## Terms and Conditions

PRICES. Prices in this list cancel all previous quotations and are subject to change without notice.

RATES. Except in a few instances, prices are shown for 1 to 9 , 10 to 49 and 50 to 499 . For larger quantities special discounts will be named on request.

TERMS. We are glad to extend usual credit to firms of known responsibility. Satisfactory references required from others. In handling of sales the following discounts will be allowed: $2 \%$ within ten days; $1 \%$ within thirty days; net sixty days from date of invoice. C. O. D. orders must be accompanied by $25 \%$ cash.

PACKING. All stock will be packed in approved manner. We charge for boxing and packing at actual cost of materials used. Where stock is loaded bulk in car or on truck, no charge for packing is made. No charge for baling stock will be made where full amount of cash accompanies order to ship. Please note, however, that discount does not apply where baling charge is free. Boxing or crating must necessarily be charged for on all orders where boxing or crating is required.

GUARANTEE. If any nursery stock, etc., proves untrue to description under which it is sold, seller shall be liable to purchaser only and to no greater extent or amount than the purchase price of such nursery stock, etc., and the seller, except for the aforesaid agreed liability and in respect to such purchased nursery stock, etc., gives no warranty expressed or implied as to description, quality, productiveness or any other matter.

SHIPPING. Our shipping begins about October 20th, and lasts until about March 31st, during which time there is scarcely a day but that we can make shipments. In addition to this, we handle balled plants throughout the entire year. Sherman is situated on railway lines of the Cotton Belt, Frisco, Southern Pacific, M.-K.-T., T. \& P., and Texas Electric, and is served by both the Railway Express Agency and Electric Express Agency, and in addition to this there are numerous truck lines through Sherman. If no directions are given, we will exercise our judgment in making shipments, but in doing so we assume no responsibility whatever.

LIABILITY. We book all orders with the distinct understanding that we shall not be liable for injury to stock from frost, hail, fire, or other causes beyond our control. We are not liable for delays in transit; our responsibility ceases upon delivery to transportation company.

CLAIMS. No claim for rejections or deficiencies will be entertained unless made within ten days after arrival of goods.
