But the earlier your order is sent in, the better plants and service we can give as soon as weather conditions are ideal for transplanting.

## Peony Pointers

Plant Peonies about 3 feet apart each way where they get full sunshine. Peterson Peonies do best when left undisturbed in the same bed for many years. Keep feeding them every spring and midisummer. Moving and dividing old established clumps of non-blooming Peonies does not cause them to bloom in following years. Try our young, fresh roots for a permanent planting. They are not so particular about soil provided it is clean and never grew Peonies before. Spade 15 to 18 inches deep, put about a half pound of a complete chemical fertilizer in the bottom layer, but do not have manure or fertilizer in the upper 9 to 10 -inch layer. Further planting and cultural directions are sent with each order.
We are still unable to understand why so many recommend early September planting for Peonies whereas it has been our experience, as well as that of our customers, that planting later in fall gives as good, if not better results.
