STANDARD LARGE FLOWERING VARIETIES

LISTED IN ORDER OF FLOWERING

WHITE

QUAKER MAID. The earliest white, good stem and fine foliage. Grows 5 feet from early June planting. Best results from buds taken end of August which mature first week in October.

AMBASSADOR. A very large, closely incurved and perfectly formed white, maturing October 20th. Flowers held perfectly upright by strong stems. Terminal bud.

SILVER SHEEN. Pure white, incurved form, maturing October 20th. Has wonderful keeping qualities. Select bud August 30th.

SNOW WHITE. Incurved. Maturing November 1st. Best Commercial White at this date. Very easy grower. Terminal bud.

BETSY ROSS. A large flower of perfect incurved form, clear white in color, with excellent stem and foliage, matures November 1st from Terminal bud.

MONUMENT. Pure white incurved, of very perfect form producing blooms 7 inches in diameter. Matures November 10-15th. Height 4 feet. Select bud September 10th.

CHAS. RAGER. The most reliable white for early November. Bonaffan in form but larger. Good stem and foliage. Very easy grower. Select bud September 15th.

INDIANAPOLIS WHITE. A perfectly incurved, large glistening white. Good hard flower with rigid stem and one that outclasses most whites at this season. Matures November 8th from terminal bud. \$1.00 per doz., \$5.00 per 100, \$40.00 per 1,000.

MEFO. Large creamy white, maturing November 15th to 20th. Closely incurved with lower petals irregularly reflexed. Select buds September 15th.

MARKETEER. A large incurved white with rigid stem and heavy foliage to properly set off the flowers. Easily grown into specimen blooms. Matures November 20th—from terminal bud.

WHITE MISTLETOE. Fine large pure white for December and later. Strong grower. Select buds September 30th to October 15th, Especially valuable to the retail grower.

PINK

EARLY OCTOBER. A fine new rose pink for so early in the season, blooming October 5th. Large incurved of medium height. \$10.00 per 100, \$90.00 per 1,000, \$2.00 per doz.

LUSTRE. Fine incurved lavendar pink Matures October 10th. Bud last week in August. Height medium.

PINK CHIEF. Very closely incurved on the order of Chieftain although much darker in color. Take terminal bud. Matures October 12th. A good variety for shading.

MAJ. EDWARD BOWES. A popular rosy pink. Matures October 20th. Height medium, good stem and foliage. Flowers of good substance, fully double from any bud reserved early in September.

EVENING STAR. An exceptionally fine mid-season pink variety maturing November 1st. Strong growth with good stem and foliage. Select bud about September 5th. Flowers 6 inches in diameter.

ROSABELLA. A new rich pink of exceptional quality. Closely incurved. Matures end of October from terminal bud.

J. W. PRINCE. Sport of Chieftain with color somewhat darker and more even. Same easy grower. Firm, closely incurved flowers. Matures early November from buds selected August 30th.

INDIANAPOLIS PINK. Closely curved, upper surface of petals light shade of lavender with reverse slightly darker. Good strong growing habits, maturing November 8th from terminal buds.

DISTINCTION. A fine commercial incurved pink Matures November 20th, and later from terminal bud. This variety is grown extensively in place of Pink Seidewitz.

THANKSGIVING PINK. A large flowered, very deep pink of firm substance for Thanksgiving and later. Select buds September 20th. Height 4 feet. Vigorous grower.

PETER JOHN. A pleasing light pink sport of Thanksgiving Pink with the same good habits. Matures Thanksgiving and later from buds selected September 20th.

HELEN FRICK. An old popular incurved pink, grown extensively for Thanksgiving. Easily grown into specimen blooms. Height medium, select bud September 10th.

EDWIN SEIDEWITZ. The most beautiful of the late pinks maturing for Thanksgiving and later. Select bud September 15th.

PINK MISTLETOE. A pink sport from Mistletoe. Best buds September 30th to October 15th. May be had for Christmas and after by planting the end of July or first of August.

