A DESCRIPTIVE PRICE LIST OF: DECIDUOUS FRUIT TREES; CITRUS TREES;
GRAPE VINES; STRAWBERRIES; AND DECIDUOUS ORNAMENTALS.

NOTE: The fruit trees on this list are recommended for home planting
in the coastal plains and adjacent areas of Southern California.

ALMONDS - 60¢ each, 10 or more 50¢ each.

NE PLUS ULTRA - Popular commercial variety, heavy producer of
large, elongated, soft shelled nuts; the tree is vigorous.

I.X.L. - Beautiful large shapely nut; shell is soft and kernel
sweet, of good quality. Tree is a strong grower.

APPLES - 65¢ each, 10 or more 60¢ each.

RED ASTRACHAN - Popular early variety. Bearing in July; heavy
cropper, especially adapted to warm interior valleys. Red
fruit of fair size. Delicious for eating fresh or cooking.

WHITE WINTER PERMAIN - Tree vigorous and a good bearer. Splendid
home orchard variety. Large oblong fruit; pale yellow skin
with blush on sunny side. Tender, juicy, fine grained.
Bears October to November.

WINTER BANNANA - October to November. Highly prized for its
shapely, beautiful fruit. Fruit is large pale yellow with
a decided red blush; crisp tender flesh. Should be planted
with another variety for pollinization. A quick bearer,
adapted to coastal climate.

CRABAPPLE - 65¢ each, 10 or more 60¢ each.

TRANSCENDENT - September. Fruit is large, golden yellow with red
cheek. Flesh sub-acid, crisp and tender.

APRICOT - 60¢ each, 10 or more 50¢ each.

ROYAL - June. Similar to Blenheim, but ripens before Blenheim.
Used extensively for canning and drying. Succeeds in nearly
all Apricot districts and has a good reputation as an all
purpose variety.

NEWCASTLE - May to early June. One of the earliest of all Apri-
cots; it ripens 25 days ahead of Royal. Medium sized fruit
of good color and fair quality.

BLENHEIM - California's leading Apricot. Fruit is large, of good
form, attractive in color and of excellent quality. It is
one of the heaviest bearers and most consistent.

CHERRIES - 65¢ each, 10 or more 60¢ each.

ENGLISH MORELLO - June. The standard late, red, sour, juice cherry. It is one of the best for canning and culinary uses. Fruit is medium large, dark red, approaching black when ripe.

FIGS - 65¢ each, 10 or more 60¢ each.

WHITE ADRIATIC - August. Reddish pulp, heavy bearer.

DURO BLACK - Large black fruit. Produces two distinct crops.

BLACK MISSION - Best all purpose fig. Produces two distinct crops.

KADOTA - Aug. to Sept. Medium size, light green. Bears when young.

NECTARINES - 60¢ each, 10 or more 50¢ each.

GOLD MINE - July. A large attractive fruit, delicious in flavor. Flesh is white with some red at the pit. A perfect freestone, Good for home canning and fresh eating. The tree is vigorous.

STANWICK - August. This has been California's leading Nectarine for many years. The fruit is very large, attractive in appearance. A freestone; the flesh is white and of good flavor.

PEARS - 60¢ each, 10 or more 50¢ each.

SECKEL - August. A beautiful small fruit, skin is yellow with russet cheek. Flesh is exceptionally fine grained, and sweet.

WINTER NELLIS - November. Medium to large in size, has a yellow skin overlaid with brown russet. The flesh is juicy, rich and sweet. The tree is a prolific bearer. One of the best.

PEACHES - 60¢ each, 10 or more 50¢ each.

BABCOCK - Early July. A new freestone developed to meet the requirements of the mild climate in Southern California. Resistant to delayed foliation caused by warm winters. This is a heavy bearer with medium sized fruit, highly colored. Flesh is white and very sweet.

AUSTRALIAN SAUCER - June. White skinned, white fleshed, exceedingly sweet, juicy and delicious. It is not affected by mild winters and always matures a large crop.

EARLY IMPERIAL - Late June to July. An early yellow freestone; the fruit is of medium size, with an attractive blush overlaying a yellow skin. Flesh is yellow sweet and juicy.

LUKEN'S HONEY - August. One of the best. Like the Saucer, even in the warmer sections it always comes through with a heavy crop. Bears small greenish white, white fleshed fruit.

PEACHES (PATENTED)

NECTAR (Plant Patent #86) 80¢ each, 10 or more 70¢ each.

Latest freestone introduction. Ripening in June, it has a smooth skin, white flesh, and is quite large. The best for home orchards

RIO OSO GEM (Plant Patent #84) 70¢ each, 10 or more 60¢ each.

August. A new yellow freestone resembling the Hale; but it claims a higher color and sweeter flavor. The flesh is yellow, firm and richly flavored.

