The color suggests a delicate cameo-pink with faint blue shading at center. The effect created by a well grown plant is exquisite and never before seen in Phlox.

The clearness of tone is remarkable, the brilliancy is so pronounced that immediate attention is given to this wonderful plant. As the flower ages, the blooms always retain their delicate pink shade; there never are any so-called purple tones visible.

Out of each leaf joint grows a lateral or secondary flower spike continuing the display of blooms long after the main flower head has disappeared. Columbia is therefore well called the perpetual flowering Phlox.

The sharp contrast between the two shades is very striking and regardless of the fact that you may not like red, you will greatly admire and enjoy owning the Aquilegia Crimson Star. Next year we hope to illustrate this in color, but have only a limited number of plants to offer for this year. A black and white illustration above will give you a fair idea of what it looks like.

## Agapanthus Blue Nile Lily

## Asters, Amethyst and Dazzler <br> Two beautiful tall fall Asters were imported

 from England in 1934. At that time we paid $\$ 5.00$ per plant, but have propagated them so that we are now able to offer them here at a most reasonable price. This, as you no doubt know, is a practice with us.Ernest Ballard, the originator of these two varieties decsribes Amethyst as the nearest double, purple-blue Aster in existence and claims there is nothing like it. In comparing this variety with others, Amethyst is unquestionably the best one in our collection. If you have a fairly large garden and like the fallflowering plants, by all means dig up some of the older things and plant Amethyst and Dazzler in their place.

Of Dazzler, Mr. Ballard says that the flowers are semi-double and the color is a brilliant rosy red. It is an entirely new shade in Asters. The plant is open and rigid and freely branching. A great advance over any other varieties of this same shode.

While speaking of Dazzler and Amethyst, we must not forget the varieties Sunset and Alderman Volkes which made a remarkable showing this fall.

## New Dwarf Hybrid Border Asters

New Dwarf Hybrid Border Asters or Aster Dumosus Hybrids are a wonderful acquisition because they provide an abundance of color in the rock garden late in the summer, and as edging plants to flower beds or borders they are indispensable. Anyone planning a garden which must be at its best in late summer or fall connot do without the New Dwarf Asters. There are several varieties of it available. ## Coronilla Cappadocica Golden Vetch

## Three months in flower

A low growing, creeping plant with cloverlike leaves of a beautiful green. The foliage is green practically throughout the winter During June, July and August the plants are completely hidden by a crop of pale yellow, Lupine-like blooms. It is a splendid edging plant for beds, or walks and a very welcome subject for the rock garden which is bare of bloom during that part of the summer. The plant is not new. We have offered it for the ast three or four years, but it is practically unknown in this country. It is illustrated in color on page C .

## White Hybrid Delphiniums

## 4 to 6 feet tall

The habit of growth and blooming of the White Hybrid Delphiniums is the same as that of the usual blue forms. The flowers are pure white, are single, semi-double and double on strong spikes about 4 to 6 feet tall. They look best when planted in groups of three or more reasonably close to the blue members of their family. Illustrated in color on page B.

## Erythraea Diffusa

## Pink Gentian

While we are on the subject of small and charming plants, we must not overlook Erythraea Diffusa which is often called the Pink Gentian. A most attractive small plant literally covered with pink, star-like blossoms during July and August.
Papaver Art Shades, or the new mixture of Iceland Poppies vie with the Erythraeas for daintiness and brilliancy of color.

## Another Choice Pink Bloomer

Another most useful small plant is Tunica Saxifraga Flore Pleno. It is one of those sub jects which does not ask a great deal in the matter of care or soils but it produces its double pink flowers throughout the summer and early fall in great abundance.

## Teucrium Chamaedrys

For edging beds.
Teucrium Chamaedrys is not altogether a new plant but is only just now receiving it due reward, and should not be omitted. It is a "God-send" for those sections of the country where Boxwood as an edging plant cannot be used for lack of hardiness. Flower beds edged with the thin clear looking Teucrium Chamaedrys and trimmed make just as rich an appearance as if they were edged with Boxwơod.

