

### General Directions to Customers

The attention of our customers is respectfully called to the following directions, which will, if followed, be an aid to purchasers as well as ourselves:

#### Prices in This Catalog Supplant Those in All Previous Catalogs

- 1. ORDER EARLY. We aim to execute all orders as soon as received, but during the rush season from March to May and again from July to September, slight delays are unavoidable, which, however, can be largely overcome by our patrons anticipating their wants and ordering and taking delivery of their requirements early.
- 2. CANADIAN SHIPMENTS. Flower seeds are sent postpaid. Plants are sent by express, purchaser paying all charges. Patrons who wish to purchase plants or bulbs must secure a permit from the Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.
- 3. SAFE ARRIVAL OF PACKAGES. We guarantee the safe arrival of all goods sent by express or mail to points within the United States. If a package sent by express or mail is injured or lost, we will replace it as soon as informed of the fact. Goods sent in any other way are solely at purchaser's risk. Frequently it happens that orders never reach us or are without signature. When customers fail to receive their packages in a reasonable time they should inform us, and at the same time send a copy of their order and any other information necessary to trace the goods. Claims for damage must be made on receipt of goods. We do not hold ourselves responsible for failure after delivery of the goods in good condition.
- 4. ERRORS. We exercise the utmost care in filling orders, striving to do a little more than we offer; yet in the press of business, errors sometimes occur, in which event we wish to be promptly notified of the fact, and will make such corrections as will be satisfactory. Please keep copies of all your orders for comparison.
- 5. REMITTANCES should be made by Check, Post Office Money Order, Drafts, or Express Money Orders. Personal Checks for less than one dollar are not acceptable as we are charged collection fees for such small checks; send stamps instead. We disclaim all responsibility when remittances are not made as above directed. Where it is not possible to obtain these, the letters should be registered. Coin should not be sent by mail.
- 6. CASH WITH ORDER. Please send money with the order sufficient to cover the whole bill. We decline sending goods "Collect on Delivery" unless remittance be made on account to guarantee acceptance.
- 7. NAME AND ADDRESS. Please remember to write on each order your name, post office, county and state; also give number of street or P. O. box as distinctly as possible; also the nearest express office, or, if on a stage route, send us special directions.
- 8. CATALOGS. We send our customers two catalogs annually: THE SPRING CATALOG early in January and the IRIS AND MID-SUMMER plant, seed and bulb catalog about the last part of June. Customers having more than one address will oblige by stating to which address they wish the catalog mailed.

Most of the failures with seeds, plants and bulbs are due to causes entirely beyond our control, such as unfavorable weather or soil conditions, too deep or too shallow planting, etc., which renders it impossible for us to guarantee success, and although we take all possible care to supply only such goods as will, under proper conditions, produce satisfactory results, we still give no warranty as to description, quality or productiveness of any of the seeds, plants or bulbs we send out, and will not be in any way responsible for the crop, and every order for articles named in this catalog will be executed on these conditions only. It must, however, be plain to everyone who gives the matter the slightest thought that it is to our best interests to send out only such stock as will not only grow, but prove true to name and description.





# Hardy Garden Chrysanthemums

AUGUST, SEPTEMBER, OCTOBER FLOWERING

The cultivation of these 'Mums is simple; plant them in a rich well-drained piece of ground, setting out the plants a foot apart and pinching them once or twice during the months of May or June. GOOD ADVICE. Keep your Chrysanthemum plants clean. We recommend dusting with cheap ordinary SULPHUR COMPOUND (with a good duster). Frequent applications at regular intervals on Stock plants and cuttings will keep your plants insect free and healthy.

You want to meet success, of course, Remember, the soil can hardly be too rich and use water liberally in the summer when rains are few and far between, and then liquid manure when the buds are setting for those breath-taking huge blooms.

Chrysanthemums have a thick, heavy root system, very shallow, so be careful when cultivating you don't injure the fine feeding roots; shade in hot, dry climates around the base, they will appreciate.

We cannot too strongly recommend July and August planting for Iris. WE CANNOT SHIP BEFORE JULY 1 NOR AFTER NOVEMBER 1.

NOTICE TO LOCAL CUSTOMERS: If you expect to come to the gardens for Iris plants on Sunday, we request that you call us on the telephone or send in your order during the week so we can dig the rhizomes Saturday. We will not always be able to dig Iris on Sundays.

Prices for Ir's as quoted below are for one new plant or rhizome which will bloom next season and on which the new side shoots or "babies" will develop before winter sets in; this will be your increase for next year. In July these new eyes are very small but will grow rapdly during August, September and October.

Consequently, in July, the new rhizomes weigh very little but each month thereafter they increase rapidly in weight until in October the plants of vigorous sorts will weigh as much as one pound, which means two pounds when packed; the postage on such a plant would be 15 cents to the Central States and 25 cents to the East. I find that they soon die if left in the ground for more than one year, so that it pays to get fresh corms every year, either from seedsmen or by raising them. Seed sown in early spring on well-prepared ground begins to flower in September and goes on as long as frost keeps off to give a lovely display in spring. Being difficult to thin after germ nation, the seeds should be sown so thinly that this operation will be unnecessary. When the foliage is drying off in summer, lift the corms carefully and dry off, replanting in the September following, and discarding them after they have flowered for the second time.

Contrary to the general belief, these beautiful bulbous Iris, which are annually forced by the millions in florists' greenhouses for the cut flower trade, are entirely hardy out-of-doors; all they need in cold climates is a liberal mulch of dead leaves or straw during the coldest winter months. The Spanish Iris makes an early fall growth, so do not be alarmed when you see the tiny onion-like leaves appear in November.

Since some of the bulbous Iris are always sold out before the last orders come in, please order in July or August. Later always name one or two substitutes in case one or two of the varieties you are ordering are sold out.