PLUMS - 60¢ each, 10 or more 50¢ each.

BEAUTY - June. Fruit is medium to large, heart shaped; color is a beautiful crimson. Flesh is firm and of good flavor.

SANTA ROSA - Late June. It is large in size, has firm flesh, and good eating qualities. The flesh is reddish in color, juicy and has a pleasing tart flavor. The tree is an upright grower, vigorous and very productive.

SATSUMA - August. An old variety still popular in home orchards. It makes excellent jams. The fruit is large, nearly round, color is dark red, flesh is deep blood red and juicy.

TRAGEDY - July. Large dark blue, oval fruit of firm flesh, sweet and juicy. A popular plum in many districts.

QUINCE - 60¢ each, 10 or more 50¢ each.

SMYRNA - Of large size and fine flavor. The fruit is oblong, with an attractive lemon skin. The flesh is tender and is highly perfumed.

THE SMALL FRUITS

GRAPES - 20¢ each, 10 or more 15¢ each, 100 or more 10¢ each.

PIERCE - CALIFORNIA CONCORD - A very large blue-black grape, showy and aromatic. When fully ripe, the flesh is juicy, sweet and slightly musky.

MUSCAT - California's leading all purpose grape. The chief source of seeded raisins, and used for wine making. A large, pale amber colored, sweet grape. A fine table variety.

THOMPSON SEEDLESS - California's famous seedless variety. So well known it hardly needs description; a delicious table grape.

STRAWBERRIES - 1 to 50, 2½¢ each -- 50 to 100 2¢ each.

PROGRESSIVE - Bears over a long period. Medium sized berries of great richness and flavor.

KLONDIKE - Does well in warm sections. Yielding over long period, medium sized berries of good flavor.

ROCKHILL or BUSH STRAWBERRY - 1 gallon cans, 1 to 12, 35¢ each.
 1 gallon cans, 12 or more, 25¢ each.
 A real bush strawberry producing quantities of luscious berries over a long period of time. Ideal for small homes.

CITRUS FRUITS

ALL CITRUS TREES LISTED ARE TWO YEARS OLD (UNLESS OTHERWISE NOTED)

GRAPEFRUIT 2.00

MARSH SEEDLESS - Ripens May to August. The fruit is large, with a thin rind and is practically seedless; has an abundance of juice and exceptional flavor. The best for all sections.

LEMONS 2.50

EUREKA - The leading lemon for home planting. It bears continually throughout the year and ripens most of its fruit in the summer. The tree is practically thornless, the seeds are few, and the juice is abundant.

ORANGES 2.00

WASHINGTON NAVEL - California's well known navel orange, the seedless variety harvested in the winter.

VALENCIA - California's summer orange, containing abundant juice. The fruit is medium sized, with few seeds, and the tree is the largest of all citrus varieties.

ROBERTSON NAVEL - 3.00 - 1 year old stock. (Plant Patent # 126)
 The most remarkable characteristic of this orange is its ability to produce enormous crops. Its fruit is comparable to the Washington Navel, and ripens fully three weeks earlier.

TANGERINES 2.50

DANCY - A strong growing, heavy producing type of the Mandarin Orange. A medium to large fruit, firm, flattened in shape, exceedingly juicy. February to May.

LIMES 2.50

BEARSS - Largest and finest of the limes, seedless and attaining the size of a small lemon. The tree ripens the most of its fruit in the summer, and is slightly hardier than the Mexican.

MEXICAN - This line is semi-dwarf, the fruit is light green, oval, strongly acid and richly flavored. The fruit ripens all thru the year, with the main crop in the spring.

DECIDUOUS ORNAMENTALS

MELIA AZADARACH UMBRACULIFORMIS (TEXAS UMBRELLA TREE)

Fast growing deciduous shade tree to 30 feet - branches radiating from the trunk as the ribs of an umbrella.

PLATANUS ACERIFOLIA (European Sycamore)

A medium to large tree to 70 feet high, of much merit, especially fine as a street tree as it may be trimmed to assure almost any shape.

POPULUS NIGRA ITALICA (LOMBARDY POPULAR)

Columnar tree to 90 feet high with almost upright branches; picturesque and frequently planted along avenues and as a lawn specimen. Needs a fairly deep soil and is drought resistant.

SALIX DISCOLOR (PUSSY WILLOW)

Large shrub or small tree producing in the spring the well known silken catkins which are treasured for cutting.

SALIX UMBRACULIFERA MATSUDANA (THE HANKOW WILLOW)

A new and rare form of the weeping willow with curiously twisted branches and leaves. Slower growing than the ordinary willow and a fine novelty for any garden.

ULMUS PUMILA (THE DWARF ASIATIC ELM)

A graceful exceptionally rugged tree of rapid growth; hardy in any extreme or any conditions of soil or weather.
