SORGHUMS.

On land that will grow Maize you may also sow any of the Sorghums with equal success and one of the most useful of these is Sudan Grass. It makes splendid hay and may also be grown for grazing purposes but of course it is an annual, lasting only the one season.

MILLETS.

For Green Forage Crops there is nothing better than a good Millet. "Japan Barnyard" is undoubtedly the best on reasonably good soil, but "Proso" and "Pearl" Millet are also excellent varieties and will stand more hardships than the first named. "Pearl" Millet in particular is capable of growing on hot, sandy soil which would not support any other similar crop. All the Millets are summer growers and may be sown from September onwards. Don't sow the Pearl Millet too early because it is intolerant of cold conditions.

THE "KUDU" PROCESS OF FORMALDEHYDE TREATMENT FOR SMUT IN GRAIN.

The Kudu-Formal treatment for smut is simple and effective. It is now almost aniversally used by the most successful grain farmers of the Western Province, who find it easier to work and more reliable than the old liming process.

The spores of smut are found everywhere, every season, and it is imperative that all seed should be treated before sowing. To omit this precaution is to jeopardise your crop, and fortunately the trouble and expense involved are so slight that none need omit it.

The seed may be treated on a clean floor or tarpaulin by spraying the solution over and working the seed over continually to make sure that every part of the seed is thoroughly wetted. Then work the grain up into a heap and allow to remain overnight, or for at least 5 hours, covered with sacks to keep in the gas that is generated. Afterwards, remove the covering and spread the seed sufficiently to allow it to dry off for sowing.

Another method is by dipping, and that also is described in the directions sent with every package of Kudu-Formal.

IMPROVE YOUR LAND

Lucerne on your grain lands. Sow it in the last crop before leaving the ground to rest. It will improve the pasture and you will get a better crop of grain when you begin the next rotation. You need not spend much on it, you can sow anything from 10 to 25 lbs per acre and it will pay you well. We have a cheap grade of seed which is unsuitable for export but quite suitable for this job. It does not matter if there is a little dodder in it because that will not hurt your pasture and will be destroyed next time you plough the land.

Grasses-Grasse.

It is necessary to use careful judgment about the time for sowing Grasses and it is a little difficult for us to advise definitely about this matter because conditions vary so much in South Africa and the advice that would suit one part might mean failure elsewhere. We think growers will be helped most reliably if we point out that there are roughly two sets of conditions prevailing and these arise out of the fact that there is a summer rainfall in certain areas as against a winter rainfall in others. Both these areas can grow grasses quite successfully but irrigation must play an important part in the process under certain conditions.

The main point is to decide whether we shall sow in autumn, or in spring or early summer. There are not many grasses that are suitable for spring sowing under winter rainfall. Most of the European grasses are better sown in autumn under such conditions. Under summer rainfall, however, conditions are quite different and it is necessary to sow grasses at the most favourable time. When that time is must be determined in each district by growers accustomed to the local conditions.

Where irrigation is possible the Rye Grasses and other European grasses are frequently sown in March even under summer rainfall and that approximates to the Western Province practice of sowing in autumn. Here it is preferably April or May but only because the earlier rains are insufficient. It would be better if we could sow earlier.

The preparation of the soil for pasture grasses is a matter of the utmost importance. It can not be too well done. It is very necessary that the soil should be worked to a very fine tilth. This is important because many of the grass seeds are very small and if the surface is rough before sowing many will be too deeply covered while others will lie too near the surface and may be scorched before they can take root.

Mixtures are usually sown at the rate of 30 lbs per acre but when certain varieties are sown alone the quantity varies according to the variety.

The seed is sown with a small broadcast seeder, such as the "Cyclone" or the "Cahoon" Seeder, or it may be broadcasted by hand. This latter method requires great care to ensure even distribution and it may be necessary to mix the seed with some fine material to increase the bulk. This requires great care to ensure proper mixing.

Before sowing the seed bed should be very carefully compacted by rolling. The object is to provide a firm seed bed in which the young seedlings can take root quickly and from which the moisture will not be too readily evaporated. A fine tilth and loose surface about an inch in depth will provide these conditions. It follows that after rolling the soil will again be scarified with a light harrow.

The next operation is the covering of the seed and it needs even greater care than the preceding. The seed may be covered with a light bush-drag or by rolling once and light harrowing afterwards—any method that will ensure even covering may be used. If the soil has been thus well prepared and the fates are kind to you so that favourable weather prevails, a good growth can be expected, but much damage may be done by a few days of hot and dry weather immediately after sowing. The careful and experienced farmer will have the soil prepared well in advance and the seed ready at hand waiting for favourable weather conditions.

When such conditions prevail the seed can be sown without any delay and will thus be able to take full advantage of them.

During recent years there has been much progress in the establishment of pasture and there are now growers in the Western Province who sow large quantities of seed annually.

Several grasses have proved valuable which have hitherto been neglected. The following are a few of them. Herd's Grass, Yorkshire Fog, Kentucky Blue Grass and Akaroa Cocksfoot.

The use of Clover in pasture mixtures continues to give favourable results and for this purpose Wild White Clover is particularly desirable. We are fortunately able to offer New Zealand grown seed of this at much lower prices than formerly prevailed for the Wild White variety and this seed is now very extensively used by our best growers. You will find it quoted in the Clover section of this catalogue.

Grasses—Grasse.

