# Conditions of Sale

This price list supercedes all previous lists. We offer unusual trees, shrubs and evergreens. While we carry a complete line of nursery stock, we list only items that are unusual and can be packed and shipped with perfect safety.

Prices in this catalog do not cover stock specially selected by the customers at the nursery, which will be charged according to its value regardless of size. Also specially selected material to conform to the customer's particular specifications would rate an additional charge.

All our stock is guaranteed true to name and up to the grade and quality ordered, and after leaving our nurseries in good condition our responsibility ends. See to it that the plant material does not dry out. If you are not prepared to plant the trees on arrival, moisten the bundle with a hose. Prepare the holes, then unpack and plant. Do not open up the bundle until the holes are ready for planting.

All material is freshly dug, and we can generally ship all winter, from early November until May. At certain intervals during January and February, the ground may occasionally be frozen for a week or two.

No charge for packing except on Weeping Cherries, and heavy specimen trees that have to be packed in a box or crate, or that would cost considerably more than the average packing. Freight and express charges are to be paid by the purchaser.

Plain and explicit shipping directions should be given with every order, naming freight or express office if different from post office. Our responsibility ceases when delivered to the express or freight office in good condition. Claims for shortage, or other complaints, must be presented within ten days after arrival of the plant material.

CASH WITH ORDER, except to persons who satisfy us as to their financial responsibility, when accounts will be due in 10 days. C.O.D. orders must be accompanied by one-third of the amount involved.

# FLOWERING CRAB (Malus)

The Chinese Flowering Crab has justly been called the "Queen of the Garden." Even though Crabs are not so well known as the Cherries, several varieties have no rivals among the Flowering Trees. About the same directions apply as for the Japanese Cherries, with the exception that Crabs have a wider range of adaptability to soil; wet or dry, rich or poor. Of course, they respond with more growth to good soil and culture. Some varieties, such as Atrosanguinea, will stand shearing especially well. They may be sheared into a pyramidal, standard or ball-shaped tree. All pruning and shearing are done after the flowers have passed.

The varieties Atrosanguinea and Floribunda lend themselves particularly well to planting as hedges. They are 103% hardy anywhere and will stand clipping or shearing into a typical hedge, or if desired they may be permitted to grow tall enough to be a sheared screen. They would make an effective hedge in New England, or any other Northern State with cold winter climate, where privet is an impossibility. The foliage is glossy, fairly small, and very attractive. The rees will flower just as well in a clipped hedge as when growing naturally, unsheared. If 2-3 ft. trees are used, they should be spaced 2 ft. apart, and for the 3-4 ft. size the spacing should be 21/2 ft.

In more recent years Garden Clubs have begun to appreciate the value of solorful fruits, and it is not overstating the fact that Flowering Crabs, such as Eleyi, Hopa, Floribunda Purpurea, and many others, have absolutely the most colorful fruit in existence.

Most of the varieties of Flowering Crab were either introduced or publicized by me. I have been growing flowering trees, especially Fowering Crab, for over twenty years, and have managed to educate our organization so thoroughly in the peculiarities of each variety, that it can identify the varieties at any time, summer or winter, in leaf or without foliage, in bloom or in fruit, which is, to judge from what I have been able to observe, considerably more than any other nursery in the United States can do, as in many cases trees sold by others are utterly misnamed and thoroughly scrambled. It is not because they do not want to send out trees correctly named, but because they simply don't know the difference in the various varieties. Bechtels Crab will probably always be delivered to you true to name no matter where you buy them, but this is more than can be said for the rest of the varieties.

The Flowering Crabs are hardy anywhere, in the mountain States, North Dakota, or in the hotter States, such as Texas and the Gulf States. The only varieties subject to cedar rust appear to be Ioensis or Prairie Crab, Bechtels, which is the double form of the Prairie Crab, Coronarius, Angustifolia, and to a minor degree Niedzwetzkyana. All the rest are entirely immune.

ALL HAVE PERFECT ROOT SYSTEM AND GOOD TOPS. DO NOT PRUNE OR CUT BACK. OUR TREES CAN SUPPORT ALL THE TOP BECAUSE YOU GET 100% OF THE ROOTS. ALL OF OUR CRABS, WITH THE EXCEPTION OF BECHTELS, ARE ON THEIR OWN ROOTS, NOT ON WILD UNDERSTOCK THAT MAY SPROUT FROM THE BASE AND GIVE YOU TROUBLE.

MALUS ALDENHAMENSIS. A new crab from England: a good red flower, medium sized colored fruit. Under favorable conditions, an additional crop of bloom will appear in September, and much to my surprise these September flowers are all double—quite different from those that appear in the spring. The flowers of this variety are probably the most colorful of all the varieties.

