## Hemerocallis

"Ring out ye golden bells" for all summer long, from late May until September, we may now have the new Day Lilies in our gardens:- the orchestra to accompany the garden pictures. Tell us, as you ring, how your gold and yellow and fulvous tones will add joyous colors to our borders; how the grace of your form will lend happy accents; and how easily you adapt yourselves to almost any location. And, if our ears are attuned, we may hear a rollicking chorus played by your chimes, with the pale yellows giving us the upper, silvery notes, the golden varieties delighting us throl the middle register, while the darker ones fill in with the base.

All the older gardens had the Hemerocallis Flava and Fulva; all present-day gardens should have at least one or two of the newer varieties. It is a pleasure to be able to recomend them so heartily, their colors are so fine and they are so easy to grow. Planting directions will be found elsewhere.

We are delighted to be able to offer the eight new varieties that Dr. Stout has originated, and while we have not seen them in bloom, we know that the originator is very particular about his introductions. Our stock is so limited, that we shall have only one or two of each to offer this season.

AMARYLLIS (Betscher) A large fine golden orange with recurving petals and heavily ridged sepals. The shape suggests the flower for which it was named. 3 ft. July-Aug.

## Oriental Poppies

These poppies give us the great splashes of color in the June garden - color so boldly applied, as we said in the introduction, that one can well believe the garden artist used a broad palette knife. Masses of gleaming pink or of deep glowing red, colors so arresting that one involuntarily stops to fill the eye with their beauty. If Oriental Poppies mean to you, just the old brick red, try to picture these newer varieties, some deliciously delicate, some deeply dark, with all the varying shades of pink and red that come in between.

When picking poppies for the house, the ends should be charred for about $2^{\prime \prime}$, and then plunged into cold, deep water, and the flowers put in a cool place for an hour or two. This treatment will insure their keeping for some days.

Orders for poppies are filled in August and September. Planting directions will be found elsewhere in our catalogue.

## Planting Directions

PEONIES

SOIL--rich garden loam is best.
SUN--more the merrier.
DRAINAGE--good drainage assure good results.
FERTILIZER--about 2 handfuls of bone meal worked into the soil at the bottom of the hole when planting; manures in the winter; well rotted manures in spring worked into the soil around and away from the crown.
PLANT--How-the crown(part where the red buds grow out) should be $2^{\prime \prime}$, no more, no less than $2^{n}$, below the surface; dig hole sufficiently large to accomnodate the roots without bending them, not forgetting to work 2 handfuls of bonemeal into the bottom of the hole, and fill in the soil about the roots and firm with hands.
When-September is the best month.
PROTECTION--first winter, mound up $3-4^{\prime \prime}$ of dirt over the top of the plant, remove this in spring but with care not to break off any of the shoots.

## HEMEROCALLIS

SOIL-any soil, rich garden loam the best.
SUN--either sun or some shade, blooming period lasts ionger if planted in partial shade.

DRAINAGE--good drainage desired; no water should be allowed to stand on plants dur ing the winter.
FERTIIIRER--well rotted manures the best; applied in winter as a malch or in spring and worked into the soll.
PLANT--dig holes large enough(diameter) to amply accomodate the roots when they spread out almost flat and work soil amongst roots; plant so that the crown (part where leaves and roots join) is about $2^{\prime \prime}$ below the surface; water during dry spells.
When-anytime-after flowering or early spring considered best.
PROTECTION--peat moss mulch the first winter, $1-2^{n}$; some well rotted manures will be helpful.

## BEARDED IRIS

(Dwarfs, Intermediates, Fall-bloomers, Tall-bearded, and Table)
SOIL--will grow in any soil, garden loam best; either acid or lime, lime best.
SUN--as much as possible, 6 hours or more for best results.
DRAINAGE--good, raised beds desired; absolutely no water standing over plants in winter.
FERTIIIZER--Spring-Bone Meal, if Commercial, use sparingly; work into soil between plants.

Sumer-only if transplanting-Bone Meal, if Commercial very little; Cow Manure, well-rotted and $3-5^{n}$ below plants, this is best done in remaking the bed and only in well drained beds--absolutely no fresh manure.
Fall - Bone Meal safest and only one advised at this time.
PIANT--How-1. heavy soils, plant so that rhizome(thick part of root) is almost on the surface, should be able to see rhizome after watering. Spread the foeding roots(small)out, not straight down; 2. light sandy soils, cover rhizome 音". Water well after planting and during dry periods.
Distance apart- $9^{\prime \prime}$ for bost results.
When-anytime-after flowaring is best and most usual;if late fall, plant same depth as before and then mound up l-1登" of sand, be sure to remove or spread the sand in the spring.
TRANSPLANT--When-after flowering is best for digging and dividing. How often-every 3 or 4 years when plants become crowed.
PROTECTION--Winter-cover new plantings in fall, use straw, salt hay, excelsior, evergreens, anything that won't mat dow and retain the moisture, and will prevent alternate freezing and thawing.
AIR CIRCULATION--important, keep all litter and other plants (especially fast growing annuals) off and away from the iris plants; irises want all the light, air, and sunshine they can get for best results.

BEARDLESS IRIS<br>(Japanese, Siberlans, and many species)

SOIL--any soil, the richer the better; these are heavy feeders.
SUN--best if they have some shade but need at least 3 hours of sunshine.
DRAINAGE--want lots of water while coming into bloom for best results; absolutely no water should be standing on them in winter.
EERTILIZER--manures are excellent (but not too green) apply in winter or spring.
PLANT--When-anytime, early spring and after flowering considered the best, keep them well watsred after moving.
How -plant crown (part where leaves and roots join) $2^{n}$ deep and spread the roots, not straight down, and work soil amongst them.
PROTECTION--peat moss mulch the flrst winter, l-2"; also well rotted manures, work these into the soil in spring.

## ORIENTAL POPPIES

SOIL--any soil, good garden loam, the richer the better-heavy feeders.
SUN--like it-rose and dark colored ones retain their colors better if planted in partial shade.
DRAINAGE-need excellent drainage-absolutely no water to stand on crown (part where leaves grow out) of plant.
FERTILIZER--shovel full of well rotted manure worked into the soll at bottom of $12^{\prime \prime}$ hole; rich leaf mold, $2-3$ years old can also be used.
PLANT--When-August and September best for field grown plants.
How -dig 12" hole and work in manure or leaf mold, plant so that the crown (top of plant where the leaves start) is $2^{n}$ below the level of the bed (the levgl of the bed should be raised, higher than the surrounding ground to afford good drainage.); water well while fllling the soil; keep soll loose and friable over the crown of the plant, but be careful of the loaves coming up.
PROTECTION--straw, salt hay, or excelsior worked around new growth for first year.