STANDARD LARGE FLOWERING VARIETIES

YELLOW

GOLD LODE. The most popular early of the day. Fine yellow with good stem and foliage. Matures October 1st. Select buds August 25th.

CELESTRA. A round golden yellow to follow Gold Lode. Height 5 feet from June planting. Rigid stem and fine foliage. Blooms October 10th. Terminal bud.

MRS. H. E. KIDDER. An early bright yellow, very stiff upright stem producing flowers seven inches in diameter. Four feet in height from June planting. Matures October 15th from buds selected August 25th.

COLUMBUS DISPATCH. A very large incurved deep yellow, strong upright stem. Height 5 feet from early June planting. Blooms 8 inches in diameter. Matures October 25th from buds reserved September 1st.

SUNGLOW. Fine incurved yellow. Stiff stem with ample foliage. Matures October 25th. Select bud about August 25th.

GOOD NEWS. A clear bright yellow sport of Detroit News that possesses all the good habits of its parent. Select bud August 30th, matures October 25th.

BLAZING GOLD. An intense golden yellow, globular in form with rigid stem and ample foliage. Responds well to shading and blooms normally in late October. Take terminal bud.

CARDONIA. Deep, rich, yellow without a trace of bronze. Solid flower of good size and texture. Strong stem. 4 to 5 feet from June planting. Matures first week in November. Take terminal bud.

BONAFFAN DE LUXE. Rich golden yellow, tightly incurved. Flowers grown several to the plant average 4 to 5 inches in diameter. Matures November 10th to 20th. Being of dwarf habit is especially good for pot plants. Select bud September 10th.

PENROD. A fine new yellow which leaped to fame immediately. Perfectly incurved, crisp hard flowers that ship and handle well. Matures November 10th. \$8.00 per 100, \$75.00 per 1,000, \$2.00 per dozen.

YELLOW MONUMENT. A light yellow sport of Monument with the same good qualities. Matures November 10th to 15th. Bud September 10th.

FRIENDLY RIVAL. This is acknowledged the finest yellow ever produced considering its size, color, stem and foliage. Maturing November 10th to 15th. Bud September 10th.

MAJOR BONAFFAN. Closely incurved, clear yellow of very fine substance. Matures middle of November and later from buds selected September 10th. This variety requires early planting. FRIENDLY CALL. A crisp, tightly incurved buff yellow. A good shipper, fine keeper and does not shatter. Blooms 6 to 8 inches in diameter, matures November 20th and later, from terminal bud. Height 4 feet.

MARIE DePETRIS. Golden yellow, incurved. Matures November 23rd from buds selected August 20th. A perfect commercial in every respect.

GLORIA. New commercial yellow for Thanksgiving. Similar to Nellie T. Ross, having all the requirements of a good November mum. \$10,00 per 100, \$90.00 per 1,000, \$2.00 per dozen.

GOLDEN PEARSON. Clear bright yellow sport of Gladys Pearson. Like its parent, it comes just right for Thanksgiving Day and should be planted heavily for that time. Bud September 30th.

GOLDEN MRS. ROSS. Identical in every respect with its parent, except color, which is a much darker yellow. Height 4 feet. Matures end November and later. Select bud early October.

MRS. NELLIE T. ROSS. Large incurved light yellow for Thanksgiving and later. Possesses all the requirements of a good commercial. Do not reserve bud until early October. Height $4\frac{1}{2}$ feet.

GOLDEN MISTLETOE. An exceedingly late yellow of a pleasing shade. Recommended as one to be planted largely as it comes to bloom when most other varieties are off.

BRONZE LODE. A bronze sport of Gold Lode. Habits identical to its parents. Matures October 1st from buds selected August 25th.

MONGOL. Similar to Detroit News but about 10 days earlier. Golden Bronze of medium height. Take terminal bud. \$10.00 per 100, \$90.00 per 1,000, \$2.00 per dozen.