## Gaillardia, Sun God

## Primula, Moerheim Hybrids Pastel colors

Where these are planted in rich soil and where they are able to get an abundance of moisture they will grow to perfection. Their lovely pastel colors range largely in tones of amber-yellow and pink resembling the shades of the Gladiolus Primulinus. Bloom in une and grow often 2 feet high. Wonderful for cuttin

## Double Russian Violet

For a shady, moist place in the garden we must plant the Double Russian Violets. This is a rare double flowered variety noted for its strong fragrance. It is rather slow growing but when once established is a real acquisition. in early summer.

## Helleborus or Lenten Rose

The White Christmas Rose is rather difficult to grow. The Hybrid Oriental Helleborus are much easier established and we have a fine lot in very interesting colors ranging from white through pale green and all the tones of brown bronze, into the deepest shades of chocolate Unlike the Christmas Rose which is white and blooms during the winter, the Helleborus Orientalis bloom in early spring and are known in Europe as the Lenten Rose. They have very ornamental foliage and are most interesting subjects planted at the base of evergreens or other difficult shady locations where orna mental leaf and interesting bloom is desired.

## Hemerocallis, Hyperion Citron-yellow

Hemerocallis Hyperion, bar none, is the finest Hemerocallis in existence. The color of the bloom is citron-yellow, wide open and produced in abundance.

## Iris Dichotoma Vesper-Iris

No lover of Iris or for that matter plants should be without a few of these Iris in his garden. From England came Phlox Daily Sketch. The flowers are a much deeper pink than Columbia -more a salmon-pink with a strong magenta eye. It is a marvelous grower, tremendous flower and a most useful variety.

## Perovskia Atriplicifolia or Russian Sage

Perovskia Atriplicifolia is another plant we would like to see planted in large quantities We have had this on our nursery now for two years. Its common name is Russian Sage. The habit of the plant is bushy. During July and August and early September, the plants are covered with long whorls of silvery blue flowers which have a lovely, graceful appear ance. The woody flower stalks are approxi mately 30 inches to 3 feet long and are splen did for cutting. The florists like this flower particularly for cutting because it combines beautifully with Dahlias, Gladioli and the taller summer flowers. The foliage is pale gray. The plant is wavy giving a silvery smoky effect Everyone says' that it takes the place of Gyp sophila or Baby's Breath which is so popular

## Lonicera Tellmanniana Golden Honeysuckle

A lovely, fost growing vine and a great improvement over the common Honeysuckle. The eaves are large and clean, giving a very ornamental effect. The blooms which are produced in good sized clusters are golden in color and very fragrant, are much longer and conspicuous than in the common varieties of Honeysuckle. Altogether a fine climber for shady or sunny porches or trellises.

## Fine Lilac Buddleia, Fortune

(Potent Applied For)
Buddleia Fortune is a very worth-while improvement over the common Buddleia (Butterfly Bush). In the first place this new plant is much neater in habit of growth. It does not choke out surrounding plants which is one of the objectionable habits of all the old Buddeias.
Fortune is a splendid variety for the hardy border as well as in front of the shrub border The numerous branches are all tipped with flower spikes measuring 12 to 18 inches long Instead of being flat these racemes are round and full. The flowers are in bloom from base to tip almost all at the same time. No other variety equals it as a cut flower lasting well in water. The color is a true lilac, a most desirable shade. Altogether, Buddleía Fortune is a fine acquisition. Illustrated in color on page

We cannot refrain, however, to add our praise to such varieties os Joanna Hill-a beautiful, clear yellow; Etoile de Hollande, one of the finest reds and we have great expecta tions of the new climbing variety Dubloons offered for the first time this year. The parentage of this Rose is unusual, and it promise to be one of the finest and one of the hordiest of yellow Climbing Roses in existence.

