## DAHLIAS

The following Dahlias are supplied in dormant field-grown roots or divisions and each division before we ship them out must show a live eye or sprout. They come packed in peat moss. Plant the divisions 6 inches deep 3 to 4 feet apa:in good garden soil. Pinch out the to" of the plant when it has developed 6 leaves. Dig in fall after first hard frost.

Store away in fruit cellar upside down. Cover with dry straw or peat moss. Divide the clumps in the spring. The price per dozen will be 10 times the price of a single division. Six at dozen rate.

## THE HARDY LILIES

Lillies are the most fragrant and beautiful of all bulbous plants and stand flrst in that class with thelr graceful habit and rlch coloring making them invaluable for decoration, either as cut flowers or border plants. All Lilies demand good dralnage. They should be planted in open, porous soil. Surround the bulb with sand and plant them on their side. All bulbs offered below are large flowsering sizes.
AURATUM (Golden-banded lily of Japan). Platyphyllum. A King of Lilies. A lovely variety wlth yellow spots, very fragrant. Plant 10 lnches deep. Bulb, $\$ 1.00$; doz., \$10.00.
