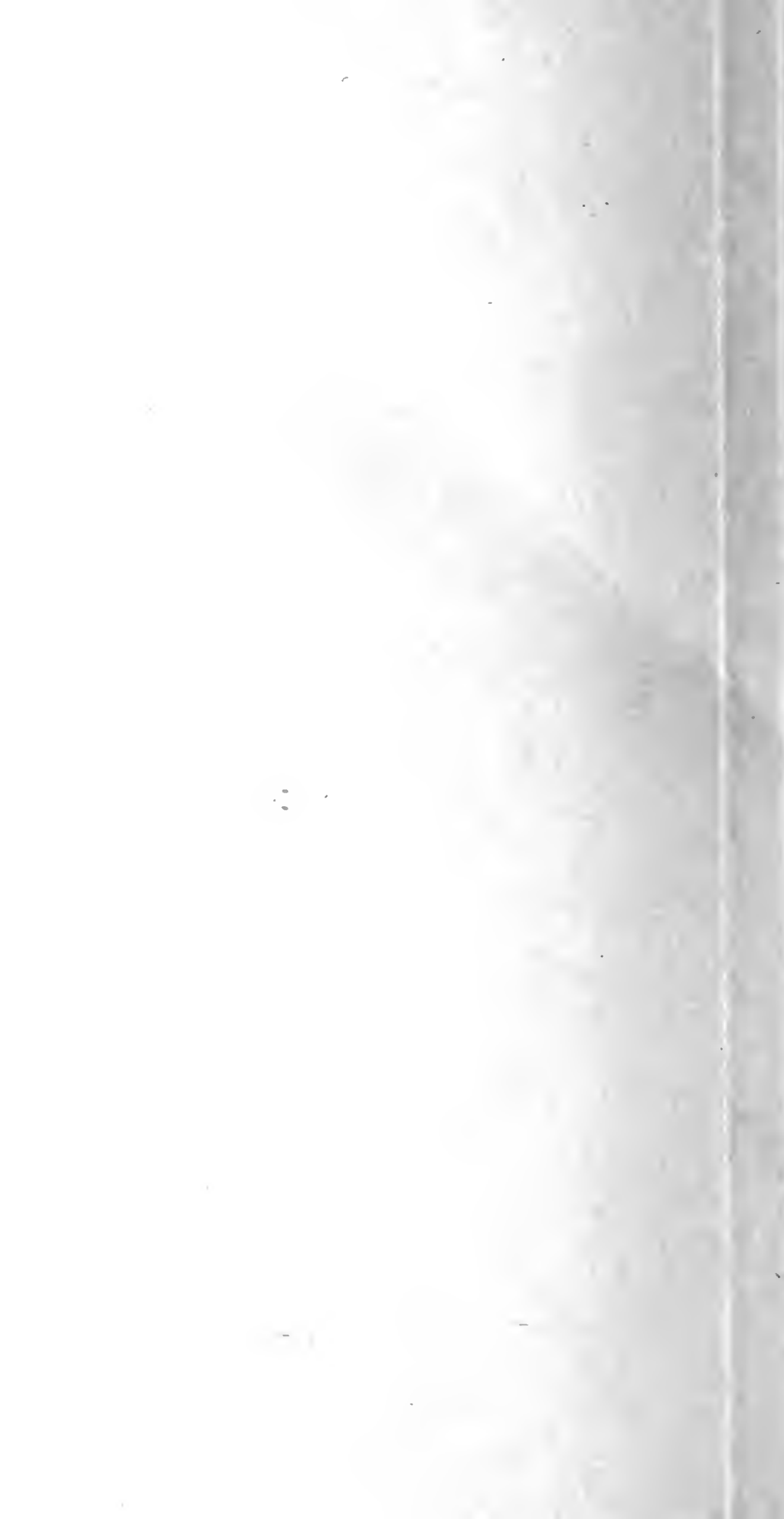

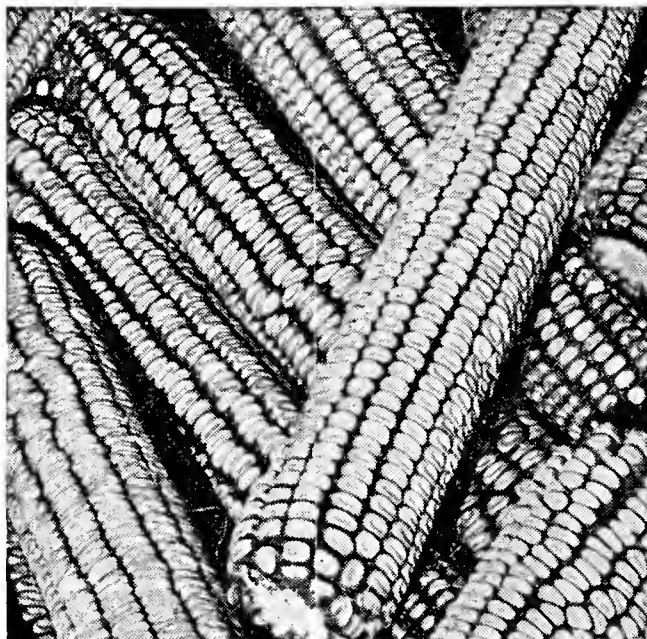