We also want to tell you about Rosa Rou letti. This is one of the, if not the, smalles Rose in commerce today. # New Evergreen Barberry BERBERIS MENTORENSIS 

Plant Patent No. 99

Berberis Mentorensis or better known as the Mentor Barberry is the result of a cross between Barberry Thunbergi and Barberry Juliana. The leaves of this fine shrub are similar in shape to those of Thunbergi, but they are more leathery in structure. The plant is called a semi-evergreen Barberry because the foliage is not dropped in the cold sections of the country until well into February. The further south we go, the longer the leaves remain. The foliage color is a deep rich
green, contrasting very handsomely with the snow and surrounding lighter foliage plants. New leaves are produced very early in the spring. The Mentor Barberry is the only broad-leaved evergreen shrub that can be grown successfully and without special preparation on alkaline soils. It can be bought at a moderate price. The plant produces no seed. It is perfectly hardy and it is a most artistic plant for hedges or ornamental plantings.

There are five outstanding points of superiority about this Barberry:

First-it is evergreen practically the year around. Think what that means.

Second-its sturdy, erect growth carries a thick dark green foliage right down to the ground. Is never bare-legged.

Third-when used for a hedge, its thorny, strong growth forms a formidable barrier to man or beast.

Fourth-needs practically no pruning. Observe its erect growth which becomes dense when the plant is three or four years old.

Fifth-combined in a foundation planting with evergreens, it provides a beautiful and artistic contrast at very small expense and without elaborate preparation of soil.

A very important trait of this Barberry is that it is not "choosey" about where it grows. No matter if you can't make other broad-leaf evergreens, such as Azaleas and Rhododendrons, thrive in your soil, this new Barberry will. It is equally at•home whether it is acid or alkaline soil.

# Hardy Herbaceous and Alpine Plants 

## (Hardy Border and Rock Plants)

Gardeners and lovers of flowers know about the importance of Hardy Perennial plants in the garden. Beginners, we would like to tell that these plants are long lived and with modest care and attention grow larger and finer from year to year. They exist in infinite variety ranging from the tiniest edging of rock plant to tall stately robust plants for backgrounds in larger garden.

Careful selection of plants will enable you to enjoy hardy flowers from earliest spring until snow. Masses of bloom may be had long before the annuals show color.

The most successful and colorful hardy gardens are those which

## ACHILLEA - Milfoil or Yarrow

Showy rock and border perennials, some of which are valuable for cut flowers. Some have silvery and others elegantly cut foliage, which add considerably to the beauty of the plants.
Culture. All will succeed in any good, ordinary soil in sunny borders. A too rich soil should be avoided. Plant in autumn or early spring, 8 to 10 inches apart. As nearly all grow freely, it is advisable to lift, divide, and replant every third year. Directly after the plants cease flowering, cut the shoots back.

## AETHIONEMA - Persian Candytuft

Dwarf rock plants of most fascinating character. The foliage is glaucous blue, stems are woody at the tips of which are produced rose and rose-pink flowers. Suitable for the rock garden or for grouping on the margins of borders.
Culture. All will thrive in ordinary, light, sandy or well drained, gravelly soil. Wet, heavy soils are unsuitable. They are especially adapted for sunny places in the rock garden. When plants are received cut back about one-half of branches. Plant in fall or very early spring, four to six inches apart.

## ASTER - Starwort or Michaelmas Daisy

Lovely autumn-flowering perennials, the value of which for border decoration, or cut flowers, is inestimable. There are scores of lovely varieties in all shades of blue, white, pink, and crimson to select from. They range in height from about 1 to 3 feet. Both the species and varieties may be grown in the hardy borders, or in borders by themselves, or in the wild garden.
Culture. Michaelmas Daisies will thrive in any soil and almost under any rough treatment. They may be grown with other perennials in the mixed border, or in a border in conjunction with lilies and tritomas, where they form a gay autumnal display. In June thin out all the weak growths, and retain not more than three to four of the strongest shoots to each plant. Tall, erect growing plants completely covered with large cup and saucershaped flowers during late May and June. One of the loveliest of biennials and a perfect plant for the old-fashioned, hardy garden. Flowers last a week or more when cut.

Culture. All the varieties offered will succeed in ordinary rich soil. The dwarfer kinds like partial shade, and some of the tall species, as Latifolia, Lactiflora, and Trachelium do well in shady border. Plant in autumn or early spring, 8 to 12 inches apart. Carpatica requires a cool position. Species like Persicifolia and its varieties should be lifted and divided every second year and replanted in good, rich soil, otherwise they will not flower freely. Indeed, all Campanulas are the better for a biennial lifting and dividing. To insure fine spikes and large flowers on the taller sorts, feed freely with manure.

