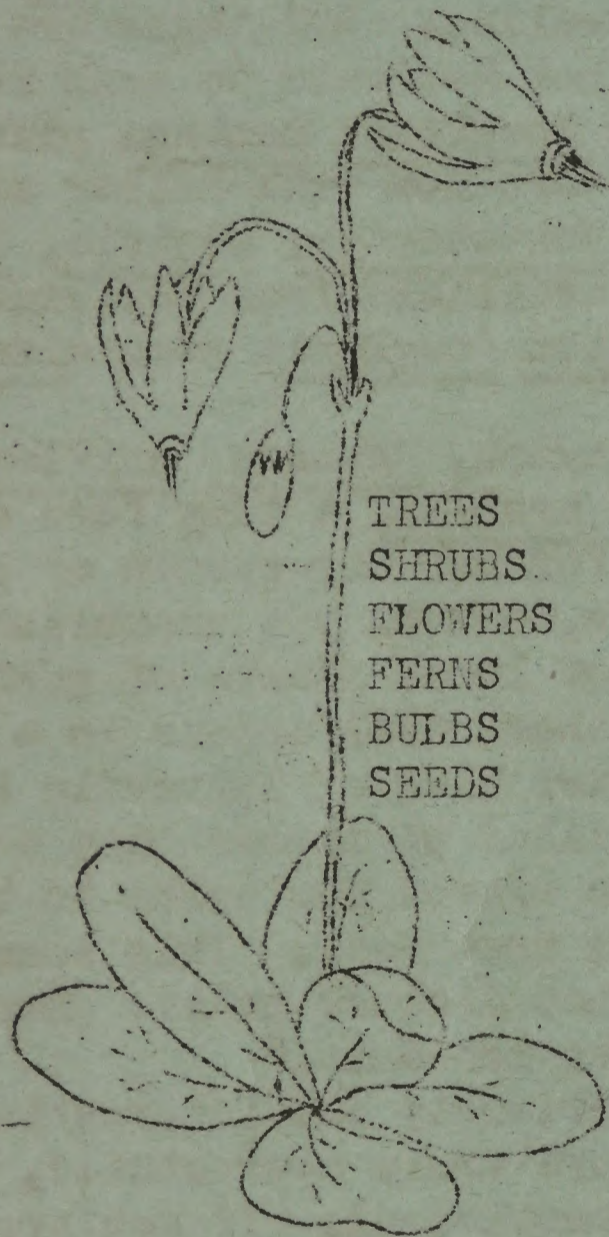

Spring is Calling.

Spring. Our northern sun is earlier over Sentinel ridge and soon the first buttercups will be smiling.

Whats new? Mother Nature does not introduce new varieties as regularly as other growers do, which is perhaps just as well, with so many good plants now all too little known. During the past summer, for the first time, I found our white lady's slipper, Cypripedium montanum, in sufficient abundance to supply all applicants. Another variety, C. Knightae, grows with it in one locality. I found Western skunk cabbage and Devil's club in a new swamp, the rare holly fern common under virgin white pine, and Sedum Leibergii, charming indeed on its mossy rock-slide. All these are from wild country where I love to go. Please do not hesitate to send me there.

Young Douglasia montana plants that started abundantly a year or two ago are now 'the dollar size' so nice to move. Thrifty, young plants of Pentstemons, Lewisia, Erigeron, Potentilla, Sieversia and Phlox are available from the same area. This phlox, by the way, now becomes Phlox douglasii ssp. missoulaensis Wherry, an unpublished variety.

Wood nymph, Monesses uniflora, was omitted from my last list by mistake. Marsilea, a tiny fern resembling a 4-leaf clover, is now available for the bog garden or pool's edge. Several additional pentstemons, two as yet unpublished, have found their way into my herbarium of local plants of garden value, and with spiderwort, sand lily and others will appear in a later list. May I send you a copy?

Two varieties of butterfly lilies, Calochortus, that I usually collect, failed to appear this season. Why? I can only guess. Examination proved the bulbs to be all right and a normal supply may be expected next year. This seems to emphasize what I have often said, "Do not disturb native plants for at least a year if they fail to appear on schedule."

Many friendly and interesting letters have come in during the year ~~and~~ were truly appreciated, altho sometimes tardily or inadequately acknowledged. If you are interested in native plants, I want to know you and to give you every courtesy possible. I only wish you could know my mountains as I do and I your gardens as you do. This list reminds you that we are still here waiting to supply you with good plants native to the Northwest. May we have at least a trial order? If a Rose may speak frankly, for Western American alpines, remember,