### Malus continued

- M. ANGUSTIFOLIA. A double flowering form of the wild Southern crab. This variety appears to be subject to cedar rust.
- M. ARNOLDIANA (Arnold C.) This variety resembles in a general way the somewhat delicate Halliana or Parkmani, but it is very much stronger growing. Flowers are pink, semi-double, early; splendid foliage; yellow fruit; very popular.
- M. ATROSANGUINEA (Carmine C.), single; red; bush form; early flowering. It may be used in varied positions: as a screen, or a perfect hedge 3 to 10 feet high. Lends itself to shearing, and can be sheared into columns, arches, hedges, and round-headed standards as perfectly molded as a ball. We have a few old specimen trees of this variety that are 15 ft. high with a spread of about 12 feet, and a trunk up to the first branches of 6 to 7 feet high. This variety, and Floribunda, can readily be trained into any style, form, or shape desired, even espalier.
- M. BACCATA. Fragrant, white flowers, cherry red fruit approximately the color of half ripened red cherries—a uniform scarlet color all around. Growth vigorous, pyramidal or cone shaped tapering to the top from a broad base. Fruit fine for jelly.
- **M. BACCATA CERACIFERA** (Cherry Crab). The fruit on this variety is a trifle larger than sweet cherries, a brilliant red color and produced in abundance; excellent for jelly. The flowers are white, fragrant.
- M. ELEYI. The best red-leaf sort in the spring coloring. Occasionally the tree will retain its color throughout the entire season, from spring until fall, but most of the trees turn green during the summer. The fruit is brilliant scarlet and very conspicuous: of excellent quality for jelly. During flowering period the tree is smothered with large red flowers in clusters
- M. FLORIBUNDA. Single; pink; early; spreading. Yellow fruit, slightly tinted red. An old, well-known variety and for that reason one of the best sellers.
- M. FLORIBUNDA-PURPUREA, one of the best; copper beech color foliage and flowers of beautiful red-violet; dark purple fruit, which is retained on the tree from August until late November. When the tree is in bloom, it is absolutely covered with deep purple blossoms more densely than any other variety with the exception of Hopa and Eleyi. Standard or Tree Form.
- M. HOPA, large flowering, purple leaf Crab. Very hardy and prolific bloomer; showy dark red fruit which is very colorful from August until late in November: quite formal and shapely growth. Red flowers. Foliage green during the summer. Has a distinct tendency to form a central leader; decidedly more regular in habit than most of the foregoing, with the exception of the two varieties of Baccata.
- M. IOENSIS (Prairie Crab). Grows wild in most of the States. The flowers are large, clear pink, fragrant, and resemble the wild rose. The only objection is the abundance of green apples that are hard as stone. They may be good for jelly, but I am inclined to doubt that. A cedar rust subject.
- M. IOENSIS BECHTELI (Bechtels Crab). The familiar, fragrant, double rose-like variety.
- M. MICROMALUS (Midget C.), flowers pink tint; single; dwarf habit. An extra choice sort. NEW. Compact growth, vase form. The long, slender branches covered with flowers suggest garlands of flowers. Real quality, α prime sort.

### Malus continued

- M. NIEDZWETZKYANA. Red flowers, large red fruit, foliage exactly like fruiting apple leaves. The apples are good, and that is the only reason we are listing this variety. As a flowering tree it is not nearly so desirable as any of the rest because it is extremely dilatory about coming into bloom. It has to reach a definite degree of maturity before there will be any flowers. It is really am apple, and not a crab.
- M. PARKMANI (Halliena; Parkman C.), double, pink. A dwarf tree, very low growing, just right for small gardens, very hardy, flowers an exceptionally lovely pink. Prolific, one of the first to open and one of the last to fade.
- M. RED SILVER. A new variety; silver coated foliage; red flowers. The trees originated in South Dakota, and I have not seen the fruit nor the flowers.
- M. RED TIP. A new variety of great merit; short stemmed red or pink flowers, similar in distribution to plum blossoms; a vigorous grower; an unusual sight while in bloom.
- M. SARGENTI (Sargent's C.). Dwarf; white flowers; abundant showy red fruit. Good for the small garden and a great favorite on account of the brilliant fruit; with the birds equally popular. Low growing and spreading habit; just the sort for rockeries and small gardens. One of the more striking varieties. Positively true to name. Good for a hedge up to six feet high if trained or sheared; will keep out intruders, even cows and dogs.
- M. SCHEIDECKERI. One of the most conspicuous pink flowering trees of early spring. Very prolific both in bloom and fruit. Flowers double pink; fruit excellent for jelly. Very hardy; an old sort.
- M. SPECTABILIS ROSEA PLENA. Very large double pink flowers profusely produced; yellow fruit. Next to Bechtels and Ioensis this variety produces the largest double flowers of all the Flowering Crabs.
- M. SPECTABILIS WHITE. A white form of the above. Double flowers; yellow fruit.
- M. THEIFERA. Used for tea making in China; lovely pink bloom; glossy foliage; upright habit. (Not the tea plant, but a Chinese substitute.)



