


Early Varieties Beaver







Alfred.

Early Harvest

GARDEN ROOTS

Martha Washington Asparagus

This variety is the result of careful breeding by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C., with the object of eliminating rust It produces large, straight shoots of a dark green color. The tips are tight and firm and do not open out or begin to branch until well out of the ground; a very valuable feature.

Nothing that comes out of the home garden is so much appreciated as the tender tips and

fresh stalks of asparagus. A small bed of them kept weed-free, or a border along the garden edge, will supply the average table for six weeks or more in late spring.

In planting, make the soil rich; dig trench, set 12 to 18 inches apart, roots spread out, crown two inches below surface, and tamp soil well about the roots.

Myatt's Linnaeus Rhubarb

This Rhubarb differs greatly from the old "pie plant" and the stalks are very large, tender, juicy, and mild in flavor. The yield is abundant and stalks can be cut much earlier than common varieties.



Following we give most common planting distances for berry plants and number of plants required per acre.

If you prefer to plant other distances than those listed, here is a simple rule to determine the number of plants required for an acre. Multiply the distance between rows, in feet, by the distance between plants in the row, in feet. This will give the number of square feet required for one plant. Divide this into 43,560, the number of square feet in an acre, and the result will be the number of plants you will need for one acre of ground.

Hardy Northern Grown FRUIT TREES

Our Fruit Trees are all graded to the standards of the American Association of Nurserymen. Peach trees are all 1-yr. 9/16-inch caliper, and up, 4 to 6 ft. high. All other trees are 2-yr. 9/16-inch caliper, and up, 4 to 6 ft. high.

Some firms are listing this same grade of trees as a 5 to 6 ft. tree, thus attempting to give the impression that their stock is larger. Do not be misled—buy your trees by caliper. Remember, our trees are all 9/16 inch caliper, and up. This size is too large for parcel post shipment without severely pruning the trees, and is best shipped by express.

Apples

BALDWIN. Leading commercial winter apple for market or storage. Large glossy red fruit with very firm flesh. Good flavor, good cooker, good keeper.

CORTLAND. New. Bears very young. Fruit large, beautiful dark red striped with carmine and yellow. Flesh fine grained, crisp and juicy, white and firm. Ripens about two weeks after McIntosh.

DELICIOUS. Grand champion of winter apples. Red with pin dots of yellow. Fine grained, crisp, juicy, with mild, pleasant flavor. Ranks with the best winter varieties.

HYSLOP CRAB. Leading Crab for home use and market. Large, round, with yellow skin and red coloring, overspread with purple bloom. Flesh yellow, crisp, juicy.