## CARNATIONS - Hardy Border

Carnations are one of the most useful and popular flowers. Hardy Border Carnations have acquired, as a result of cross-breeding, the habit of perpetual-flowering.
Culture. Carnations will grow in ordinary good light, well drained soil. Should the soil be very light, add plenty of decayed cow manure. Planting should be done in early fall or spring. They should be placed 12 inches apart; protect lightly during the winter.
Crimson King

Plant early autumn or early spring, 6 to 8 inches apart. Fall planted plants should be lightly protected during the winter.

Maximum (Shasta Daisy) is a European species, and the parent of a number of very beautiful varieties, as Etoile d'Or, Mrs. Charles Lothian Bell and others.
Culture. The Shasta Daisies require a deep, rich soil to grow them to perfection. In poor soils they soon assume a weedy aspect. They must have a sunny position. They should be planted 1 foot apart. It is advisable to lift and divide the root stocks every alternate year, then the plants will be more compact in growth and also yield much finer flowers than if left undisturbed. Uliginosum, being a tall grower, should flowers than in wide borders or massed in the wild garden. Plant in fall or spring.
Alaska

Fortunately they can be grown in every garden but in warm, dry parts of the country they do not live long. Bes results are obtained in our cooler regions, especially along the Pacific and Atlantic coasts.
Culture. Delphiniums require a rich, generous and well drained soil On soils of a light or medium noture dig in plenty of well-decayed manure. In those of a heavy nature it is desirable to fork up the subsoil and compost of two parts loam and one of equal proportions of decayed manure and sand. The plants are best grown in groups of three or six. Allow a distance of at least 18 inches to two feet between the plants. Planting may be done in autumn or early spring. Remove faded flowers, and on no account allow seeds to develop, then a second crop of flowers may be expected later on.

Woodture. Plants of the perennial species may be planted in autumn Culture. Plants of the perennial species may be planted in autumn
or spring, 6 to 8 inches opart, in well drained, good gorden soil. The biennial strains are best transplanted early in spring; if fall planting must be done, protect carefully for the winter. All the kinds described will succeed in ordinary soil in sun or in shade. They make a charming effect when grown in masses, and readily reproduce themselves from seed.

Culture. They require a deep, rich, loamy soil and a sunny, well drained border. Not suitable for heavy, damp soils. Best grown singly, so as to display the handsome contour and beauty of the foliage. Once planted, ovoid disturbing the roots. Plant in spring or fall, 10 to 12 inches apart.

## Fraxinella caucasicus

Old-fashioned perennials; also known under the name of Dielytra. The species named below have fleshy, brittle stems and finely cut, fernlike foliage.
Culture. Spectabilis should be grown in a partially shady border. Eximio will do well in a similar position, or in the woodland garden, or in a shady nook of the rockery. Plont in fall or very early spring, 8 to
12 inches apart.

## Eximia

Culture. They require a light, loamy soil containing leaf-mold and a little peat, a moist, cool, shady position, such as the margins of woodland borders, or shody spot in the rock garden. Best grown in colonies. Plant in early spring or fall, 4 to 5 inches apart.
-Meadia

## ERIGERON - Fleabane

Culture. Ordinary, fairly moist soil and a sunny position will suit all. The dwarf kinds should be grown in the rock garden. Plant in autumn or early spring, 10 to 12 inches apart. Lift, divide and replant every third year.

Culture. Euphorbias succeed best in poor soils and sunny position in the rock gardens or raised borders. Under such conditions they will flower more freely than in a rich soil. Plant in autumn or spring, 8 to 10 inches apart.

## Corallata

Culture. They will thrive in ordinary, well drained soil and a sunny border. May be grown singly or in groups. Plant in autumn or early spring, 10 to 12 inches apart. They are particularly well adapted for sandy soils.

