SHIPPING, via EXPRESS or PARCEL POST. At our option, depending on weight and distance; but if you have special preference, please indicate same. March, April and May are safe months to ship Gladioli. State when delivery is wanted.

TERMS. Cash with order: $25 \%$ will hold order for Spring delivery. All Orders not paid at shipping time will be sent C. O. D. for balance due, as prices quoted here are all net cash before shipment. If credit is desired, satisfactory Bank references only, should accompany your order.

## GLADIOLUS REPORT

The 1938 blooming was ideal in every way. Weekly rains and cool weather throughout the growing season gave us a good chance to test out new varieties, and give further ratings of old ones. As a result, we have added many new varieties to our list this year. Inferior sorts, regardless of original cost, are left in the field to freeze, and not listed in this catalog at a cheap price to dispose of the stock. This is for your protection.

In addition to our list of choice and new varieties, which have been tested by us and found to be desirable, we offer to you at the lowest possible prices our bargain list. It contains standard varieties that have been selected by amateurs and professional growers as reliable and foolproof. Just run through the list and you will find such strong, vigorous growers as Aflame, Albatross, Betty Nuthall, Bill Sowden, Commander Koehl, Dr. Bennett, Mrs. L. Douglas, Picardy, Maid of Orleans, and Mildred Louise, just to mention a few. In our choice and new varieties, will be found those that will become standard varieties as soon as they are better known and stock becomes plentiful. From Scotland, Holland, Germany, France, New Zealand, Australia they come, as well as those from Canada and the United States. We can truthfully say we are growers of the World's Finest Gladiolus.

We highly recommend the following varieties: In the reds and scarlets, Commander Koehl and Dr. Bennett are the two old favorites. Bill Sowden has fine color and large flower, but does not grow tall enough to make it a good show spike. Allemania is larger than Commander Koehl, but the florets are "floppy." Beacon is one of the most admired flowers in our gardens. The combination of red and white is most distinct. Rewi Fallu, Tunias' Triumph and Hindenburg's Memory are the giants in the reds, all are outstanding. Our favorite is Del Ray. It is not a dark red, but a nice medium shade with a pure white throat. Johann S. Bach is one of Pfitzer's finest and also exceptionally early.

Arabella was extra fine in the black reds, although spikes of Black Opal from small bulbs were exceptionally fine. Morocco is still a favorite of many.

The whites have come to the front in the past few years. It was only a short time ago when Albania, Lily White and Chicago White were the best to offer. But with the introduction of Star of Bethlehem, Polar Ice, and the new Edehweiss, the whites are up to the high standard of the pinks. Star of Bethlehem is the most popular, but does not grow as healthy or as easy as Maid of Orleans. The combination of large flower and best spike goes to Snow Princess with Maunga close behind. Two new ones that impressed us very much were Camellia, a pinkish white with a red blotch, and Margaret Beaton, a pure white with a small red blotch. Aachen is a daintily ruffled cream and Shirley Temple from medium bulbs was straight and lovely. Spikes from large bulbs tend to come crooked unless staked.

Amberglow is the deepest of the yellows and looks like a promising commercial. Prairie Gold is exceptionally early and a fine strong grower. Desert Gold is the largest of the yellows, but the flowers were somewhat streaked with pink. Royal Gold made fine spikes and is a pleasing shade of light yellow.

Golden Chimes and Cadillac are old favorites. For color, La Fiesta is the brightest in the oranges, although the flowers are only of medium size. Bit o' Heaven is excellent. Barcarole and Unca look promising. More on them next year.

Minuet is still the finest of the lavender varieties. Mme. Schumann-Heink at a short distance resembles an orchid, markings and all. It is a Diener variety that has been in commerce for some time, but is still very scarce. If you like ruffled varieties, King Arthur with its graceful spikes is outstanding. Isola Bella, Pfitzer's new lavender-pink, always produces good spikes. Beautiful Ohio is a little off-shade of lavender, somewhat on the rosy side.

