

SOIL CONDITIONS FOR ORIENTAL POPPIES—Oriental poppies are not at all particular in their soil requirements. They will thrive and prosper in any good garden soil, whether it be sandy, clay, loam, or even heavy clay. However, they dislike any condition where poor drainage allows water to stand over them for any prolonged period, or even where the water level is as close as six inches from the surface of the ground. They do not seem to be particular as to lime or acid soils, nor should they have any strong fertilizer in any form. Leaf mold seems to be their favorite source of food where it is felt that some additional plant food should be added to the soil.

TIME TO PLANT ORIENTAL POPPIES—A great many people are not familiar with the planting period of oriental poppies. As a general rule, poppies are in active growing condition from September 15th until June 15th. Their dormant or rest period, therefore, is in the summer months from June 15th to September 15t. It is next to impossible to successfully transplant oriental poppies except in their dormant period, although they are offered for sale by some people throughout the entire year. It is possi-

ble to plant young potted plants in the fall and spring, but it usually requires two full seasons of growth to develop a sturdy plant, whereas, if good sized, field-grown clumps are planted in July or August they will produce gratifying results the following season.

CARE OF ORIENTAL POPPIES—Oriental poppies need very little special care, as they are not ordinarily susceptible to disease or insect pests. About the only care which is necessary is the usual cultivation and weed control, and when new plants are entering their first winter it is well to mulch the surface of the ground under the leaves of the plant with a light layer of excelsior or straw. However, this is not absolutely necessary if the soil is well drained and if it is not inclined to cause heaving by successive freezing and thawing. Newly planted poppies will require moderate watering if a dry season should prevail following their planting.

ARRANGEMENT OF POPPIES IN THE GARDEN—Oriental poppies have long suffered the teputation of not harmonizing with other garden flowers. This idea is the fruit of ignorance, for there are a great many varieties of poppies which will go well with any other respectable garden flowers. One of the prettiest garden combinations conceivable is a soft

pink poppy such as Watteau or Pink Beauty in combination with Belladonna Delphinium and Madonna Lilies. Another good combination is the variety Welcome used with Regal Lilies with a good variety of Mack Orange as a background. Of course, the promiscuous use of the old-fashioned seedling oriental poppies does create a clash of colors in the garden, but a little fore-thought in the proper selection of named varieties will avoid any such criticism. The deep red oriental poppies always make a splendid appearance where they can have a background of dark green evergreens or white blooming shrubs such as Syringas.

SEQUENCE OF BLOOM—Modern developments in the varieties of oriental poppies have extended the petiod of bloom a great deal. With the proper selection of varieties we can now extend the poppy season over a period of nearly six weeks, beginning the 15th of May and ending the first of July. The earliest variety to bloom is the double, otange-colored Olympia. This is soon followed by May Queen and Harmony. Other vety early varieties coming before the first of June are Heuri Cayeux, King George and Beauty of Livermere. The first half of June brings Mrs. Lula A. Neeley, Purity, Enfield Beauty, Cerise Beauty, Julia

Buck, and Mahony into bloom. These are followed by Lightness, Salmon King, Gaiety, Joyce, and then come Perfection, Perry's White, Wundershind, Mundarin, and Trilby. The season is usually ended with the last flowers of Mrs. Stobart, Loreley, Colonel Boueles, and Echo.

ORIENTAL POPPIES IN BOUQUETS—It is generally thought that oriental poppies are not satisfactory to use as cut flowers. When properly prepared, they will maintain their freshness and last as long as many other varieties of garden flowers. The newly opened flowers or buds which have burst and are showing color are the ones to cut. Then burn the cut ends of the stems over a blaze until they have charred to a length of one to two inches. Then immerse the stems in cold, deep water and place in a cool, shaded location for a couple of hours, after which time they may be arranged in suitable houquets and by adding fresh cool water twice a day they will give surprising results. Arrangement of an oriental poppy bouquet is largely a matter of personal taste. We have found, however, that single colors, or assorted colots of harmonizing shades, make the loveliest bouquets and, because of the nature of poppies, they appear to best advantage when arranged in groups.