## FERNS - Hardy Varieties

The cultivation of Hardy Ferns is remarkably simple. All they want is a little light alluvial soil, a little loam and peat or leaf mold sufficient to keep the soil light and open, plenty of moisture, position varying from partial to deep shade. The Aspleniums and many others will grow on walls, chinks of rocks, etc. Many will revel in full sunshine in any ordinary border.
Culture. A shady position is, of course, preferred, or a spot which gets practically no sun, will be an ideal place for a fernery. If the position should be a very damp one, it will be advisable to raise the surface about 6 inches to a foot. Thoroughly mix a liberal supply of good brown peat with the existing soil, to give a good start. When the plants have become over-grown, lift, divide and replant early in April or fall. For a good effect plant 8 to 10 inches apart.
Adiantum pedotum Three $\$ 1.00$, Doz. $\$ 3.00,100 \$ 20.00$ (Hardy Maidenhair Fern). Most attractive of our native Ferns; black stems with delicate green fronds; does well in moist spots.

## FUNKIA - Plaintain-lily or Japanese Day-lily

Hardy, herbaceous perennials with handsome green or variegated foliage and lily-like flowers borne on graceful spikes. The ovate, cordate, or lance-shaped leaves grow in tufted form. Excellent plants for growing in sunny or partially shady borders on the margins of water or as edgings to beds and walks
Culture. Funkias require to be grown in a rich, well manured soil. The variegated kinds are best grown in partial shade. The others will succeed in sunny borders, by the waterside, or as specimens in groups. Subcordata should be grown in a warm, sheltered position. Plant in fall or early spring, six inches apart.
Coerulea lanceolata Three \$1.00, Doz. \$3.00, $100 \$ 20.00$ Broad green leaves; blue flowers from July to August.

## GENTIANA

## Gentian

Culture. Gentions require no special care to grow them successfully. Grow in a rich, moist loam containing a fair amount of well-decayed cow manure. Best grown in masses as an edging to a partially shaded border or rock garden. it is advisable in all cases to mix leaf mold freely with the soil before planting. Top dress with well-rotted manure in spring. See that the plants are well supplied with moisture in dry weather. Gentians do not like to have roots disturbed, so do not interfere with them once they are established. Plant in fall or spring, 6 to 8 inches opart.

## HELLEBORUS - Christmas Rose or Lenten Rose

There are two distinct types, one, Christmas Rose, flowering in late winter, and the other, Lenten Rose, in spring. Both are valuable for garden decoration because of their flowering during the dull period of the year.
Culture. Require to be grown in a cool, moist, shady position, such as under the shade of trees or among ferns. The ideal soil is a retentive loam, freely mixed with leaf mold and well-rotted manure. As Helleborus are impatient of disturbance at the roots it is advisable to select a position for them where they will not be required to be disturbed for many years. Its fragrant flowers are highly valued for drying and preserving. Culture. Prefers a rather dry, medium soil and a warm position. The dwarfer form especially suitable as an edging to paths. The Vera is also grown thus in large gardens. Where it is grown in quantity for flowers, plant two feet apart each way. The best time to plant is in spring; fall planting is all right if plants can be well protected. After a few years the plants get straggly, then the shoots should be cut back moderately in March or April; in fact, this may be done annually.

Plant in foll or spring.

## LYSIMACHIA - Yellow and White Loosestrife

Although weedy in habit they are welcome additions to the garden. They grow naturally in moist positions, and hence to cultivate them properly they must be grown in moist, shady borders, or by the waterside. The Creeping Jenny is an excellent carpeting plant to grow among hardy ferns or other low, wet places.
Culture. The Creeping Jenny should be grown as a carpeting plant on a shady, moist border. The other variety may be grown in shady, moist borders, or in bold groups in moist parts of the wild garden, or by the waterside. Plant in autumn or spring, in ordinary soil. 8 to 10 inches apart. Should be divided every third year.

Culture. A special bed should be provided for Orchids, sheltered from the mid-day sun, in loam, peat and leaf mold; give water occasionally in dry weather. Plant in fall or spring, 6 inches apart in groups of three or more.