The blue and dark violet class is progressing more and more each year, with the finest varieties being of Rev. Christ originations. His Blue Admiral is being admired by everyone, but his Robert Burns is another step forward. Blue Domina and Bonnie Blue are two pleasing and different shades of light blue. Of the foreign varieties Blue Beauty is our favorite. We like Max Reger for real beauty. Sharp white lines in the throat give the flower the resemblance of a beautiful blue butterfly. Blue Wonder and Tunia's Blue have bloomed for us the past two seasons but must prove themselves valuable before they will be listed.

Picardy in the pinks still stands supreme. One of the most-talked-of new introductions is Peggy Lou. Its color is a little more rosy than Picardy, the flowers just as large and with perfectly straight spikes. What more can one ask? The flowers on Ellen Marie were as large as anything we have seen. Miss New Zealand and New Era were both good as usual. For many years Dream o' Beauty was the best in the dark rose-pink class-it still is fine; but Early Rose, Rose Premier and Indian Princess are three fine new varieties. In the pure pinks, Phyllis McQuiston is still tops with us. Don't overlook Margaret Fulton; it is one of the most dependable glads grown. Good pinks are almost endless; we have Serenity for its delicate coloring; Conquest for sheer beauty; Zauberflote for early flowering and back to Picardy for an all-around good glad.

Robert, the First, introduced by us four years ago, has received favorable comment throughout the season. It was winner in the rose-pink class at the Minnesota State Fair again this year. Every bulb produces a fine spike and not a crooked spike have we ever found. It is our leading late cut flower variety. The price is within reach of everyone and all we ask you to do is to try it.

If you are looking for the odd and unusual we recommend Hinemoa, a chocolate brown; Jalna, terra cotta; Oddity, a smoky red with a silvery blotch; Rose Lady, ashes of roses; and Zuni, a combination of salmon and slate.

We receive many questions each year regarding glads for cut flowers so the following may be of some help to those who are interested. The prerequisites of a good cut flower variety are numerous. It should have good length of stem, flowers in proportion to the spike, clear color, healthy and fast grower and a good producer of bulblets. A self color is preferred over mixed colors, the lighter shades over the darker. White, pink, and lavender are the leading colors with smaller amounts of orange, yellow, blue and red. In the whites, White Orchid and Mrs. Ray D. Chase are fine earlies. Star of Bethlehem and Maid of Orleans for midseason and Mary Elizabeth and Carmen Sylva for late. Purity is fine, but too expensive for general use. Al Smith, Red Phipps and Johann S. Bach are three fine early reds with Dr. Bennett for midseason and Del Ray for late. Such varieties as Commander Koehl and Morocco are too dark for all-around use. Gold Eagle, Golden Chimes, Cadillac and Golden Cup are the leading yellows. Bright-
side and Orange Princess are the best of the average priced oranges, although La Fiesta will soon be useful when the prices come down. Minuet leads the lavenders. King Arthur, Berty Snow and Dr. Moody are also very fine. Early Melody, a pinkish lavender, is a fine early variety. Picardy with Mildred Louise and Debonair are the three leading pinks. Margaret Fulton is the most dependable along with Olive Goodrich. Lotus is a fine blush-pink. For early pinks we like Cara Mia, Miss Greeley, Schwaben Girl, Prof. Von Slogteren and Miss Joy. In the deeper shade of pink, don't overlook Dream o' Beauty, Constancy, and Robert, the First. Good blues are scarce, but Pelegrina and Libelle fill in well until stock of Blue Beauty, Blue Admiral and Robert Burns becomes more plentiful.

The price does not always show the merit and beauty of any variety. When there is a quantity of stock in any variety, the prices drop as with any other commodity. New varieties are high only because of their scarcity. Of course, some may drop more rapidly in price than others, as they increase faster; while those that are poor increasers usually drop very slowly.

