



## VEITCH'S GARDEN PEAS.



A sowing may be made about the end of November on a warm, dry, well-sheltered border; but for a first crop, the best plan is to sow in January, in turf or narrow boxes; place in gentle heat and plant out when hardened off and the weather is mild enough. Sow early sorts early in February, and again towards the end of the month for succession. The first week in March a general sowing should be made of the second early and main-crop varieties and continued once a fortnight till the beginning of July. Peas like a rich deep soil, and will do remarkably well in old Celery trenches.











## VEITCH'S FLOWER SEEDS.

HARDY ANNUALS.—Sow in the open border from March to June, also in the autumn. HALF-HARDY ANNUALS should be sown in March or April on a moderate hot-bed, or on a warm border in May. HARDY BIENNIALS AND PERENNIALS.—Sow from March to June; many of these will stand the winter without protection. The choice Annuals such as have small seeds require to be sown in a prepared soil—leaf mould, friable loam and sand, and covered very slightly. The best time for sowing is in dry weather, when the seeds germinate more freely, and are not so liable to mildew. Important.—The young plants should be well thinned out before there is any possibility of their being weakened by overcrowding. TENDER ANNUALS should be sown in pans or pots, and placed near the glass in a good hot-bed, using water very sparingly till the seeds have germinated. When the young seedlings are fit to handle, they should be pricked out into other pots, which will prevent their damping off until large enough to be transplanted singly.

Considerable care is necessary in order to secure the successful germination of the seed of the choice kinds of *P. sinensis*. The most suitable periods for sowing are April and May for autumn, and June, July and August for spring blooming. Shallow pans, well drained, are the best, the soil consisting of sandy loam and leaf mould, worked through a fine sieve, the pans when thus prepared should be well watered before the seed is sown. Only a slight covering of soil or silver sand is needed. A good method is to cover with glass, but brown paper tited over the pans is better; this latter can be frequently damped, being removed as soon as germination takes place. What has most to be guarded against is drought; the soil should be kept in as equable a degree of moisture as possible, never being on the dry side. We attribute more failures to this cause than any other. Just at the time when the seed commences to germinate the least departure from this is fatal. We would wish it to be thoroughly understood that each of our varieties are tried in several departments of our nursery, and unless a satisfactory growth is obtained we do not send it out. The gigantic forms and some of the new hybrids do not germinate quite so freely as the older kinds, but the number of seeds contained in each packet should give a good supply of plants.
