OHIO VALLEY DAHLIAS

A Chat About Green Plants

Your success in growing dahlias from green plants depends greatly upon the quality of the plants you buy. A rapidly grown plant will naturally be soft and if subjected to severe hardships may perish, or suffer so severely that it may take a great while to overcome the shock. If the roots have been allowed to become overcrowded in the pot the stems become hardened and recovery is very doubtful.

To insure sturdy, vigorous plants it is first of all necessary that cuttings be properly made from strong, clean stock. The plants should be grown slowly to encourage short, thick stalks and a strong root system. Precautions should always be taken to avoid infections, over crowding of roots in pots and to see that growth is continuous and steady.

Plants produced in this manner by us have proved highly successful in the gardens of our customers. Their success with them is assurance to us that our plants are second to none. To insure correctness in quality we personally do all propagating and growing of our plants and select and prepare them for shipment to you.

We suggest removing all soil from the roots of plants before planting out. Regardless of the reliability of the grower from whom purchased or the vigor of the plant upon arrival, the roots are sometimes twisted. If grown in pots the roots must find room to expand and naturally follow the walls of the pot, thus becoming entwined. Straightening the roots before planting will insure better growth and a nice, straight clump of roots at digging time. All soil may be removed without damage to roots by soaking the root ball in water until soft enough to wash away. The roots may then be straightened without difficulty.

While realizing fully that your failure with our plants would impair your valued patronage, we are so confident of their superiority that we recommend them unreservedly. They will produce as satisfactorily as roots and make your money go twice as far.

If we can help you with your dahlia troubles, our experience is at your command.