A new glad to get near the top today, must be a glad for all general purposes. It must satisfy the florist as well as the garden lover; it must be fine enough to exhibit in the showroom; and it must have substance and vigor to endure all of the different variations of temperature and environment under which it will be grown. The modern glads of the summer and early fall gardens are the most popular of all flowers. The spikes grow tall and elegant, sturdy and dignified, slender and graceful, and the color range absolutely infinite.

## Robert, The First

Our first introduction. A huge, heavily ruffled, pale rose-purple with an amaranth purple blotch (Ridgway). The general effect is a deep rosepink. Eight to ten florets open at one time with as high as $20-25$ buds to the spike. Winner of many first prizes at the Minnesota State Gladiolus Society Show and at the Minnesota State Fair. It easily won first place in its color class at the International Flower Show held in Chicago, 1936. Now at a price everyone can afford.

Aachen- (Mitsch, 1937). A beautiful, daintily ruffled, lustrous cream glad. A fine, new commercial and exhibition variety. A Picardy seedling. L. \$1.20; M. 60c; S. 30c; Blts. 5 for 40c.

Admiral- (Pfitzer, 1937). A brilliant scarlet red with a dark crimson pointed blotch. The wide open florets of heavy substance are well placed on a tall, strong stem. L. $\$ 4.00 ;$ M. $\$ 3.00$; S. \$2.25; Blts. 1 for 40c.

Alayne-(Kinyon, 1936 ). Beautiful new shade of light rose. Never flecks. Straight stems. Blooms somewhat ruffled and all face one way. Splendid keeper when cut, opening up perfectly to the last tip. L. $\mathbf{2 5} \mathbf{c} ; \mathrm{M} .15 \mathrm{c} ; \mathrm{S}$. 10c; Blts. 12 for 25c.

Allaglow-(Zimmer', 1937). Tall Begonia rose with rose blotch. One of the very fine new varieties. Eighteen to twenty buds, all showing color with many open at once. L. $\$ 1.00 ;$ M. 75c; S. 35c; Blts. 1 for $10 c$.

Alsegro- (Ptitzer, 1934). Light lavender blue with dark blue blotch. The spikes are long, develop perfectly. Six or more flowers of large size; promising cut flower variety. L. 25c; M. 15c; S. 10c; Blts. 6 for 15c.

Allemania-(Pfitzer, 1934). A light, bright scarlet. Comes earlier than Commander Koehl and may replace it as a cut flower. L. :20c; M. 15c; S. $\mathbf{1 0 c}$; Blts. 10 for 20c.
Amanda-(Uhrig, 1938). Salmon-pink with yellow throat. An extra early exhibition type. This new variety did not look promising this past year but may do better another year. L. \$5.00; M. $\$ 3.00$; Blts. 1 for 25e and 10 for $\$ 2.00$.

Amberglow- (Palmer, 1936 ). Soft, but brilliant, clear unmarked amber yellow. A fine, clear color and other fine qualities make it an ideal cut flower, yellow. Early. L. 50c; M. 30c; S. 20 c ; Blts. 15 for 2.5 c .

Amrita- (Palmer, 1937). A fine apri-cot-buff with medium-sized blooms on a good spike. An improved Wasaga. L. $\$ 1.50$; M. $\$ 1.00$; S. 60c; Blts. 2 for 25 c .

Angelus-(Palmer, 1936). Warm light pink with a small throat marking of pure cream. A smooth finished glad. L. $\$ 1.50$; M. $\$ 1.00$; S. $\mathbf{7 5 c}$; Blts. 2 for 25 c .

Arabella-(Pfitzer, 1933). A glossy dark purple, almost black and the darkest yet introduced. A very large flowered variety with florets of heavy texture; $14-16$ buds with six open at a time. A remarkable exhibition variety. L. 20c; M. 15c; S. 10c; Blts. 5 for 20 c .

Barcarole-(Palmer, 1937). Fine sal-mon-orange with a creamy yellow mid-rib in the throat. Heavy substance and perfect placement. Ruffled. L. $\$ 2.00$; M. $\$ \mathbf{1 . 2 5}$; S. 75 c ; Blts. 1 for $\mathbf{2 5} \mathrm{c}$.