HILDA H. BERGEN. Color is a deep rich mahogany bronze and every bud produces a perfect flower, even when grown four or flve to the plant. Matures October 8th. Bud August 25th.

CAMBRIA. Intense golden bronze, tightly incurved. Excellent growing habits. Maturing October 25th from terminal bud. \$8.00 per 100, \$75.00 per 1,000, \$2.00 per dozen.

GLITTERS. Unusual and even shade of glittering orange bronze. Matures October 28th from terminal buds.

APRICOT QUEEN. Large fully double incurved flower. A light but pleasing shade of orange-bronze. Matures November 1st from buds selected September 5th. Highly recommended for shading.

DETROIT NEWS. A very popular bronze for late October and early November. Possessing wonderful substance and keeping qualities. Select bud August 30th. Highly recommended for shading. **INDIANAPOLIS BRONZE.** An even shade of Bronze. Possesses all the good characteristics of its parent Indianapolis Pink. Matures November 8th from terminal bud.

MRS. A. J. STAHELIN. An exceptionally fine Bronze maturing at a season when there are practically no others of its color. Texture of flower, color, stem and habits all of excellent quality. A decided and lively shade of bronze. Terminal bud. Matures November 15th.

GLADYS PEARSON. Incurved buff bronze, maturing for Thanksgiving. All around good commercial. Select bud Sept. 30th.

OAK LEAF OR DARK GLADYS PEARSON. A deep bronze sport of Gladys Pearson with the same good commercial habits. Just right for Thanksgiving. Bud September 30th.

STANDARD LARGE FLOWERING VARIETIES

MRS. DAVID F. ROY. Large flowered crimson with deep buff reverse, maturing early November. Bud Sept 15th., good for shading.

GARNET KING. The finest red yet produced, color garnet, enhanced by a silken sheen. Fine stem and foliage. Buds selected September 20th, matures November 20th.

MOHAWK CHIEF. Very large reflexed crimson maturing end of November into December. Height 3 ft. Select buds October 1st and later for best color.

NORMANDIE. Large flowering white with delicate pink shadings. Matures during September. This we believe to be the hardiest and earliest to bloom naturally outdoors.

WHITE JEWELL. White sport of Jewell, slightly tinged with pink which adds to its attractiveness. Same good early characteristics as its parent. Matures October 1st to 15th.

IRENE. True button type pompon. Color pure white, upright wiry stems. Height 3 feet. Matures first week in October.

ARCADIA. A vigorous productive pompon with excellent growing habit. Well formed sprays carry many rounded blooms of pure white measuring 2 to $2\frac{1}{2}$ inches across. Matures October 25th.

SEA GULL. Large flowering pompon. Makes a well arranged spray. Medium height, matures November 1st. Good disbudded.

PENGUIN. A good mid-season white button pompon. Vigorous grower, good stem and substance. Matures November 10th.

REV. HORACE BUSHNELL. A pure white perfectly formed large flowering pompon on strong well arranged spray. Matures about November 10th.

CHICAGO PEARL. The bloom is ideal in form and pure white in color. The general plant habit is good. The sprays are large and flowers carried well apart. Blooms November 15th.

CORDOVA. Large, very free flowering white pompon coming in for Thanksgiving and later. Diameter of flower two and one-half inches. Strong upright stem. Medium height.

ROYAL QUEEN. Strong, upright growth. True pompon form, 2¼ inches in diameter. Fully developed December 5th. Pure white.

SNOW. A medium sized Ivory White pompon, maturing December 25th and later. Equally as late as Garza Supreme. Very sturdy growth which spaces the flowers well.

TREASURE ISLAND WHITE. Intermediate Decorative White pompon, maturing December 20th.

CRIMSON SHEEN. Purplish Amaranth of the decorative type. Exceedingly brilliant and unusual in color. 4 feet in height, blooms $4\frac{1}{2}$ inches in diameter. Matures October 20th.

