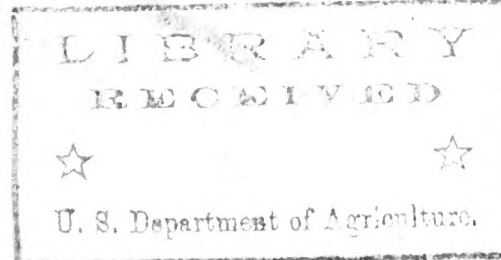
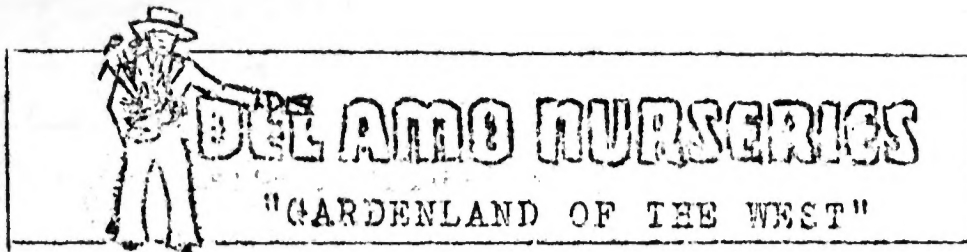

1940 FRUIT TREE LIST

NOTE: The fruit trees on this list are recommended for home planting in the coastal plains and adjacent areas of Southern California.

ALMONDS - 60¢ each, 10 or more 50¢ each.

NE PLUS ULTRA - Popular commercial variety, heavy producer of large, elongated, soft shelled nuts; the tree is vigorous.

NONPAREIL - California's leading variety. "Paper-shell." Kernel is long, plump, sweet and of high quality. Strong grower.

APPLES - 60¢ each, 10 or more 50¢ each.

RED ASTRACHAN - Popular early variety. Bearing in July; heavy cropper, especially adapted to warm interior valleys. Red fruit of fair size. Delicious for eating fresh or cooking.

WHITE WINTER PERMAIN - Tree vigorous and a good bearer. Splendid home orchard variety. Large oblong fruit; pale yellow skin with blush on sunny side. Tender, juicy, fine grained. Bears October to November.

WINTER BANANA - October to November. Fruit is large pale yellow with decided red blush; crisp tender flesh. Should be planted with another variety for pollinization. A quick bearer, adapted to coastal climate.

APRICOT - 60¢ each, 10 or more 50¢ each.

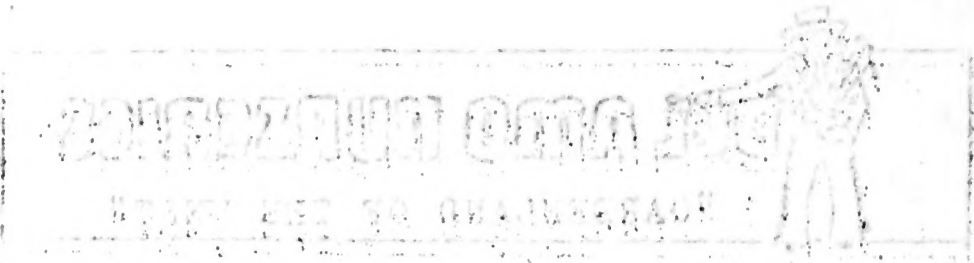
ROYAL - June. Similar to Blenheim, but ripens before Blenheim. Used extensively for canning and drying. Succeeds in nearly all Apricot districts and has a good reputation as an all purpose variety.

BLENHHEIM - California's leading Apricot. Fruit is large, of good form, attractive in color and of excellent quality. It is one of the heaviest bearers and most consistent.

CHERRIES - 60¢ each, 10 or more 50¢ each.

ENGLISH MORELLO - June. The standard late, red, sour, juice cherry. It is one of the best for canning. Fruit is medium large, dark red, approaching black when ripe.

Note: The fruit trees on this list are recommended for planting in the coastal areas and adjacent areas of Southern California.

ALMONDS - 60¢ each, 10 or more 50¢ each.

THE KING ALMOND - Superior commercial variety, heavy producer, large, elongated, early ripened nut; the tree is vigorous and hardy.

MONARCH ALMOND - California's leading variety. It is large, plump, sweet and of high quality. It is very hardy and productive.

APPLES - 60¢ each, 10 or more 50¢ each.

RED ASTORIA - Superior early variety. Bears in the fall. It is especially adapted to the coastal areas and is a favorite of fair sales. Delicious for eating, cooking and for cider.

WHITE WINTER PEACH - Tree vigorous and a good bearer. It is a home orchard variety. Large, early fruit, with a thin skin and a firm, juicy, tender, early ripening fruit. Bears in October to November.