If you have a PASTURE PROBLEM send it to us. Give us full information regarding the conditions and we will help you all we can. If we think you have a fair chance of success with it we will suggest a mixture specially for your requirements. We have done the same before for many other pastoralists and almost invariably the results have been favourable. Let us try to help you also. We can assure you that we will not recommend you to sow what we do not expect will be successful under the conditions you name. We do not attempt to get business in that way because we want permanent business just as badly as you want a permanent pasture. Ask others around you who have dealt with us. They will tell you that that is not our way.

Quantity to Sow.—In the case of Pasture Mixtures 30 lbs per acre is the usual quantity sown and it is always advisable to give a good seeding.

Most grasses sown alone are seeded at the rate of from 25 to 30 lbs per acre. The following exceptions may be noted: Phalaris tuberosa about 8 lbs; Teff about 6 lbs; the Rye Grasses always about 30 lbs.

COCKSFOOT.

(Dactylis glomerata)

Lawns—Grasperke. THEIR PREPARATION AND UPKEEP.

In order to produce a good dense turf of good fine texture it is necessary that the soil should be well prepared beforehand and that the right seed should be used—a mixture containing only the finer grasses and such as do not become tufty.

The following notes will be found helpful.

Preparation of the Soil.—This should be taken in hand well in advance and the soil should be worked up again and again to a good depth during the warm weather so that the sun may have an opportunity of penetrating to all parts of the soil and exerting its beneficial influence. Stones and other coarse matter should be removed and the ground thoroughly pulverised wherever necessary. A good Fertilizer should be applied while this preparation is being carried out. best for the purpose is our Special Grass Fertilizer and it should be used at the rate of 4 to 6 ozs. per square yard. rate of 4 to 6 ozs. per square yard. After thoroughly working up the soil as described it should be consolidated by rolling or trampling, or other suitable means, and the surface should be raked over carefully to provide a seed-bed.

Sowing the Seed.—In districts with a winter rainfall this should preferably be done in the autumn and Starke's Kudulawn Grass should be used at the rate of ½ oz. to the square yard. This thick sowing is necessary in order to provide a dense turf from the start. It is much better to secure a good result at the The seed should be commencement than to endeavour to patch it afterwards. lightly covered by raking or brushing the surface with a bunch of twigs or by dragging a light bush harrow over it and if any uncovered seed remains it should

be covered by a light dusting of fine soil.

Top Dressing.—Frequent top dressing with soil is not desirable unless to even up the ground. If the grass is cut frequently the clippings may be allowed to remain on the lawn and will prove of great benefit to it as they decay and provide a good protection to the roots during the hot weather. They also add to the humus in the soil which assists in making the plant food available. light dressing of our Special Grass Fertilizer should be applied each season.

Weeds .- These will always make their appearance in new lawns in spite of the They are always present in the soil and most careful preparation and treatment. must be removed if the finer grasses are to have a fair chance. Hand-weeding is usually resorted to but much can be done by continuous mowing once the lawn grass

is well established.

All growing crops require nitrogen. Root Crops-Wortels.

Next to pasture the most important matter to the Sheep Farmer is the production of cultivated crops for his most valuable stock. Mangels, Turnips and other roots are very extensively grown in other countries for this purpose but in South Africa they are comparatively neglected. Can South Africa afford to neglect such valuable crops as these?

Quantity to Sow.—All these crops are best sown in drills, 12 to 15 inches apart for Carrots and Chicory, the same for Turnips; Swedes want a little more room, say 18 inches, and Mangels and Beet are usually sown 18 to 24 inches apart. Much depends on the implements in use. It pays to sow further apart in order to introduce labour-saving appliances. Carrots and Chicory require a seeding of 3 to 4 lbs per acre, Swedes and Turnips may be sown at the rate of 2 lbs per acre and Mangels 8 to 10 lbs. If you use a drill you may have to vary the quantity according to what the implement can do. You may sow a little too thickly to secure even distribution because you must, in any case, thin out the rows afterwards and a little seed wasted may mean a greater saving in labour.

The cultivation is simple and it has the advantage of being partial to situations near the sea, thriving in sandy soil on which it would be difficult to produce a crop of any other kind.



Most of the species listed under this heading belong to that great and interesting group of South African plants, Mesembryanthema, which has in recent years, attracted a great deal of attention throughout the world.


In the arid regions of the Karroo, Bushmanland and the Kalahari an amazing number of new species has been discovered to which various expeditions, led by the best veldsmen available and equipped at great expense, have added considerably.

It is in the desert that the most fascinating varieties are found. To combat the scanty rainfall nature has endowed these plants with a capacity for storing water in their thick fleshy leaves, thus enabling them to tide over periods of drought which no other plant would survive. They furnish the only available water supply to the herds of antelope, wild ostriches and even to the tortoise and were it not for a remarkable provision of nature these plants would long since have been exterminated. In their natural surroundings these "rock plants" so closely resemble the gravel or rock fragments among which they grow that, even to the best trained eye, they are almost invisible, and it is due to this fact that they have, in the populated areas, escaped complete extinction.

All the varieties listed below are easily propagated from seed and given free drainage and a light soil will thrive well under cultivation. They include the most recent discoveries, some of which have not yet been specifically named and are unobtainable from any other seedsmen in the world.

Construction.




HUMIDITY GAUGES.

Few Poultry Breeders appreciate the important part played by the moisture conditions in an Incubator. Large numbers of chicks die in shell every year, due almost entirely to the lack of a correct percentage of moisture during the Incubation period.