PERSIAN ROSE. Brilliant rose pink, large flowering pompon of medium dwarf growth. Matures October 20th.

SHEILA. A clear pink pompon of medium size that is very atractive. Makes strong fine sprays and very prolific. Matures October 20th.

PINK DOT. An old favorite. White background with petals tipped with pink with prominent dark center. Fine for shading.

LETITIA. Light pink with dark pink center. Vigorous grower and gives good yield. Matures October 20th.

CAZLONIA. Very symmetrical in form. Color, rose pink. Strong, upright growth. Height, 3 feet. Flowers 3 inches in diameter. Cut October 25th.

ISOBEL. First quality intermediate deep pink pompon, excellent for shading. Blooms Nov. 1st. \$3.00 per 100, \$50.00 per 1,000.

MRS. MORGAN G. BUCKLEY. A clear light pink. Crisp round flowers of good substance on strong well arranged spray. Matures November 8th.

THYRA. Of the most perfect form, full to the center. Color is dark pink, has excellent stem and foliage. Flowers mature November 10th, and are $3\frac{1}{2}$ inches in diameter.

ALICE. A large flowered lavender pompon. Maturing November 15th. Good stem and fine foliage.

UNEEDA. Late pink pompon with good color and substance. Medium height, blooming November 25th. \$8.00 per 100, \$75.00 per 1,000, \$2.00 per dozen.

USONA. A bright pink variety for Thanksgiving. Very productive, with a strong upright growth. Height 3 feet.

IMPROVED RODELL. A sport of Rodell. A much stronger grower, with large blooms. The first good Commercial Yellow Pompon to mature.

YELLOW HAMMER. A productive intermediate pompon of good quality, recommended for shading. Maturing November 20th. \$8.00 per 100, \$75.00 per 1,000, \$1.50 per dozen.

YELLOW DOT. (JABLONSKY) Sport from Pink Dot. Intermediate Pompon, medium height, October 25th. Fine for shading.

YELLOW PRINCETON. A clear yellow sport of Princeton. Matures November 20th.

CANARY. Clear Canary yellow maturing November 20th to Thanksgiving. Excellent Commercial in all respects.

GOLDEN SCEPTRE. A perfectly shaped bright yellow pompon of intermediate size, and one of the very best sellers as a cut flower. Produces heavy, well arranged sprays. Height 3 feet. Matures November 25th. **YELLOW CORDOVA.** Sport of Cordova with same habits as parent. Color is a very good shade of yellow, maturing Thanksgiving and later.

MODENA. Upright growth with stiff, wiry stem. Color, clear yellow. Matures November 30th from June 15th planting. Height $3\frac{1}{2}$ feet. Diameter of flowers 2 inches.

YUVAWN. Very bright yellow blooms on strong stems, makes nicely arranged spray and very desirable for Thanksgiving trade. Matures November 20th. Height 3 feet. Makes a fine pot plant.

STARDUST. A perfectly shaped, large flowered pompon of a rich golden yellow maturing in December. Good all around pompon.

CHRISTMAS CHEER. A bright yellow pompon to mature middle of December. Flowers 2 inches in diameter. Height medium.

YELLOW SNOW. Deep lemon sport of snow. Maturing December 25th. \$8.00 per 100, \$75.00 per 1,000, \$1.50 per dozen.

VIBRANT. A large decorative pompon of a good deep yellow maturing December 20th. Very productive and yields fine sprays from early August pinch. Very easy to grow.

BONNIBEL. A very distinct pompon of orange buff color. 1¹/₄ inches in diameter. It is very free flowering and of dwarf growth, about two and one-half feet in height. Matures middle of October.

AUTUMN BRONZE. A glowing reddish bronze pompon. Very free flowering and excellent for shading. Matures middle of October.

ADELAIDE. Color rich mahogany bronze of intermediate size. Matures October 23rd.