WINTER PEACH - October to November. Fruit is large, yellow with a decided red blush. It is a very hardy tree and is planted with another variety for pollination. A good bearer, adapted to coastal climates.

APRICOT - 60¢ each, 10 or more 50¢ each.

ROYAL - Similar to the Blenheim, but ripens earlier. Used extensively for canning and drying. It is a hardy tree and has a good reputation as a bearing tree. All-around favorite and has a good reputation as a bearing tree.

BLHEMISH - California's leading Apricot. Fruit is large, of good form, ripens in the end of excellent quality. It is one of the hardiest bearers and most consistent.

CHERRIES - 60¢ each, 10 or more 50¢ each.

EMERALD - Large, dark red, ripens early. It is one of the best for canning and drying. It is a hardy tree and has a good reputation as a bearing tree.

ALL DECIDUOUS FRUIT ON LIST ARE 4-6 FT. WITH A 20 GALLON GRAFTED ROOT SYSTEM.

FIGS - 65¢ each, 10 or more 60¢ each.

WHITE ADRIATIC - August. Reddish pulp, white skin, heavy bearer.

DURO BLACK - Large black fruit, does well in coastal sections, produces two distinct crops.

KADOTA - August to September. Medium sized, practically seedless, light green. Bears when young.

NECTARINES - 60¢ each, 10 or more 50¢ each.

GOLD MINE - July. A large attractive fruit, delicious in flavor. Flesh is white with some red at the pit. A perfect freestone. Good for home canning and eating fresh. Vigorous.

PEACHES - 60¢ each, 10 or more 50¢ each.

BABCOCK - Early July. A new freestone developed to meet the requirements of the mild climate in Southern California. Resistant to delayed defoliation caused by warm winters. This a heavy bearer with medium sized fruits, highly colored. Flesh is white and very sweet.

EARLY IMPERIAL - Late June to July. An early yellow freestone. The fruit is of medium size, with an attractive blush overlaying a yellow skin. Flesh is sweet and juicy.

LUKENS HONEY - August. One of the best. Like the Saucer, even in the warmer sections, it always comes through with a heavy crop. Bears small greenish white, white fleshed fruit.

PEACHES (PATENTED)

RIO OSO GEM (Plant Patent #84) 70¢ each, 10 or more 60¢ each.

August. A new yellow freestone resembling the Hale; but it claims a higher color and sweeter flavor. The flesh is yellow, firm and richly flavored.

PLUMS - 60¢ each, 10 or more 50¢ each.

SANTA ROSA - Late June. Fruit large in size, has firm flesh, and good eating qualities. The flesh is reddish in color, juicy and has a pleasing tart flavor. The tree is an upright grower, vigorous and very productive.

SATSUMA - August. an old variety still popular in home orchards. it makes excellent jams. The fruit is nearly round, color is dark red, flesh is deep blood red and juicy.

PLUMS - 50¢ each, 10 or more 50¢ each

WHITE AGRICOLA - August. Reddish pulp, white skin, very juicy.

DURO BLACK - Large black fruit, does well in coastal regions. Produces two distinct crops.

KABOTA - August to September. Medium sized, practically seedless. Light green. Good for eating fresh.

NECTARINES - 50¢ each, 10 or more 40¢ each

GOLD KING - July. A large attractive fruit, yellowish flesh is white with some red at the tip. Good for eating fresh and for canning.

BABCOCK - Early July. A large attractive fruit, yellowish flesh is white with some red at the tip. Good for eating fresh and for canning.

LUXEMBOURG - August. One of the best. The fruit is of medium size, with a yellowish flesh. In later season it is larger and sweeter.

PLUMS - 50¢ each, 10 or more 40¢ each

NEW YORK - August. One of the best. The fruit is of medium size, with a yellowish flesh. In later season it is larger and sweeter.

GRAPEFRUIT \$1.25 each.

LEMONS \$1.25 each.

EUREKA - The leading lemon for home planting. It bears continually throughout the year, ripens most of its fruit in the summer. The tree is almost thornless, seeds are few, juice is abundant.

ORANGES \$1.25 each.

WASHINGTON NAVEL - California's well known navel orange, the seedless variety harvested in the winter.

VALENCIA - California's summer orange, containing abundant juice. The fruit is medium sized, with few seeds, and the tree is the largest of all Citrus varieties.

TANGERINES \$1.75 each.

DANCY - A strong growing, heavy producing type of the Mandarin Orange. A medium to large fruit, firm, flattened in shape, exceedingly juicy. February to May.

LIMES \$1.75 each.

BEARSS - Largest and finest of the limes, seedless and attaining the size of a small lemon. The tree ripens most of its fruit in the summer, and is slightly hardier than the Mexican.

MEXICAN - This lime is semi-dwarf, the fruit is light green, oval, strongly acid and richly flavored. The fruit ripens all thru the year, with the main crop in the Spring.
