The freight rate you actually pay is exactly the same no matter who makes the shipment, as freight rates are not determined by the shipper, or by the railroad. They are controlled by the Interstate Commerce Commission. If you would like to know what the actual freight charge will be on any article or order, ask your Station Agent, telling him the exact weight as stated in our catalog and where the article will be shipped from, or write to Sears Personal Service and we will gladly figure it for you.

Freight Is Economical

When your merchandise is sent by freight, shipping charges are much less than other methods of transportation. Of course, 100 pounds or more is the most economical freight shipment, because all railroads charge as much for carrying less than 100 pounds as they do for a full 100 pound shipment. When the weight of your order is more than 100 pounds you pay freight charges based on the actual weight, but in no case less than the minimum charge which is 50c.

The descriptions of this merchandise give you these various points of shipment. These articles must be shipped separately and cannot be included with goods shipped from our store.

How to Estimate Freight Charges
If you want to estimate freight charges and you do not know how far you live from our mail order store, refer to map on the parcel post page for approximate distance. Figure up the total weight of your order from the shipping weights given in the descriptions in this catalog. Then, by referring to the chart below, you can easily estimate the freight charges. The actual charge may be slightly more or less, especially when the shipment weighs less than 100 pounds. In such cases the minimum freight charge applies.
Example: Suppose you live about 200 miles from PHILADELPHIA and order an incubator weighing 125 pounds. The list below shows the freight charges for 100 pounds on incubators to be 64c. Multiply the shipping weight, 125 pounds total freight charge.
If There Is a Freight Agent at your station you pay the freight charges when you receive your shipment.
If There Is No Freight Agent at your station, be sure to include with your order sufficient money in addition to the price of the merchandise to cover the freight charges. We always return every penny you send over actual amount required to ship your order.