SUNTAN. A popular bronze of medium height and very productive grown either normally or under shade. Matures October 25th.

JEMIMA. Bright bronze good for either inside or outside. Fine for shading. Blooms in early November.

PASADENA. An orange bronze of a very pleasing and lively shade. Strong grower with flowers, 3 inches in diameter of very good substance. Matures November 1st.

NEW YORK. Very attractive bronze pompon of the button type. Maturing early November. Small hard foliage permits close planting.

PIRATE GOLD. A rich golden bronze pompon of medium size, strong grower and very productive. Matures November 10th.

PRINCETON. A large pompon with good stem and excellent spray formation. Color a beautiful deep golden yellow suffused with orange. Matures middle of November. Awarded Silver Cup.

ZOE. A golden bronze of the large button type. Blooms November 20th and later. Grows medium in height and branches well, giving a good yield.

LEGAL TENDER. The most popular bronze at this season. Color is a combination of bronze and gold which is most attractive. Large flowers on strong stems maturing November 20th and later.

FRANK WILCOX. Golden bronze of special merit, being of dwarf and sturdy growth, it makes a fine pot plant and is excellent for cutting. At its best around Thanksgiving.

DOROTHY TURNER. A large flowered pompon of a lively combination of bronze and old gold. Matures November 25th.

ROWENNA. A large flowered pompon of a Reddith bronze for Thanksgiving and later. Has strong stem with good dark foliage that sets off the well arranged spray. Height 3 feet.

AVALON. A large flowered pompon, producing crisp blooms of coppery orange, for Thanksgiving and later. Its rich coloring, excellent spray formation and productiveness make this variety a welcome addition to the late flowering group.

GLOW. A large perfectly rounded pompon of glowing orange. Ready to cut for Thanksgiving. Height $3\frac{1}{2}$ to 4 ft. Good keeping qualities.

WILDFIRE. A lively reddish bronze, vigorous grower. Matures early December. A large flowered pompon of high quality.

FLASHLIGHT. A bright glowing crimson. Large flowered and very productive. Matures end of September outdoors.

EARLY CRIMSON. Early large flowered semi-double rich crimson pompon. Good growing habits either under shade or normal, retaining its color remarkably well.

NATOMA. An excellent large flowered Red pompon maturing October 25th. A good producer with sturdy growth. Attractive fall color.

FIREBALL. Bright Crimson, large flowered pompon of very strong growth. Matures November 2nd. Height 3 feet. Will also make excellent dwarf pot plant.

ROBIN HOOD. A small flowered but very attractive rich red pompon which appeals to the public. Gives good yield. Matures November 5th.

MRS. MARY HOOKER. A striking, velvety crimson, for November 15th. The flowers fully 3 inches across and are carried on strong branching sprays. Growth vigorous, attaining a height of 3 feet.

RED PRINCETON. Reddish bronze sport of Princeton. Same fine flower and habits.

HELEN HUBBARD. Very popular crimson decorative. In heavy demand for Thanksgiving trade. The color is a rich velvety crimson, which does not fade. Growth is excellent.

ROYAL CRIMSON. Truly a valuable addition to the Red Pompons. Large flowered, strong growing and a good shade of Red. Matures December 1st when all other Reds are scarce.

STANDARD ANEMONE CHRYSANTHEMUMS

LISTED IN ORDER OF FLOWERING

BLANCHE. The improved Garza. Color, white with cream center. A very attractive flower and a good grower. Matures October 27th.

WHITE ANEMONE. Large pure white anemome with snow white cushion and numerous rows of glistening white guard petals. Matures November 5th. Flowers attain 6 inches in diameter when disbudded.

SHASTA. Pure white anemone maturing November 8th. Flowers 3 to 4 inches grown in sprays, of good substance and strong growth. Heavy producer and good under shade.

LITTLE AMERICA. Snow white medium sized anemone. Cushion is quite solid, the guard petals are firm enough to handle well in shipping. Bloome early in November. Best disbudded.

