The lovely form, exquisite coloring, and the enormous size of the Darwins make them the favorites among Tulips. They belong to the Mayflowering or late-blooming class and produce their gigantie flower cups on Iong, stiff stems, above the broad foliage. Darwin Tulips are ideaI for the herbaceous border or massed in clumps in front of shrubbery, and as a cut-flower for vases they are superior to any other class. They are also excellent for pan- or pot-culture. As this class is short of yellow, orange, and bronze varieties, these colors may be obtained in the Breeder and May-flowcring or Cottage types; the flowers are similar in shape and bloom at the same time as the Darwins. Ideal arrangements and color effeets can be obtained by a combination planting as suggested above.

CULTURAL DIRECTIONS.-For Bedding Out. Plant in October or November, in good, well-drained garden soil, setting the bulbs 5 to 6 inches apart and 4 to 5 inches deep. After the ground has frozen, cover with litter, Ieaves, or manure to protect them from frost; this should be removed in the spring when danger from hard frost is past.

For Pot- or Pan-Culture. Plant 4 to 6 bulbs in a 6 -inch pot or pan, water thoroughly, and then remove to the open ground or a coldframe, covering with eoal-ashes. After they have rooted thoroughly, they should be brought in a moderately cool room and gradually to a warmer one. By bringing in a fresh supply every 10 days they ean be had in bloom all winter.

CULTURAL DIRECTIONS FOR HYACINTHS: Outdoor Culture.-Plant in October and November, in good, well-drained garden soil. Plant bulbs so that the top will be 3 to 4 inches below the surface and 6 to 8 inches apart. After the ground has frozen, cover with litter, leaves, or manure, to protect them from frost; this should be removed in the spring when danger from hard frost is past.

After planting, water well and put in a cool, dark, airy place until well rooted, after which remove to a cool room and later to a warmer room.

Place the bulb in a glass, which should be filled with water, so it touches the bottom of the bulb, and put the glasses in a cool, dark place. Change the water occasionally. Keep in the dark until well rooted and then remove to a light, cool place.

French Roman Hyacinths afford a continuous supply of bloom from early winter until late in spring if planted in succession. They are very fragrant.

Cultural Notes.-As soon as bulbs are received, plant them in pots. Place a handful of well-rotted cow-manure in the bottom of the pot and set the bulb directly on top, covering it with soil. After watering, place in an outside pit and protect from the direct rays of the sun; cover well with soil, ashes, or any other suitable litter. After the bulbs have become thoroughly rooted, bring inside, in a temperature of about 60 degrees. Let the plants grow slowly under a bench or some other suitable place until about 6 inches high, then place on top of the bench. About two months before Easter they can be brought into a warmer temperature and gradually forced into flower and height at one time.

These are the most popular June flowers, next to roses, and justly so, for they lend themselves to almost any style of planting, while, for the little care required, they give a variety of color and wealth of bloom unequaled by any other plant. Their requirements are few; they will succeed in any good garden soil in an open, sunny position. Care should be taken, however, to keep all fresh manure away from the roots-if barnyard manure is used it must be thoroughly decomposed; if you are unable to procure this, bonemeal makes a good fertilizer. Peonies may be planted any time after September 1 until the ground freezes in the autumn, and in the early spring until the season is too far advanced. The best time, however, is during September and October, as they make roots during the moist, cool weather of autumn and consequently carry through the winter in better shape. The roots should be set so that the top or upper eyes are about 2 or not more than 3 inches below the level of the soil; do not set the roots flat, but stand them up. For the best
results, Peonies should be planted from 3 to 4 feet apart each way, according to the space at your disposal; the ground around them should be well cultivated at all times, and in the spring, after growth starts, they should have an abundance of water if the season is at all dry. When cutting the flowers, always leave one or two bottom leaves; it is best to leave a few flowers on the plant also, as it is of vital importance that sufficient foliage be left to develop the eyes under the ground for next season's growth. Newly planted roots may not develop a characteristic flower the first season; in fact, it is usually not until the third year that perfect flowers, true to description, will be produced. Peonies are seldom troubled with any disease or insect pests. Ants sometimes appear on the buds, coming to gather a sweet gum which the bud exudes while developing; but they will do no harm, disappearing when the flower opens.