IMPORTANT!!! All our trees are freshly dug to fill your order, and are not kept in storage at any time. They are packed immediately and kept thoroughly covered to the last minute. Therefore, they leave the nursery in good condition and almost invariably grow, the few failures being caused, usually, by insufficient watering at a critical period in early summer before they are established. An extremely hot or dry summer could also kill trees when they are not watered properly.

Magnolia trees and Dogwood trees require careful attention as indicated above; very few other species are in the least troublesome. Trees with soil balls require careful watering, more so than do trees with bare roots.

We have had so few complaints as to losses in transplanting that it hasn't seemed necessary to offer insurance. Recently, however, we have had inquiries as to insurance of growth, so we are offering to REPLACE ANY TREE THAT DIES WITHIN ONE YEAR IF 20% ADDITIONAL IS PAID FOR INSURANCE BEFORE THE SHIPMENT IS MADE.

# JAPANESE ROSEFLOWERING CHERRIES

The Japanese ornamental Cherries are among the most beautiful of all the flowering trees and take the lead possibly because of the popular appeal of the well advertised "Cherry Blossom Time" in Washington, D. C.

They vary a great deal in form and therefore are adapted to many uses in decorating the garden, either as specimens on the lawn, in small groups, for lining lanes and avenues, and as vistas. Vistas are made by a double row of trees placed in pergola-like manner 10 to 12 feet apart across the pergola, and spaced about 6 feet in the rows. One or two varieties should be used for this purpose, preferably one.

The colors of flowers range from pure white, to blush and delicately tinted pinks, on through to deep pinks or old rose. These Cherries will thrive in any reasonably good, well-drained soil, with average moisture. In general, the same soil conditions should prevail under which the fruiting types of cherries do best. These can be grown throughout the same areas as the peach, and even somewhat farther north.

- AMANOGAWA ZAKURA, light pink; late; double; pyramidal or columnar; just right for formal planting or small gardens. A very unusual sort, attracts favorable attention always—yet very rare. Planted two or three feet apart in a straight line, Amanogawa makes a perfect hedge and need never be pruned or sheared.
- AUTUMNALIS (winter flowering), semi-double; pale pink flowers; blooms in Fall and early Spring; very unusual and rare. During the mild winter of 1930-31 α pair of old trees in α Philadelphia suburb were in full bloom during the entire holiday season, Christmas and New Year's, and it was not α mean petty display, but an abundance of bloom. Yet when spring came, they bloomed just as much it seems. Autumnalis will not bloom during low temperatures in the winter, but responds to α mild period.
  - BENI HIGAN ZAKURA (Higan Cherry, P. subhirtella) "Spring Cherry." First to bloom; very prolific blush pink, small, singe flowers that bloom with the last snow of winter. The late "Chinese" Wilson, plant explorer, rates this variety as one of the best of the Japanese Mountain Cherries.
- **FUJIZAN** (Shirotae; Mount Fuji), snow white; large double flowers; vigorous; extra choice. A splendid showy variety, considered one of the better of the **white** double Japanese Cherries.
- HOSOKAWA BENI ZAKURA, pink, mid-season; upright growth, slight spread; fragrant.
- JEANNE WOHLERT, dwarf; semi-double; new; rare. The effect of this tree in bloom is that of many branched hyacinth of a lovely soft pink.
- KANZAN ZAKURA (Kwanzan), double deep pink; vigorous; upright. The tendency to spread is not evident until the trees are approximately ten years old. While consulting the Superintendent of the Park System in Washington, D. C., I asked him what variety of Flowering Cherry the public seemed to prefer. He replied, "The variety Kwanzan seems to appeal most to the public."