OHIO STATE. A yellow anemone about the color of Yellow Garza matures November 1st. Being of dwarf branchy growth is best suited for pot culture.

PURPLE QUEEN. An aster purple anemone with golden yellow cushion. A good producer blooming November 10th.

FRIEDA. A very lovely shade of pink with yellow cushion. Medium height and strong prolific growth making it suitable for pot work. An attractive variety maturing November 15th.

DARK PINK FREIDA. A sport of Freida, much darker in color and a decided improvement.

LITTLE AMETHYST. Small flowered lavender anemone. Equally good for pot plants or cut sprays. Matures November 15th.

BEAUTIFUL LADY. A striking anemone variety of a bright shade of pink contrasting with its creamy white cushion. Early planting recommended. Height $3\frac{1}{2}$ feet. Matures November 20th.

ROLINDA. A reddish bronze anemone. Very firm flowers 3 inches in diameter, matures November 20th and later on nicely arranged sprays without disbudding. When disbudded attains 4 to 5 inches.

RED ROLINDA. Red sport of Rolinda.

YELLOW ROLINDA. A golden yellow sport of Rolinda.

NORMA. A large flowering orchid-pink anemone with goldenpink cushion, making a very striking combination. Matures November 25th. Disbudded flowers 4 to 5 inches in diameter. Makes well arranged spray. DARK PINK NORMA. A deep lavender sport of Norma.

SUSANNE MILLER. A golden-yellow team mate of Norma, and is identical in all respects.

BRONZE NORMA. Bronze companion to Norma & Suzanne Miller. Identical in all respects.

YOLANDA. A fine anemone for Thanksgiving and later. Color is an unusual shade of apricot bronze. Flowers firm and well proportioned in nicely arranged spray. A clean vigorous grower.

ESPY'S WHITE SUPREME. Vigorous, large flowered white anemone of medium height, maturing in December.

ESPY'S DARK PINK SUPREME. A soft even shade of pink with the same habits as the above.

BRONZE SUPREME. A soft and pleasing combination of buff bronze with slight pink shadings that combines well with other shades.

YELLOW SUPREME. Color a trifle brighter than Yellow Garza with flowers considerably larger and fuller. Matures in December.

GARZA SUPREME. Pure white sport of Garza, coming into bloom during December. Producing very perfect, full rounded flowers on strong stems. The latest flowering anemone.

YELLOW GARZA SUPREME. This is a good clear yellow sport of Garza Supreme, the most popular anemone ever produced owing to its lateness and abundance of bloom.

SINGLE CHRYSANTHEMUMS

OCTOBER PINK. A strong growing, good medium pink that is highly recommended for shading. Matures October 25th.

MELBA. This variety is adapted to pot culture or cut flowers. Color orange bronze with a distinct circle of yellow at the base of the petals. Flowers 4 inches in diameter mature November 10th.

RED MELBA. A red sport of Melba.

LIGHTHOUSE. This striking single pompon of a bright bronze, shading to watermelon red makes a pleasing and attractive flower. Good substance and well arranged spray. Matures November 10th.

CALIFORNIA GOLD. This large flowering single with several rows of firm yellow petals on strong stems matures November 10th.

MASONS RED. Large single flowered red. Medium height and of good substance, maturing November 10th.

'MUMS FOR SHADING

The purpose of shading is to force the plants to set buds earlier. 'Mums are classed as a short day plant, thus by covering them with black cloth or paper, that light will not filter thru; about four or five o'clock in the afternoon and removing at seven o'clock in the morning shortens the daylight several hours and considerably hastens their maturity. Cease shading when buds show color.

This treatment will generally bring them to bloom about one month earlier than their normal flowering season. To obtain these results planting and pinching should be advanced by one month to six weeks. Shading for earliest flowers from earliest varieties should start early in July. Successive plantings may be made every 10 days for continuous blooms until the early 'Mums appear at their normal flowered period.
