After experimenting with several species, the one proving the most resistant has been our own native R. Setigera (Prairie Rose). Jackson & Perkins are the distributors of this new strain and are here offering the first variety to be put in commerce. Others will come from year to year. To distinguish this truly American Strain, a special set of names has been selected from Pirate Legends, and the Horvath series will be known as "Treasure Island Roses."
