





IT'S NOT A HOME UNTIL IT'S PLANTED We cannot control the weather or have the rainfall when needed, but we have tried to select with care varieties that will withstand more than an ordinary amount of vicissitudes. Following is a list that will grow and bloom for you and be more beautiful each year.

Shrubs

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FORSHTHIA, or Golden Bells—The first shrub to bloom in the spring. It lights up the whole yard
with its masses of bright yellow flowers. 2 to 3 feet
 SPIREA VAN HOUTTEI, or Bridal Wreath—the most popular of all shrubs. Its gracefully arching branches, heaped as they are with the white blossoms in the spring and its thriftiness under the most trying conditions, are the reasons for its popularity. The reason you see it everywhere is because it makes good everywhere. Use it for foundation, screens, hedges or single specimen planting. Grows in sun or partial shade. 3 to 4 feet
PHILADELPHUS (Mock Orange)—Not unlike the common name, it bears white flowers, very fragrant; blooms in May and June, and scatter- ing through the summer. A handsome shrub. 2 to 3 feet
BUSH HONEYSUCKLE. — A dependable, hardy shrub, flowers very fragrant, brush nearly evergreen; fine for screens and background; spring bloomer; colors, pink and white. 2 to 3 feet Price .35
Try a New Shrub— CARAGANA, or Siberian Pea Tree.—A little known shrub but one worthy of consideration—one of the most drouth resisting shrubs; light green foliage with yellow pea shaped flowers in spring; enjoys full sun. 2 to 3 feet
RUSSIAN OLIVE.—A shrub whose chief attraction is its silvery foliage—a pleasing contrast to the usual green foliage of other shrubs. Fine for mass planting. 2 to 3 feet Price .35
BARBERRY, Japanese, Green Leaved.—A low growing, compact shrub; ideal for foundation planting. 2 to 3 feet
BARBERRY, Red Leaved (New).—Bright red fol- iage all summer. 18 to 24 inches Price .50
WEIGELIA-ROSAE:
The Weigelias are shrubs of erect habit while young but gradually spread and droop as they acquire age.
 Rosea.—Beautiful pink trumpet shaped flowers in spring; a good shrub; good flowers; good foliage; easy to grow. 2 to 3 feet
CRAPE MYRTLE.— One of the most beautiful of all the flowering shrubs; blooms throughout the summer—the best shrub for the south. 2 to 3 feet Price .35

ALTHEA (Rose of Sharon).—The Altheas are fine flowering shrubs; easy to grow; perfectly hardy; colors, red and pink.

PEACH TREES Few fruits enjoy a greater pop-
ularity than peaches—at their best when picked fresh from your own trees. Plant Peach Trees.
Mayflower—First to ripen; almost frost proof be- cause it blooms so late; red all over; semi- cling; good quality and size.
Champion—Large, creamy white with red cheek; freestone. Best peach for the home orchard.
Chinese Cling—The best hardy yellow cling peach; large size, yellow flesh, good bearer.
J. H. Hale—Very large golden yellow blush red with fuzzless skin.
Yellow Flesh—Highest quality and flavor; free- stone.
Elberta—The well known yellow peach; freestone.
