


Azalea Mollis Pink Flowering Dogwood

Praised for centuries in our songs and beloved by our poets, the lovely Scotch Heather has not been widely planted in the United States, first because it has been expensive and, second, because many of the varieties have not been reliably hardy. For a number of years a famous plantsman has been testing Heather and we have been watching his experiments. Hardy va-rieties have finally been developed; plants which stood thirty degrees below zero during the terrible winter of 1933-1934 without damage.

These same varieties withstood the fearful drought of last summer without injury. There is now no reason why these lovely plants should not be planted, since the cost is now less than some of the common things.

The lovely Scotch Heather may be used as groups in the perennial border, as edgings for planting, in front of evergreen plantings in-cluding Broad-Leaved Evergreens. They are quite wonderful in rockeries.