## *Spectabilis

The proper planting season for field-grown roots of Poppies is during the last of August, September and October. In spring, strong plants are supplied in pots to insure success.

Because of the fact that Pachysandras are always closely planted together and usually under or near shade trees, it is well to enrich the soil frequently with well-rotted manure or bone meal, applied in fall or spring in liberal quantities. Plant in fall or spring, 3 inches apart. Pot plants may be planted throughout the summer.

The great many varieties now offered ore quite likely to be confusing, we have, therefore, discontinued growing any but the better and newest varieties noted for their clear colors, freedom of bloom, and strong habit.
Culture. To grow Phlox really well the soil should be well drained, deeply spaded, and enriched with rotted manure or bonemeal. Planting may be done in fall or spring in a sunny border. Set the plants 10 inches apart. Lift and divide every three or four yaars or they will become crowded, which results in poor, small flowers. Never let the plants go to seed, never water overhead, always keep blooms and foliage dry, letting hose run slowly on the ground, this method of watering prevents mildew.

## PRIMULA

This genus contains many species of interesting hardy plants suitable for the rockery, the waterside and the border. No garden or rock garden is complete without a liberal planting of all sorts offered.
Culture. Cashmeriana, cortusoides, denticulata, sikkimensis and Moerheim Hybrids will succeed in good, loamy soil freely mixed with leaf mold. Beesiana, japonica, veris and pulverulenta require a damp, rich loam freely mixed with leaf mold and peat. All require light shade. The latter would be suitable kinds to grow in a bog garden or on the edge of ponds. Japonica and sikkimensis also do well planted along the sides of damp, shady ditches. Most gardens contain a damp, shady spot, and this would be an ideal place for growing hardy Primulas. Plant in early spring or early fall, 4 to 6 inches apart.

The best time to plant is in spring; early fall planting is also very successful. Grow them in groups of not less than three plants, planted a foot to 15 inches apart. In dry weather give copious supplies of water. As soon as the first flowers have faded, cut the flowering stems back to their base. Every third year divide and replant in early spring.

## SAXIFRAGA - Rock-foil; Megasea

A large genus of rock plants, only a few of which are suitable for culture in this country. The majority require to be grown on rockeries. The sorts suitable to grow as edgings to, or in masses on, the margins of borders are what are known as the Giant-leaved Saxifragas or Megaseas, with large, leathery leaves, which are also admirably suited for shady borders in city gardens.
Culture. The mossy Saxifragas are best suited for shady borders or rock gardens, will do well in good, ordinary soil. Plant in March or early fall. The Megasea or large-leaved kinds will thrive in ordinary, good, rich soil in well drained borders, by the waterside, or in the rockery. May be grown in sun or shade. Should be watered freely in dry summer. McNabiana is best grown in stony soil in the rockery in full sun. Plont early fall or spring, 8 inches aport.

## ** Caespitosa

## SCABIOSA - Scabious or Pincushion Flower

Culture. All will thrive in well drained, good, ordinary soil, which is not heavy or damp. Cold and damp is fatal to these plants. An ideal soil for them is a sandy loam. Plant in early autumn or early spring. The plants are best in groups of three or more. Plant about 8 inches opart. A full sunny position is essential.
Caucasica

Culture. Those named will thrive in ordinary soil, in partial shode, in open woods or under trees. The plants should be grown in small colonies. Plant in autumn or early spring, 12 inches apart.

A genus of plants which vary in habit from dwarf, creeping plants to those of larger growth, as Spectabile, which grows about 2 feet high. Some are evergreen and others of deciduous growth. The dwarf kinds do well as edgings to borders or in rock gardens. Others are suitable for grouping in the border. They are the easiest of plants to grow.
Culture. Ordinary soil and dry, sunny borders or dry sunny places in the rock garden will suit all. Spectabile, indeed, will also thrive in shade. For edging purposes simply plant a few inches opart, and in due course they will develop into a continuous mass of foliage. They will grow where little else will thrive. Plant in autumn or spring, 4 to 8 inches apart.