Beacon-(Palmer, 1935). Clear bright rose-scarlet with large clear cream blotch. Very tall straight spikes with $8-10$ blooms open. A very distinctive and striking color. See color plate. L. $\mathbf{2 5 c} ;$ M. 18c; S. 10c; Blts. 10 for 20c.

Beautiful Ohio - (Hullibarger, 1936). A beautiful light rose with a tint of lavender. The color is unusually clear. The flower head and placement are of the Minuet type. Substance heavy; spike strong and straight. L. 35c; M. 25c; S. 20c; Blts. 5 for $\mathbf{1 5 c}$.

Big Lily- (Burtner, 1934). A large white with a cream throat. Lilyshaped blooms with a silvery sheen. Exceptionally strong grower; good substance. L. $\mathbf{1 5 c}, 10$ for $\$ \mathbf{1 . 0 0} ; \mathrm{M}$. $10 c, 10$ for $75 \mathrm{c} ; \mathrm{S}$. $5 \mathrm{c}, 10$ for 35 c ; Blts. 10 for $\mathbf{1 5 c}$.

Bit o' Heaven- (Crow, 1937). Orange with yellow throat. Although not as bright as LaFiesta it is an excellent color and will go a long way as a cut flower variety. L. 25c; M. 15c; S. 10 c ; Blts. 10 for $2 \mathbf{2 5} \mathrm{c}$.

Black Opal-(Errey, 1936). A sensational new dark red or black from Australia. A good long flowering spike with perfect placement. Good increaser. L. $\$ \mathbf{1 . 5 0} ; ~ M . ~ \$ 1.00 ; ~ S . ~$ 60 c ; Blts. 1 for 15 c .

Blazing Star - (Zimmer, 1938). The brightest scarlet with a prominent white star blotch. Tall, strong grower and rapid increaser. No bulblets for sale this year. Bulbs, any size, $\$ 10.00$.

Blue Admiral - (Christ, 1933). Tall, straight-growing variety. Does not open as many as Pelegrina, but much taller, straighter stem. Color a little lighter than Pelegrina. An up and coming glad. L. $10 c, 10$ for $80 c$; M. $6 \mathrm{c}, 10$ for 50 c ; S. 4c, 10 for 30 c ; Blts. 100 for 40 c .

Blue Beauty - (Pfitzer, 1935). Light blue with edges of overlaid violet blue. Florets large of fine rounded form. Eight open with twenty buds, strong, healthy grower. A real exhibition variety that has received many awards. L. 25c; M. 15c; S. 8c; Blts. 10 for 25c.

Blue Domina-(Christ, 1932). A light lavender-blue that produces wonderful spikes for us. L. 15c; M. 10c; S. Sc; Blts. 10 for $\mathbf{1 5 c}$.

Bonnie Blue-(Christ, 1936). A large light blue and quoting Rev. Christ, "It is superior to any other of my blues thus far introduced." A remarkable variety. L. 50c; M. 30c; S. $\mathbf{1 5 c}$; Blts. 10 for 35c.

Camellia - (Palmer, 1937). A blush white tinted pink with a small, vivid, orange-scarlet blotch. We highly recommend this variety. L. \$1.50; M. $\$ 1.00$; S. 60c; Blts. 3 for $25 c$.

Colossus-(Mitsch, 1936). A rich pink. Huge spikes that make wonderful exhibition flowers. Always well faced, spaced and straight. Exceptionally early. L. \$1.20; M. 60c; S. 30c; Blts. 3 for $\mathbf{2 5 c}$.

Conquest- (Mitsch, 1936). Light sal-mon-pink with cream throat blotches. A very pleasing color combination in a well-opened ruffled flower. We highly recommend it. L. 60c; M. 30c; S. 15 c ; Blts. 10 for 40 c .