# Japanese Cherries continued

- **KOFUGEN ZAKURA** (Fugenzo), double, deep pink. Similar to Kanzan, but slower growth. Not likely to grow straight or have a straight stem.
- MOMIJIGARI, similar to Beni Higan in growth, less spreading. Flowers are small, well filled or double, deep pink, produced in great quantities.
- MRS. A. E. WOHLERT, our latest introduction; much clearer and more brilliant color than Kanzan or Kofugen. A great improvement. As soon as enough stock is available of this sort, we perhaps may discard the other two varieties. Kanzan is rated in Washington as a leader, but this variety is superior.
- NADEN ZAKURA, pink; late flowering; double; very popular; vigorous grower; showy and attractive; adapted for street or lane planting; an excellent companion for Kofugen. This variety, as well as Kanzan and Serrulata albo rosea makes excellent pergolas or vistas, if planted in two parallel rows, 10 to 12 feet apart, with 6 to 8 feet between the trees, in the rows.
- OJOCHIN ZAKURA (Chinese Lantern), large, semi-double pink flowers; vigorous; strong-growing.
- **PAUL WOHLERT,** semi-double; deep pink or red; fragrant; flowers in great profusion. The earliest of the large hyacinth flowering varieties.
- **ROSEA** (Rose), **late**; double flowers about 1¾ inches in diameter, borne in raceme-like clusters of three or four flowers; vígorous; α spreading sort; α good lane, shade or street tree. A free bloomer and the flowers open fully just as the leaves commence to develop.
  - ROSY MORN. This variety is a delicate rich pink, fitting in between Naden and Kanzan. The habit of growth is identical with Naden; but the color is much deeper, while not as deeply colored as Kanzan.
- RUTH WOHLERT, blush; midseason; spreading. An extra good sort with double flowers of attractive tint.
- SARGENTI (Yama; Prunus serrulata sachalinensis), single, large flowers of light red violet; early; spring foliage copper beech color, green in summer; a popular sort; very hardy; probably the hardiest of all the varieties with the possible exception of Ben'i Higan, which may be as hardy against cold and low temperature. Considered one of the best for New England.
- **SERRULATA ALBO ROSEA** (Shirofugen), vigorous: light pink; large double flowers; green foliage, late flowering. Similar to Naden and Rosea in habit and color of flowers, but slightly paler.
- SHIRO HIGAN, single pink; large flowers; early; vigorous. A choice sort. A much improved Yoshino.
- **SHOGETSU.** soft pink; double; large. Has leafy green carpels in center of flower; leaves very pale green. A beauty in every way.
- SIEBOLDI is identical with our Naden; at least the difference is not great.
- **TAIZANFUKUN**, flowers single, snow-white; leaves small; grows unusually erect and slender; late. Not well known, but you should by all means plant this variety.
- **TAKINIOI**, flowers of medium size, single and semi-double; buds flesh, open flowers white. Valued for its delightful fragrance.
- UKON, unique in having double yellow flowers of good size.

YOSHINO (Yedoensis), single blush; red buds; early. This is the tree that borders the Tidal Basin in Washington, D. C. The chief value of this variety, as I see it, is that it blooms so extremely early and in such profusion, that it is quite a revelation after the long winter. Very few trees or shrubs, excepting Beni Higan, Weeping Cherry and Forsythia, are in bloom before Yoshino flowers. Therefore, the planting of this exceedingly beautiful tree is particularly to be recommended. It opens the season of flowers. Mr. Baxter, Horticulturist of Fairmount Park, Philadelphia, is definitely of the opinion that this is the variety that should be featured in parks because it gives "a blaze of glory all at one time that is not equalled by any other early spring flowering tree." There is no objection to planting this variety in such a manner that the branches will lie on the ground. If that effect is wanted, they should not be planted too closely, and the low branches should not be removed. One hundred trees sold at a discount of 50%.

YOSHINO DAYBREAK, delicate flesh pink; single flowers so dense as to almost obscure the branches. Flowers are a deeper color and larger than Yoshino.

# JAPANESE WEEPING CHERRIES

SHIDARE HIGAN ZAKURA (Prunus Subhirtella Pendula, var. Rosea). Pink, early, after Beni Higan, the first tree to bloom in the spring and the first deep pink flowers of the season. It is safe to say it is the first flowering tree of the season in the suburbs of Philadelphia. This variety we offer in the following forms:

**Pyramid or Bush Form,** branched from the ground up, own roots, in either single or double flowering. The double flowering seems to stay in bloom somewhat longer than the single flowering; the color is identical, but the flowers are very full with approximately two dozen

petals.

**Standard Form,** tree or umbrella shaped. Grafted on trunks or stems from 3 to 5 feet high. All our trees have been top pruned, ready lor planting.

FRINGE CHERRY. This is a new weeping Cherry we are introducing. It was propagated from a tree on the property of one of my friends in the vicinity of Philadelphia, who bought a section of an old estate that had been planted to a fine collection of exceptionally rare trees, among them this unusual Weeping Cherry. The flowers are practically white, the branches are thin, pendulent, with small flowers placed so closely on the drooping branches that the effect at a distance is that of a rice curtain, or should I say a tree draped with white fringes. We have been propagating from this tree for several years, but the tree was so decrepit that it was difficult to obtain any wood worthwhile in spite of the hearty cooperation of the owner.