Culture. All require a rich, sandy and perfectly drained soil in full sun. Planting may be done in fall or spring, 3 to 4 inches apart. It takes a few months for them to get well established. Do not disturb when once planted. The old rosettes disappear after flowering but their place is taken by numerous young plants so that they are never missed. The flowers are all in small panicles on short, fleshy stems; all flower in June and July.

## SPIREA - Goat's Beard; Meadow Sweet

Very handsime herbaceous perennials. In general appearance the species are much like those of the Astilbe. The species named below have handsomely divided leaves and flowers borne in graceful, feathery plumes. All are suitable for shody borders, woodland glades and the wild garden.
Culture. The Spireas require a deep, rich and moist soil. Plenty of leaf mold and well-decayed manure must be incorporated with it before planting. Aruncus may be grown as single specimens in moist ports of the garden. As to the rest, these will thrive in shady, moist borders, or they may be grown by the waterside. Filipendula flore pleno, being small, should be grown in groups of three or six plants. Those grown in borders should be given copious supplies of water in dry weather. Plant in autumn or early spring, 12 inches apart.
Aruncus

Culture. Will thrive in ordinary soil in a sunny border or rockery. For edging purposes plant eight inches apart in autumn or spring. Remove any flowers that form on Lanata as the plant is grown only for its lovely silvery toliage.

Culture. A sandy loam is essential to grow these plants well. They will not thrive on heavy soils. A sunny position, too, is indispensable. Plont in autumn or spring, 6 inches apart. They show to the best advantage when grown towards the front of the border. If the flowers are required for winter decoration, gather them before they are fully expanded.

Culture. Grow in a sunny, well drained border in sandy loam, 6 inches apart. Plant in March or early autumn. In wet seasons in outumn place a slight mound of ashes or leaf mold around the crown of the plants to prevent rotting.

## Cyaned coerulea

Culture. They will thrive in any good, ordinary, well drained soil. May be grown in sunny or partiolly shaded borders. Tall species like aquilegifolium are most effective when grown as single specimens in the front of shrubbery borders, or in the wild garden. The other species may be grown in colonies in the gorden or border. Plant in autumn or spring,
8 to 12 inches apart. Dipterocarpum should be carefully protected if planted in the fall.
QAdiantifolium

Culture. The Trilliums require to be grown in peat and leaf mold in shade or partial shade. Plant in autumn or very early spring, 3 inches apart, in large colonies to produce the best effect. They like plenty of moisture in summer.

Culture. Any good, ordinary, well drained soil and a sunny position will suit Tritomas. Plant in spring only, 12 inches opart. A liberal mulching of decoyed manure should be spread around the base of the plants in early winter. During severe weather protect the plants by a covering of strow or dry litter.
Pfitzeri

(Hardy Garden Heliotrope). Produces Thowy heads of rose-tinted white flowers during June and July, with delicious strong heliotrope odor. 3 to 4 feet high, loves a moist spot.

## VERBASCUM - Mullein

Hardy biennial and perennial plants of stately growth, suitable for borders or rock gordens. The leaves are more or less woolly, and the flowers are borne in bronched spikes. There are now several beautiful hybrids in cultivation which are superior to the species.

Their modest requirements are sun, water and rich soil. Almost everybody can have built or can themselves construct an artificial pool. Any location that is available would be satisfactory, provided it is exposed to the full sun. Rather than have no water garden at all, the interested party can grow many of the varieties in tubs or half-barrels sunk in the ground.
Soil. An excellent soil for use in tubs or artificial pools is made by mixing three parts of rotted sod, compost, or good top soil with one part of cow manure or good barnyord manure. All manure used must be thoroughly decomposed, to prevent fermentation when covered with water. Ground bone or bone meal may be used if necessary, at the rate of one quart to one bushel of soil
Size of Pool. The larger the water surface the better the results. A tub or halt-barrel 2 feet in diameter will furnish a miniature pool. An artificial pool should be made as large as possible, and 2 feet deep. Water. One foot of water over the soil is the most desirable depth in artificial pools. Some will thrive in shallower water, but few will stand a depth exceeding two feet. After the pool is once filled it is only necessary to replenish that which evaporates. Do not attempt planting until warm weather has come to stay.
