Following is our 1937 price list of EXTRISTRONG bulbs and roots. In addition to glad bulbs, we are listing other flowering bulbs and roots which we have grown for some time. Previous to this year we sold our stock locally as we had only enough to supply our home trade. Lately we have increased our plantings so that we can list them to our customers throughout the country. We will supply the same high quality in these bulbs as we have in gladiolus and believe, from the many fine reports, that they will be well received.

We know that to succeed with flowers, you must have good healthy seeds and bulbs, and while that alone does not insure good results, it is ample insurance of success.

We endeavor to supply only the highest quality of bulbs and know that your labor will be well rewarded. Any bulbs or roots bought of us that are not as represented may be returned to us and all charges refunded. Needless to say, we are very careful that you will be satisfied.

Also, we will refund your money or replace any stock found not true to name. We want you to be satisfied. We have endeavored to describe our varieties as fairly as possible and we ask only that you give our stock a reasonable trial. If this is given, we know that you will be satisfied as thousands of others are, who freely wrote of their appreciation. However, we, in common with every other reliable grower or seedsman, can not be responsible for more than the value of the bulbs or seeds.

We do not claim to be the largest grower of bulbs in the United States or Iowa. Such claims are ridiculous and when used by firms or growers desirous of making big impressions are usually hedged with such statements as "Largest Mail Order Grower," "Largest Radio House," "Largest Direct-to-You Nursery," or some such nonsense which cannot be proved or controverted. We have visited some of these largest outfits and about all they were largest in were their extravagant claims. In fact, one of these "largest outfits" do not grow an acre but buy what they need to fill orders.

We grow the bulbs we sell you and we endeavor to give you the best that money can buy and at a reasonable price. We don't mean at the lowest prices, because we have found that low priced goods generally have little else to recommend them and that if a product is not good enough to be sold at a reasonable price, it should not be sold at all.

Many claims are made for bulbs grown in various sections but I think it has been proven that seeds or bulbs grown in Iowa where we have a short growing season will thrive in any climate having the same or a longer season. Especially is this true with bulbs as they have a chance to ripen and mature and become dormant. Without this dormant season, bulbs will not sprout and grow evenly. Some bulbs are grown where they must be dug in a rainy season and must be cut green and artificially cured and dried. We find such bulbs do not do as well in our climate. We believe it fair for you to know where and how our bulbs are grown. Some will sell you bulbs obtained where they can buy them cheapest.

Gladiolus Shows

On account of the hot weather here in Iowa during July and August, only the Iowa State Gladiolus Show at Ames as held. Our glads, entered only in the open classes, won twelve blue, two red, and one white ribbons. We also won the Ray Murray Trophy, Governor's Trophy, President Carter Perpetual Challenge Cup, and one silver medal. We were high point winners of the commercial growers' portion. Both commercial and amateur classes were filled with exceptional blooms. Several new exhibitors were represented and received a lot of ribbons. You, too, are welcome at these shows and will be given any assistance you need in entering.

Next year, glad shows will be held at Ames, Algona, Cedar Rapids, and Waterloo, in Iowa, besides the State Show at Sioux City on August 14 and 15. Attend as many as possible and bring your choice blooms. Classes are provided for all varieties so that the decorative and smaller types do not compete with the large exhibition types.

Join Flower Societies

There are many state, national, and regional societies of gladiolus, peony, iris, dahlia, and other flower growers. Each group provides much interesting information relative to their favored flowers and hold exhibitions all through the country. If you are interested in any certain one, write us and we will give you information as to officers and shows of society near you.

Plan Your Garden Now

Pay when planted. When ordering glads or dahlias now, you may also order your fall-planted bulbs. We will reserve them for you and you pay at planting time. If you reserve glads or dahlias for

later planting, send 25% of order and balance at planting time. If you include iris, peonies, or tulips, no deposit on them is necessary.

Visit Our Gardens

You are always welcome to visit our gardens. Come any time—in the spring when tulips, iris, and peonies are in bloom; later, from July 15 to frost, we have acres of gladiolus and dahlias blooming.

The best way to select new varieties for your garden is to see them growing. We also have many perennial and annual plants which are very interesting. You are under no obligation to buy.

We also do a complete florist business during the summer season, furnishing flowers for any occasion—weddings, funeral designs, and so on.

Blooming Time

After each variety in our list, we have placed the average time required to bloom from planting date. These dates are only approximate, as much depends on the location and the season the bulbs are planted. Longer time should be given early in the season while later, when growing conditions are perfect, less time may be allowed. Thus, BREAK O' DAY might require 80 to 85 days early in the spring and about 65 to 70 days later on in the summer. We are indebted to the *Gladiolus Review*, February, 1933 issue, for most of these dates.

AFLAME (91 days). Begonia rose shading to orange flame; extremely large. This is one of the very best for exhibition. Large bulb 7 cents.

AIDA (70 days). A very early deep blue. Large blooms. One of the best in its color. Large bulb, 7 cents.

ALBANIA (85 days). Fine pure white, good grower. Best commercial white. Plant plenty of these. Large bulb, 6 cents.

ALBATROSS (80 to 90 days). Massive pure white. Very tall spike. One of the best whites. Large bulb, 8 cents.