Da Capo-(Pfitzer, 1934). Very early, extra large, silvery pink flowers with white blotches. L. 25c; M. 15c; S. 10c; Blts. 10 for 30c.

Del Ray - (Burnter, 1934). A tall, light red with a beautiful clear white throat. This variety is always a high light of our blooming season. We predict a big future for this variety both as an exhibition and a cut flower variety. Early Rose-(Jack, 1936). A rich rose shading to lighter rose in the inner part of the petals. The two tones combine beautifully. An early bloomer, good propagator and fine all-around cut flower variety. L. 10c; M. 8c; S. 5c; Blts. 10 for 15 c .

Elfin Queen-(Christ, 1936). A large pure salmon without any foreign color. L. 50c; M. 30c; S. 15c; Blts. 10 for 35c.

Golden Fleece-(Ellis). A rich deep yellow that we have been growing for a number of years and believe that it rates near the top in this class. L. 30c; M. 20c; Blts. 10 for 40c.

Golden Lancer-(Heberling, 1937). A yellow sport of Marnia. L. 20c; M. 15c; S. 10c; Blts. 25 for 15 c .

Green Light-(Pfitzer, 1935). General effect white, with greenish gloss. Heavily ruffled medium large florets. Five open. Midseason exhibition variety. L. 40c; M. 30c; S. 20c; Blts. 4 for 20c.

Harlekin-(Pfitzer, 1935). An unusual coloring of cherry red with golden yellow marking and blotch. Seven open on a good long spike. A fine decorative. L. 50c; M. 30c; S. 20c; Blts. 10 for $\mathbf{3 0 c}$.

Hector-(Palmer, 1936). A light early scarlet, nicely ruffled. Grew somewhat short for us the past season, but was a blaze of color over a long period. L. 10c, 10 for 80 c ; MI. $\mathbf{7 c}, 10$ for $\mathbf{5 0 c}$; Blts. 15 for $\mathbf{1 0 c}$.

Heiligtum-(Pfitzer, 1935). A fine white, good form and placement. Seven large open florets, long spike and excellent grower. A fine exhibition variety. L. 40c; M. 30c; S. $\mathbf{2} \mathbf{5 c}$; Blts. 5 for 25 c .

Hildred-(Love, 1938). Lavender without markings. Nine medium sized florets open on a spike of good height that will average $20-22$ buds. Received highest awards in 1937. \$2.00 each, any size. Blts. 25c, 12 for $\$ 2.50$.

Hindenburg's Memory-(Pfitzer, 1937). The most striking glad in our gardens the last season. Gigantic size blooms of deep scarlet red. The immense florets measure 6 to 7 inches across and are remarkably well placed on a strong, tall spike. L. \$6.00; M. $\$ 4.00$; S. $\$ 2.00$; Blts. 1 for 60 c .

## How To Grow Good "Glads"

In the spring, as soon as the ground has dried out, spade your garden to a depth of at least 12 inches. Plant the bulbs in rows about 20 inches apart to admit free and intensive cultivation, and about 3 inches apart in the row, covering with 6 inches in light soil and 3 inches in heavy ground. Be sure that the covering soil is mellow.

FERTILIZING. If some good rotted manure can be procured in the fall, give the garden a good coating and spade it under. Realizing that such fertilizer is hard to obtain, we must take the next best choice and use a commercial fertilizer. For the average gardener the best to use is sheep manure. After the row or trench is made this fertilizer can be applied thickly in the bottom and mixed with the mellow earth, but we prefer setting the bulbs, then covering with an inch or two of earth and then applying the fertilizer before the row is filled in. This allows the fertilizing properties to soak down to the roots where it is needed. After growth has started another application on each side of the row and thoroughly worked into the soil is of much benefit; in fact, this top-dressing can be applied several times during the growing season. Before flower spikes appear, a good top-dressing of super phosphate and potash worked in will greatly benefit the flowers. GROWING FLOWERS SHOULD HAVE A CONSTANT SUPPLY OF MOISTURE AT ALL TIMES.
