

## The Boysen Berry

The Boysenberry is as yet relatively unfamiliar to the majority of reople, even among fruit-growers themselves, but the many qualities belonging to it will no doubt bring about the general acceptance of it within a few years.

The Boysenberry is a triple cross of the Leganberry, raspberry and 'blackberry. It therefore combines the size of the Loganberry and the flavor of the raspberry with the hardiness of the blackberry. It is rich in eating quality and of remarkably large size. The fact that the cold winter of 1935 and '36 did not freeze the fruiting buds, even as far North as the North part of Ohio, seems sufficient proof that it is especially resistant to cold. A very fine crop of berries was harvested in this region during the summer following this severe winter.

If the planter's location is north of the Ohio River it is safest to provide some winter protection in the form of a mulch. The plants grown in our nursery are exceptionally large and thrifty, and we claim unreservedly that they are as fine plants as can be obtained anywhere.