SHIDARE YOSHINO (Weeping Yoshino). Large, single, pure white flowers. Branches much thicker than on Shidare Higan, but spaced further apart. The leaves are much larger. The picturesque shape of the tree with or without flowers or leaves is very attractive.

# Books

It is just as easy to produce and grow a good variety as a poor one — it cost neither more nor less — unless one of them is faster-growing. Therefore, I distinctly point out certain varieties as not desirable compared with the superior sorts.

My Flowering Cherries and Crabs are practically all on their own roots, eliminating the problem of understock, good, bad or indifferent.

Additional copies of "Flowering Trees of the Orient" may be had for 25c each.

In my book "Oriental Wistaria for the American Garden," I have attempted to point out that while the extremely longcluster Japanese varieties are very unusual and worth waiting for, there isn't any doubt but that you will have to wait before they will bloom. Just how long one has to wait is always a little uncertain because that depends on local soil conditions and climate, but after they come into bloom they are far superior and much more unusual than the common sorts. The variety Shiro Noda, white, in the 7- and 8-year-old sizes, have all bloomed during the past season — all of them.

The Chinese Wistaria are likely to bloom immediately. All of our Chinese Wistaria have bloomed in the nursery.

# **CLEMATIS**

CLEMATIS, hardy varieties. Thrives best in a rich garden loam of rather light texture. Sand and peat moss may be added to a heavy soil to loosen it. When planting, spread out the roots flat and sprinkle soil lightly over them. Avoid having all the roots in one bunch. Soil must be well drained where Clematis is to be planted. Since Clematis is partial to lime, it should be mixed with the soil when planting, and if necessary it may be occasionally added thereafter, working it well into the soil without disturbing the roots.

# ESPALIER TRAINED DWARF FRUIT TREES Distinctive — Practical — Decorative

Trained Fruit Trees should have a place in every garden, and we are sure many gardeners will welcome our offer of these trees at this time. It is a simple matter to erect a "post and wire" fence to which they may be lightly tied or to a "wired wall," which is accomplished by driving wall hooks into the wall at intervals of 1 foot each way, leaving 4-5 inches protruding, to which the galvanized wires are horizontally attached. The "leaders" of the trees are carefully tied to the wires by "figure of eight" loops of tarred twine or heavy raffia, which allows limited leeway and prevents chaffing. Trained trees should be planted 12 to 15 inches from a wall to allow for fruit development.

Beware of cheap espalier trees, for if they are offered at materially less than our prices they cannot be dwarfs but are ordinary orchard trees trained, and they cannot be kept down to the confined space no matter what you do.

Trained trees enable the owners of small properties to utilize wall space which might otherwise be wasted. The side of a building fence may thus be made to produce surprisingly large crops of choice apples, pears, peaches, cherries and even nectarines. Only three years are required ordinarily for these trees to reach the bearing age, and apart from their practical value, they lend a touch of the "old world" to the garden which is seen all too rarely in this country.





# HANSEN BUSH CHERRIES

Hansen Bush Cherries. The new quick-bearing Cherry—easy to grow—sure to produce. This is a new development in fruit culture that is gradually changing the method of plum and cherry fruit production throughout the northwest, because of the immense amount of choice quality fruit that can be produced on such a very small area.

The fruit is of large size, good flavor and quality to eat fresh and make the most wonderful rich-flavored, dark purple-red jam. The juice makes splendid

jelly as well as a not to be forgotten cordial that won't be kept long.

The fruit of this new cherry much resembles a plum in size and shape. It comes massed in clusters and at times almost completely covers the limbs. The tree itself grows in a bush-like shape, rarely over four or five feet tall, branching and bearing from the ground up, usually bearing the year after planting, though often the year they are set out and annually thereafter. This dwarf stature is of value in the garden as it does not take up the room of an ordinary plum tree yet often bears more. They should be planted two to four feet apart in rows four to six feet apart; twelve to twenty-five or more in every home garden.

In landscape planting the Bush Cherry also is desirable as it is of striking ornamental value, its dwarf bushy nature is of great aid in foundation planting, or they may be planted close enough for a low fruiting hedge on the lawn or

in the garden.

The foliage is a beautiful silvery green, turns to a rich red and gold in Fall and adds a very desirable touch to any landscape. The profuse masses of large fragrant white flowers completely cover the branches and are a glorious sight in early Spring.
