Predominating color a Geranium Pink, deeper at outer edges of petals. Reverse of petals Peach Red. Large Baryta Yellow throat on all lower petals. Speckled Rhodimine Purple on each side of Yellow Midrib. Cream midrib on upper petals. The petals are a very heavy texture, ruffled and with a very decided twill to the points thereof. Four to six wide open florets at once on an 18 to 22 bud spike. Blooms in early season.

COHOE Registration # 2480

Predominating color Geranium Pink with white midrib on lower central petal, penciled purple on each side of midrib in throat. Extremely willowy stem with four to six wide open, plain petal triangular formed florets on a spike carrying 18 or more buds. A very early bloomer. With its heavy texture and flexible stem it is an ideal commercial decorative variety for cut flowers.

HILL BILLY (Tower) Very tall grower. Rose doree, overlaid with purple, yellow and red. Opens five to seven  $\frac{1}{2}$  florets. Large 35¢ each. Med 25¢ each.

MORONGO (Errey) Great exhibition variety - opens 12 or 14 blooms, perfectly placed and is a good propagator. Colored nice bright salmon on outer part of petals, while the center is yellow lined with scarlet. Sm. 20¢ each. Bulblets 4 for 25¢.

VARIETIES WE HAVE GROWN BUT WISH TO WITHHOLD FOR INCREASE

RED GIANT (Phillips; Australian) One of the three placed in the mammoth class at Ballaret. A bright Cerise, darker in throat. White lined petals.

MILFORD (Rides; New Zealand) A delicate shade of Blue Violet. Opens 8 or 9 florets and was champion seedling at Canterbury.

PITITI (Hill; New Zealand) A new champion from New Zealand. Color Salmon Apricot flecked darker and the throat powdered Henna. Opens twelve florets.

MAUNGA (Burns; New Zealand) Color is pure white and blooms are the massive type. Has won at all of the following New Zealand shows: Normanby, Miramar, Wanganui and Canterbury.

LA FIESTA (Salbach; Calif.) This was offered for the first time last year and what I saw of it I liked fine. It is an Orange shade with a darker Orange throat. Grew very tall and looked as though it would be a comer.

GERTRUDE SWENSON (Swenson; Australia) Is pretty well known but as our stock is limited we wish to grow it another year before listing it. A beautiful shade of Mauve. Opens 12 to 14 flowers at a time all perfectly placed.

BLUE ADMIRAL (Rev. Christ) Grows a very tall straight spike and opens 5 to 6 very large blooms. Color, deep violet blue. A very rapid propagator.

WARATAH (Errey; Australian) A bright Orange Scarlet, center is Crimson touched with Cream. It opens 10 on a fine straight spike. We liked this very much, but stock is scarce so will wait another year before offering it.
