ALL-AMERICA SELECTIONS FOR 1939 are designated thus:


Gold Medal, the highest possible award.

Silver Medal (heretofore called Award of Merit).

Bronze Medal (replaces "Special Mention").

Honorable Mention (formerly called Recommended).

Similar to the new Morning Glory, Scarlett O'Hara, in foliage and growth, the flowers set off the rich deep red with a definite margin of white. The name was chosen in honor of Cornell University, the colors of which are crimson and white. Pkt., 15c.

IPOMOEA, Scarlett O'Hara. Gold Medal.

A distinctly new color and type in Morning Glories, with carmine-red, three-inch flowers which remain open into the afternoons. Foliage is interesting and attractive, with one large and two small side lobes. Although a climber, Scarlett O'Hara is not rampant and it is advisable to help it start twining. Seed is scarce; order early. Pkt., 25c. Pkt., 25c.

HOLLYHOCK, Annual, Indian Spring. Silver Medal.

Blooming in 5 months from seed, and giving a second crop of flowers after the main stalks have been cut, Indian Spring seems destined to return hollyhocks to the forefront of popular garden flowers. The large semi-double, fringed blossoms are in shades of rose-pink, freely produced on 5-foot stems on compact, pyramidal plants. See illustration, front cover. Pkt., 25c.

PETUNIA, Hollywood Star. Silver Medal.

A new and beautiful type of "star" petunia, the edges of each flower deeply laciniated to form a five-pointed star. Color is bright rose-pink with a yellow throat. Plants are semi-dwarf and bloom yellow throat. Plant profusely. Pkt., 25c.

PETUNIA, Ladybird. Bronze Medal.

Dwarf compact plants, covered with extremely brilliant flowers of carmine-pink overlaid with scarlet. A companion to Rosy Morn and Rose of Heaven, but of a more arresting color, you will enjoy a bed or border of Ladybird. Pkt., 25c.

RUSSELL LUPINS, Reselected Strain. Per.

The beautiful lemon-yellow, Chrysanthemum-like flowers of Dixie Sunshine Marigold are produced so late in the season that early frosts kill the plants before blooming, in many parts of the United States. Early Sunshine is an extremely early-flowering counterpart, blooming throughout the summer, and of a better habit, being dwarf and bushy. Pkt., 25c.

CORNFLOWER, Dwarf, Lilac Lady.

A bright mauve-lilac counterpart, in dwarf compact habit, of the newer Cornflower, Jubilee Gem. Chiefly useful for low beds and borders; stems are long enough for picking. Pkt., 25c.

PHLOX Drummondi, Salmon Glory. Silver Medal.

With extra-large (up to 1½ inches across) florets of pure salmon-pink with a creamy-white eye, this development from the Gigantea Art Shades group is sure to be a favorite bedding variety. Flower-trusses are also huge, and produced freely over a long season. Pkt., 25c.

SCABIOSA, Blue Moon. Honorable Mention.

Forerunner of a new strain of Scabious with erect, columnar plants producing long wiry stems from the base, perfect for florist and home flowergrower. The flowers, too, are distinct, composed entirely of broad wavy petals, making a bloom that is fully double and without any pincushion-like center. Color is rich lavender-blue, somewhat deeper than the familiar Azure Fairy. Pkt., 25c.

ANTIRRHINUM, Magic Carpet.

A distinctive new type of Snapdragon for edging and low beds, only 4 inches in height! The colorrange is excellent, and although not rust-resistant this type is not very susceptible to rust. Pkt., 15c.


ASTER, Early Giant, Light Blue. Silver Medal. True light blue in

ANTIRRHINUM nanum, Guinea Gold. Bronze Medal.



Although not a rust-resistant strain, this new snapdragon made a healthy growth in the All-America Selections trial grounds located in widely-separated parts of the country during the past spring and summer. This is a grand garden type, with large glowing bronzy-orange flowers in compact spikes on dwarf (15 inch) bushes. Pkt., 25c.

One of the easiest of all flowers to grow, its only requirement being sunlight and plenty of moisture. Firmament is also a new blue flower for cutting. Pkt., 25c.

ZINNIA, Fantasy, White Light. Honorable Mention.

As pure a white as any Zinnia, this is a great addition to the florist's white flowers. The daintily curled and crested petals of the Fantasy type are particularly adapted to the lighter shades, of which White Light will be the leader. Pkt., 15c.

FLOWERS

The **germination period** of most of the flower seeds has been compiled, and is included in the description of the varieties in this catalog.

Per. stands for Perennial—flowers which bloom for two or more years.

Bien. stands for Biennial-flowers which first bloom the second year, then die.

Unmarked flowers in this list are Annuals.

Colors of the flowers are given first in every case, for your convenience.

Planting Suggestions are on pages 9 to 11.

ABRONIA umbellata (Sand Verbena).

Rosy-lilac, verbena-like flowers; trailer for sunny rockery or window box; sow November to March. Pkt., 10c.

ABUTILON maximum (Flowering Maple). Per
Pink, yellow, and red, bell-shaped flowers in six
months from seed; 3 feet; sow February and
March for bloom same year. Mixed. Pkt., 10c.

ACANTHUS latifolius. Per.

Decorative, large green foliage; lavender flowers; 3 feet; sow October to May. Pkt., 10c.

ACHILLEA

Small double white or rose-red flowers in clusters, for beds and bouquets; 2 feet; sow March to July. Germination period 14 days. Ptarmica (The Pearl), white; Kelwayi Rosea, rose-red. Pkts., 10c.

ACONITUM Napellus. (Monk's Hood). Per.

Dark blue flowers in delphinium-like spikes; 3 to 5 feet tall; sow March to July. Germination period from 1 to 6 months. Pkt., 10c.

ACROCLINIUM Roseum hybridum.

Pink and white, double, everlasting flowers; often bloom in 8 weeks; 1½ feet high; sow November to March, Germination period 12 days. New large-flowered Double Hybrids, with richer colors and larger flowers; splendid for cut flowers, used either fresh or dried. Pkt., 15c.

AGATHEA coelestis (Blue Daisy). Per.

Clear blue with yellow disk; 1 to 2 feet high; good border or low hedge; sow March to Aug. Pkt., 10c.

AGERATUM Mexicanum (Floss Flower).


