The following list contains varieties that are very fine for growing in greenhouses where one wishes flowers from November 1 onwards.

AVALON

An excellent large spray Pompon, possessing wonderful crispness and substance, color a very warm orange shading to bronze, of perfect spray formation, maturing Nov. 15, to Thanksgiving, this variety was accepted in the silver medal class for new varieties at the last 'Mum Show and was judged as one of the best of the newer seedlings.

CHROME EMERALD

A late spray anemone of great substance and of a very brilliant golden-orange color, an exceedingly sturdy producer of medium sturdy growth possesses excellent substance keeping for many days either on the plant or when cut, matures the end of Nov. or early Dec., an exceptionally good variety for pot plants or cut-flower purposes.

COL. FREDERICK M. ALGER

A Japanese incurved of a warm bronze color, the tips of the petals being pencilled in red creating a wonder effect toward the center of the flower, of medium habit and healthy growth, matured in early November, it is a seedling from Detroit News and R. B. Mellon.

This variety has strains of the English variety Absolute for generations back on one side, and on the other side it is bred from Tagoya which in turn has some Korean blood in it, these combined characteristics have undoubtedly given it its unusual color and keeping qualities.

VIRGINAL

A beautiful pure white Japanese Anemone with a high round cushion and an ample number of ray petals, the color is pure white and with an ivory tinge to the cushion, the flowers are of large size measuring 4 inches and more in diameter when grown in natural sprays, when disbudded flowers are correspondingly larger in size, this variety possesses a very vigorous habit, and matures the end of October.





ILO

A beautiful flower reminding older exhibitors of the marvelous variety we had many years ago, Lady Hopetoun It is identically the same shade of color, with petals twisting and interlacing in the most pleasing manner. Most Lily bulbs may be planted in the Spring or Fall. The most important factor in growing Lilies is that they should have good drainage. Manure or commercial fertilizer should never be allowed to come in direct contact with the bulbs, as this is often the cause of rotting and disease. In planting, dig the hole 6 inches deeper than the bulb is to be set and place some well decomposed leaf-mold in the bottom of the hole. Over this, place an inch or two of sand. The bulb is then placed on its side on the sand. A mulch of peat moss or leaf-mold is very necessary during the Summer, with straw and leaves for Winter covering.



Mrs. Stobart—This gorgeous rose cerise color is most unusual in Poppies and a joyous addition to all hardy perennial borders. Perfectly hardy and will grow in any type soil but require full sun for best development.


PLATYCODON (Japanese Bellflower)

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
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TERMS OF SALE

Delivery will be made on all orders at the proper time for planting, providing no specific date is mentioned when ordering.

Plants that have grown too large or it is not safe to move at a particular season, we will reserve and ship to you at the proper time.

Remittances should be made by check, post office order, or express order. When it is not convenient to remit in this way the letter should be registered. We will not be responsible for the receipt of money not registered. On all shipments by parcel post the postage will be charged for.

Be sure that both postal and express address is mentioned, as frequently shipments requested to be sent by parcel post must be shipped by express, on account of overweight when ready for delivery.

Orders for less than \$5.00 must be paid for in advance, and when cash accompanies order, a discount of 3% is allowed from the total amount of the order.

Accounts unpaid within 30 days are subject to sight draft without further notice and interest will be charged after that time.

Orders from customers in foreign countries must in all cases be accompanied by cash. While we exercise every care in packing and have confidence in the safe arrival of shipments, all goods are forwarded at the purchaser's risk.

If found unsatisfactory on arrival they must be returned to us immediately. Complaints on goods will not be accepted later than 30 days after their arrival, and no adjustment will be made after that time.

We endeavor to keep our plants true to name and have them satisfactory for the customer, but will not be responsible for failure from causes over which we have no control; such as, unfavorable weather conditions, careless culture, improper soil, etc.; and assume no responsibility after stock is delivered to our customer in good condition.

Not less than three plants of one variety will be sold at the dozen rate, nor less than twenty-five at the hundred rate. We will not send less than twenty-five of one variety at the hundred rate, as it takes considerable time to select one hundred plants in twenty or thirty varieties, and we must charge for the same accordingly.
