

Fragrant and Pink:

DAPHNE CNEORUM: Garland Flower, 9 to 12 in. spread	\$1.00 ca.
ROSA RUBIGINOSA: Eglantine or Sweetbriar	.75 ea.
VIBURNUM CARLESI: 3 to 4 ft., own roots	4.09 ea.
VIOLA ROSINA:	3.00-doz.

The DAPHNE grows to 12 in. and both it and the VIOLET (Viola) have a second period of bloom in the fall; give the Daphne good drainage, the Violet sun or semi-shade. The VIBURNUM is a wide shrub to 5 ft. high; the blossoms, in May, are pink in bud and waxy white when fully open; their fragrance is thrown for many yards. The fragrance of the ROSE is in its foliage and is noticeable at a distance on a dewy morning or after a rain; the single flowers are a wild-rose pink and the ultimate height of the bush is 8 to 10 ft.

These two plants fulfill the essential purposes of a true ground cover which is to cover the ground and to drive out weeds. The JUNIPER has green-gray foliage and makes a mat about 12 in. high: it must have full sun and will grow in poor soil. Small plants from pots, planted in a permanent position with space to spread, are most satisfactory as the Juniper is extremely difficult to transplant from the open when once established. The YELLOWROOT, native to Eastern North America, is deciduous with inconspicuous flowers in May and bright yellow autumn foliage; it grows to 3 to 4 ft. high, does best in shade and care should be taken not to dig around a clump as the shoots that appear one spring are made underground the previous summer and it is easy to break these with hoe and trowel.

Among the first KOREAN HYBRIDS to be introduced were CERES, single, chamois-yellow: DIANA, semi-double, rose-pink: APOLLO, single, bronze, soon followed by LOUISE SCHILING, single, salmonred. All are good and as the colours blend a planting in mixture is very successful. They flower earlier than the garden Chrysanthemums and are reasonably hardy. These four have proved hardier with us than some of the newer introductions many of which we carry in small quantities.

Give the PRIMULA moisture or plenty of leaf-mold. The ANEMONE prefer moisture though they will flourish in ordinary soil in full sun, their nodding white bells come on 1 ft. stems in May-June. The EPIMEDIUM grows to 9 in. with racemes of small white flowers in May-June and the foliage is sometimes evergreen in protected situations.

SUGGESTIONS:

The lavender-blue VIOLA JERSEY GEM, @ 2.50-doz., planted in the sun gives a long blooming period, plants set out in April were covered with bloom from the latter part of May to mid-September. The colours of the SALMON HYBRID FOX-GLOVES @ 2.50-doz., do not clash with other planting as do those of the more usual Foxgloves with their magenta tinge. CALLICARPA GIRALDIANA, bushes 4 ft. high 2.00 ea., has violet berries in Sept.-Oct. CALLICARPA JAPONICA, bushes 2 to 3 ft. .60 ea., has small clusters of violet berries in Oct.-Nov. Birds are kept near the house if food and water are provided for them during the summer, Chickadees are particularly fond of suet; SUET HOLDERS, painted green, .90 ea.; mixed BIRD SEED @ 5.00 for a 50 lb. bag. BIRD BATHS, of gray terra-cotta. 20 in. across, 5.50 ea.

> KOREAN HYBRID CHRYSANTHEMUMS are excellent in pots for use on a terrace or to bring into the house in the fall. We have samples of the POTS illustrated on Miss Haines' folder, they are of good clay and well made. AZALEA MOLLIS, Chinese Azalea, has fragrant flowers in tones of orange in May and succeeds best in the sun, medium heavy bushes about 2 ft. high 2.00 ea., small bushes, 6 to 8 in. high, many with some buds, .50 ea. PLATYCODON GRANDIFLORA, Japanese Balloonflower, blue, @ 3.00-doz., blooms for practically two months in June-July, the varicty ALBUM has white flowers; give good drainage. PEAT MOSS, @ 3.50 a bale, retains moisture in a sandy soil, loosens a clay soil and is admirable as a mulch.
